## Senator Word is Chairman of New Study Committee

Gov. Ben Barnes announced last week that he had appointed Senator J. P. Word as chairman of a Senate Committee to study Computer Utilization.

The committee, authorized by Senate Resolution 207 of the 61st Legislature, will survey the use of computers by state departments, agencies, and all units of state government.

The committee is authorized to be considered in the report will include what the computers are being used for, the need for more computers and their cost, and their availability to other state agencies.

### Questions & Answers

**QUESTION:** I lost my social security card about a week or so ago. Is there any way I can get another card quick? Is there any charge for it?

**ANSWER:** There is no charge for getting a duplicate social security card. You should complete an application—Form SS-5—and mail it to our office. The Form SS-5 can be obtained from any Post Office or social security office or representative. Be sure and put your social security number on the application. We can then get a duplicate card to you in about three days. If you don't show your social security number on the application, it takes about 14 days for us to check and get you a duplicate.

## COUNTY AGENT

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Sorghum midge over the past 20 years has been the most destructive insect pest of grain sorghums in Texas. Loss estimates have exceeded \$10 million annually several times since 1950.

Since grain sorghums were planted in Hamilton County this year

over an extended period of time, midge could be a real problem especially to late plantings.

To effectively and economically prevent losses to this pest, producers must understand the habits of the midge and realize how and when sorghum is damaged. To avoid economic loss, two factors must be kept in mind, namely that midge damage occurs at the time of flower pollination and what population level constitutes an economic infestation.

Midge populations do not increase greatly until volunteer or early planted sorghum becomes avail-

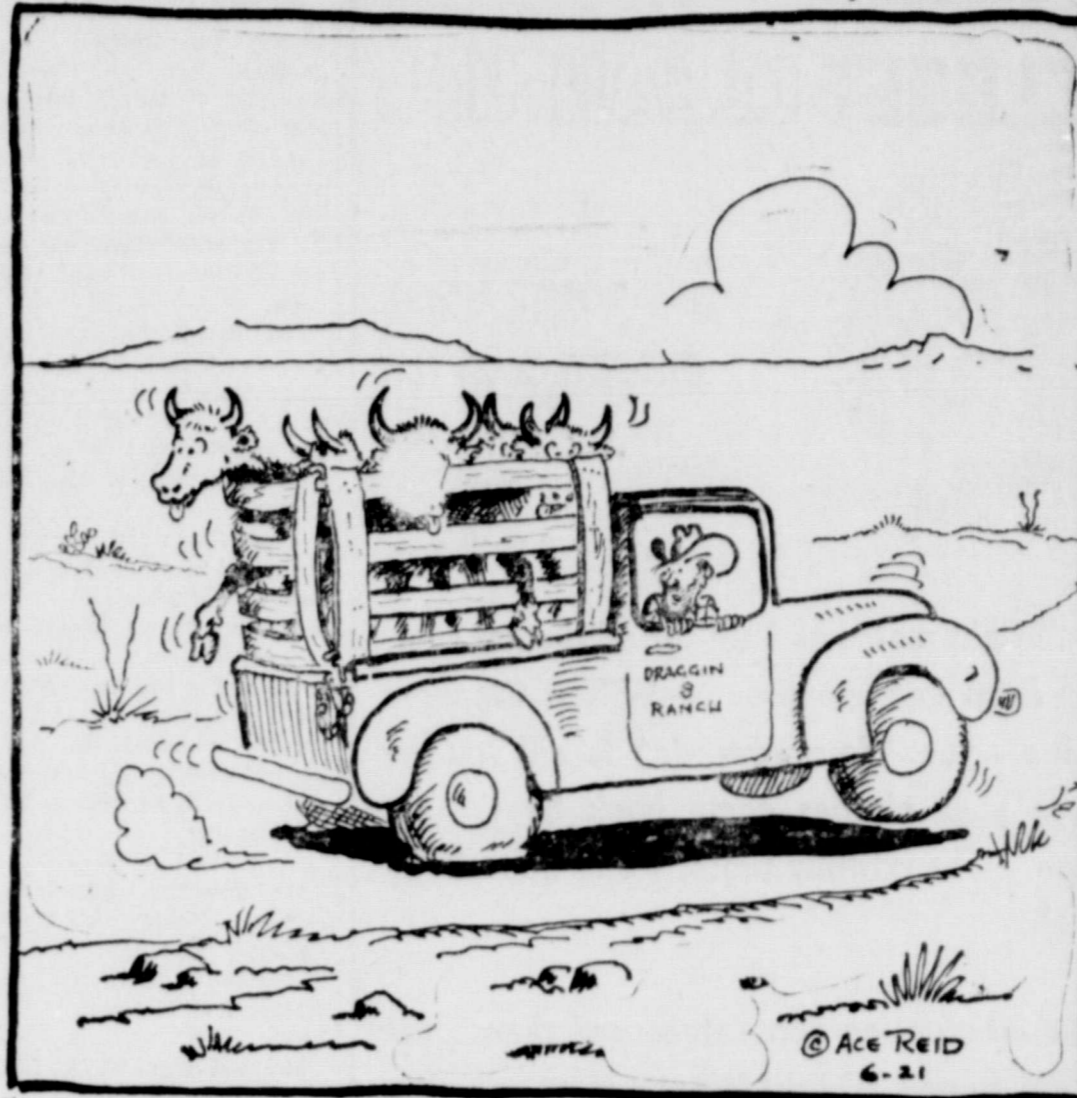

able for egg laying. Approximately two weeks are required for each generation. The buildup period may extend over six or seven weeks and it can be shortened by weather, ample early blooming sorghum and other factors favorable for midge development. Sorghum blooming after the heavy emergence has begun is generally damaged extensively unless adequate insecticide control is used.

Close field inspection is a must for the buildup can change almost overnight. Once the population has reached the "economic loss" stage head inspections suddenly reveal numerous (5 to 100) midge per head. Control measures must be applied during the time of flower pollination to be effective. The second through the sixth day of bloom-

ing is the most important period for any given head; however the susceptible period for the entire field must be considered.

The susceptible period varies from year to year, but in this area it usually begins about June 25th.

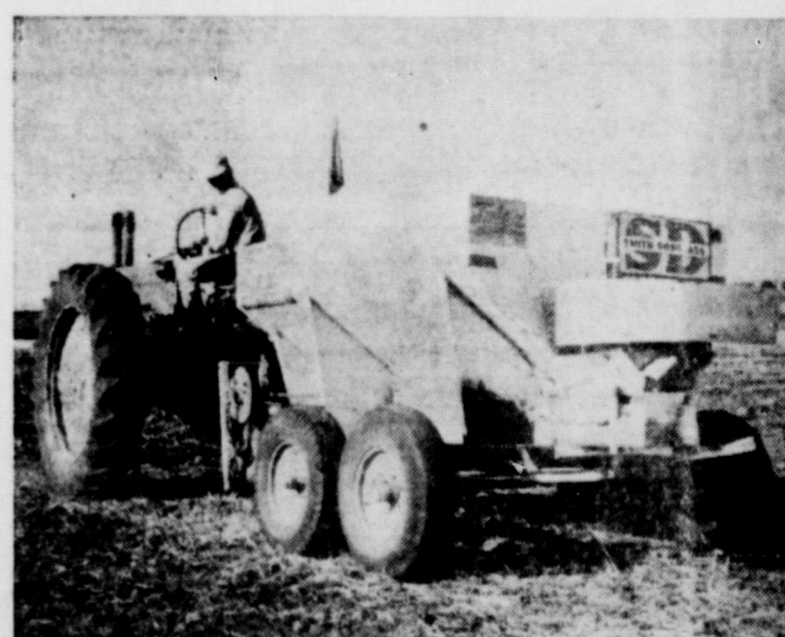
