Hico Schools Will Benefit From Federal Grant

Hico Public Schools will receive \$3,450 for the 1970 school year from the Federal Government, according to a telegram from Congressman Omar Burleson.

A total of \$4,600 was approved for the local school under Public Law 874, which appropriates monies for schools in federally affected areas.

This is the first year that Hico has qualified for funds under the federal grant. To qualify, a school must be teaching a certain number of students whose parents are employed in government-related jobs.

In a meeting last Sunday, July 19, final assignments and details were completed for the Vacation Bible School at Hico Church of Christ. Austin Emery, local minister, will serve as director for the five-day event which is scheduled August 10 through 14.

The upper division classes will be directed by Mrs. J. T. Leonard and Austin Emery.

Registration for the Bible School will begin at 8:45 a.m. Monday, August 10. The daily sessions will be from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. A closing program will be held at 10:30 a.m. Friday. The school is open to all children of the Hico area, Mr. Emery said.

Two From Hamilton County Will Attend FB Seminar

Two high school students from Hamilton County will travel to Waco by chartered bus Tuesday, July 28, where they will attend a Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar.

The two students are Jon Bonner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bonner of Hico, and Linda Hufstutler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Hufstutler of Hamilton.

The Hamilton County Farm Bureau is sponsoring the local students at the four-day training school. Some 437 students from 156 Texas counties are expected to attend the session.

Four outstanding, nationally-known lecturers will address the Waco training school.

They are Dr. Clifton L. Ganus, Jr., President of Harding College, Searcy, Ark.; Dr. C. L. Key, vice

president for public affairs of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, Muncy, Pa., author of "I Was a Slave in Russia"; and W. Cleon Skousen, Salt Lake City, Utah, author, lawyer, educator and former FBI agent.

In addition, a young former narcotics addict and ex-convict will relate the tragic story of his life as an addict and criminal. He is Richard Perigo of Dallas, who is associated with HIP (Help Is Possible), an organization dedicated to the prevention of delinquency and drug abuse among teenagers.

Purpose of the seminar is to give the student a better understanding of the economic, moral and social aspects of the American society. Instruction will consist of lectures, films, and panel discussion.

Saturday night entertainment will feature another top-notch performer, Joe Paul Nichols of Fort Worth, who has appeared on many telecast programs with his western band.

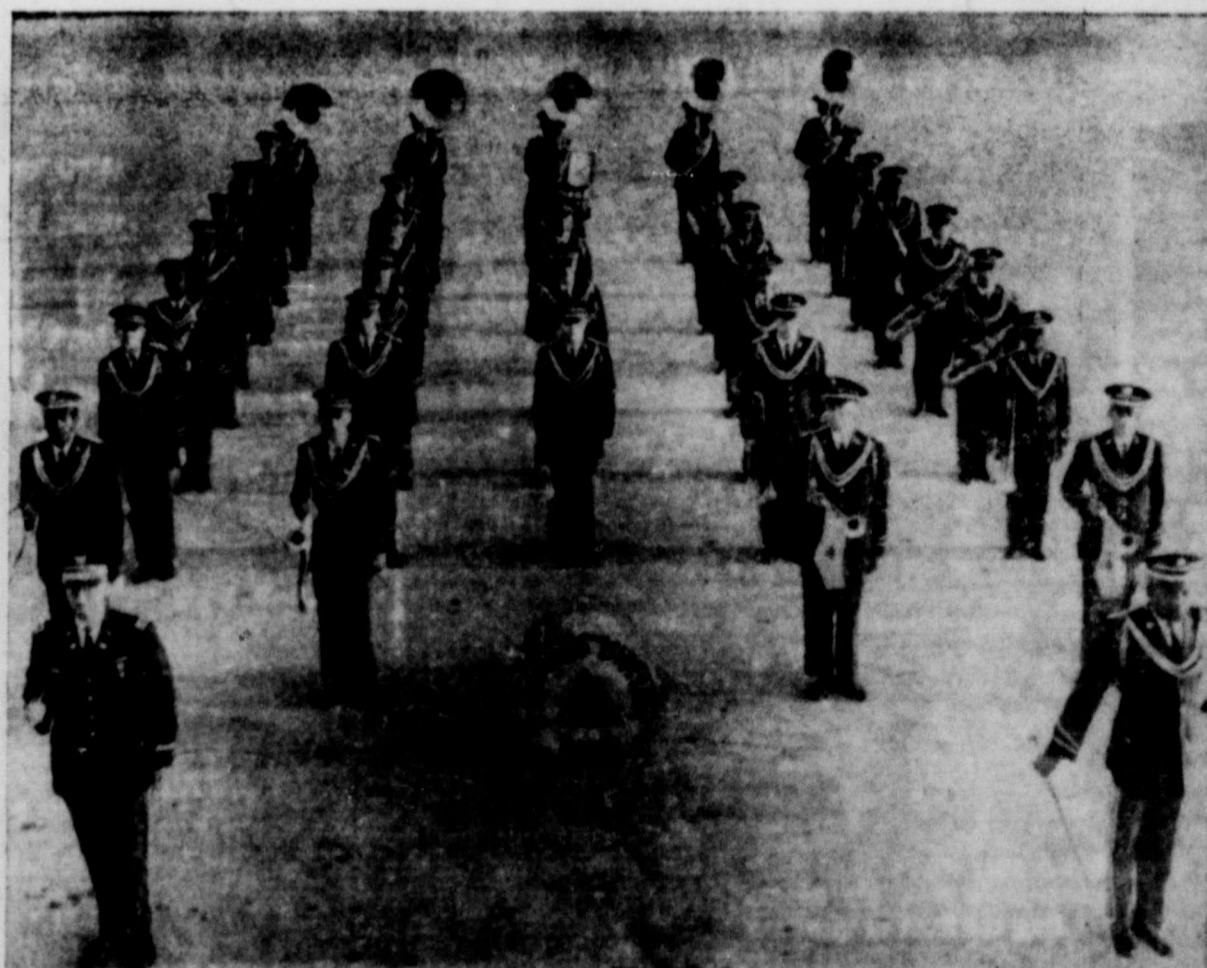
Ray Keller, Reunion Manager, said that all committee heads had been appointed for various details, and all that was needed was a little more time to wrap up this year's production.

Proudly, Barbara has carried the name of her hometown—Hico—to a cross-section of Texans. "Barbara Bailey Day" will be Hico's way of saying thank you to Barbara and to join with her in being counted as Americans who are proud of their heritage; proud to be a part of the greatest nation on earth; and to say "Thank God, we are FREE!"

Barbara's story is unusual in the fact that she is an 18-year-old from a small rural town in Central Texas. She considers herself a member of the silent majority who realized the need to take a stand for America. And, so in taking that stand she became a much sought-after speaker for Americanism. Whether speaking to a group of 20 or 2,000, Barbara has found that the citizens of America want to identify themselves with Americanism.

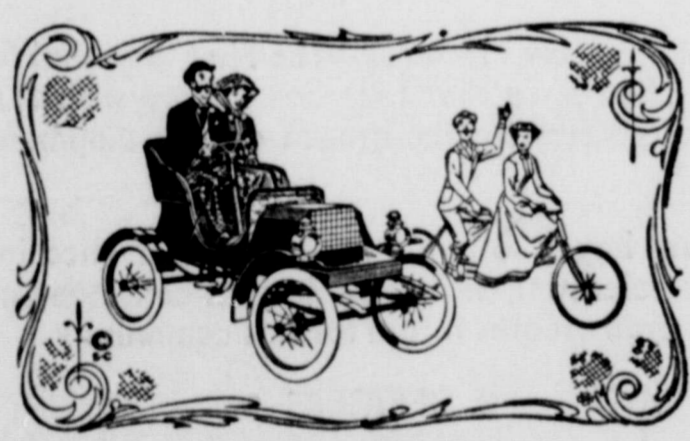
