\$2,768.22 is First Quarter Sale Tax Take

City of Hico treasury was enriched by \$2,768.22 last week, when a check for that amount was received from the State Comptroller's office, representing Sales Tax collections for the first quarter of 1970.

The amount received was only slightly less than the \$2,924.80 paid for the last quarter of 1969, October through December.

Total received for the six-month period is \$5,693.02, which compares with estimates that the one percent tax would enrich the city by approximately \$10,000 annually.

Hico voters approved the special tax early last year, with collections starting October 1.

Social Security Questions & Answers

QUESTION: I am 62 years old now but plan to continue working indefinitely. My wife, who will be 65 the last part of September, has never worked on social security jobs. Can she get Medicare when she's 65?

ANSWER: She can get the supplementary medical doctor bill insurance part of Medicare by filing an application. She should do this before the month she is 65 to get full protection beginning with the month she is 65. She cannot be eligible for the hospital part of Medicare until you apply for, and establish your eligibility to monthly social security benefits. You don't have to retire to do this. Many men in this same situation have filed their claim to give hospital insurance protection to the wife. In this situation, we would withhold your cash monthly benefits, and your wife's but she would then have full Medicare protection. Please see our representative for more detailed information.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Iron Chlorosis has been showing up in lawns, ornamentals and fruit trees this year. Symptoms are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of the chlorophyll to develop normally.

The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions. In either case, iron supplied by ferrous sulfate or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Ferrous sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. A teaspoon of household detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in about 10 days if yellowing persists.

The iron sulfate can also be applied to the soil as a fertilizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a circle just inside the spread of the branches. A five-foot tall shrub requires about a fourth of a pound. A tree should have three-fourths of a pound for each inch of trunk diameter. In the case of highly calcareous soil, foliar spray is more effective than soil applications.
