Hamilton Youth Dies in Accident

An accident late Tuesday evening on the Lusk Randals ranch east of Fairy took the life of an 18-year-old Hamilton youth, Billy Michael Woods.

Young Woods was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Woods of Hamilton.

The youth, along with two companions, George Warlick of Hamilton and James Gleason of Fairy, had been fishing and hunting, according to investigating officers, and a shotgun accidentally discharged.

Barrow-Rutledge ambulance was summoned, and the youth was rushed to Hico Hospital, and then on to the Stephenville Hospital. He passed away a short time later.

The Woods family is well known in his area, and Mrs. Woods is currently serving as County Treasurer.

Glen Rose Rites Held Monday for Accident Victims

Funeral services for Herschel S. Simmons, 49 and his wife, Hazel, 45, longtime Glen Rose residents, were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in Reynolds Funeral Chapel, with burial in Squaw Creek Cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Simmons were the parents of Mrs. Tommie Johnson of Hico, and Mrs. Simmons was

the daughter of Mrs. Eunice Adkison, also of Hico.

They were injured fatally Saturday night in a two-car, head-on collision six miles south of Granbury on Highway 144. The accident also took the life of Francis Dean Haworth, 35, of Granbury, driver of one of the cars.

The victims were pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice C. T. Hughs of Granbury.

Other survivors of the Simmons are Mrs. Karen Jones of Cleburne and Bobby Simmons of Glen Rose. Mr. Simmons is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Faye Hackney of Glen Rose; two brothers, Ernest Simmons of El Paso and Carl Simmons of Glen Rose; and a sister, Mrs. Nova Jordon of Dickinson.

Enrollment Down at Opening

Hico Schools opened their doors Monday morning for the 1970-71 term with 330 students answering the first bell.

The figure is a decline from the 340 present on opening day a year ago, and is also down considerably from the approximate 360 enrolled on the final day of school.

Largest class on opening day was the tenth grade, which registered 41 students. Smallest was the first grade where only 19 beginners were in their places.

The traditional opening assembly was held at 9 a.m. Monday, with a large crowd of parents, patrons and teachers present.

Cen-Tex Goat Breeders Slate Annual Show and Sale at Goldthwaite

Members of the Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association will have their 14th annual show and sale at the show barns in Goldthwaite Friday and Saturday, Aug. 28-29.

Goats will be in their pens by 7:30 a.m. Friday, and sifting will get underway at 8 a.m., when 75 bucks and 21 does will be selected for the sale from about 175 bucks and 50 does.

The top 25 bucks and 10 does will be placed starting at 1 p.m. Friday, from which the champions will be selected.

The sale will begin promptly at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Goats offered for sale have been consigned by 20 Angora breeders. The association has about 50 members in Mills, Comanche, Hamilton, Coryell, Lampasas, Brown and San Saba counties.

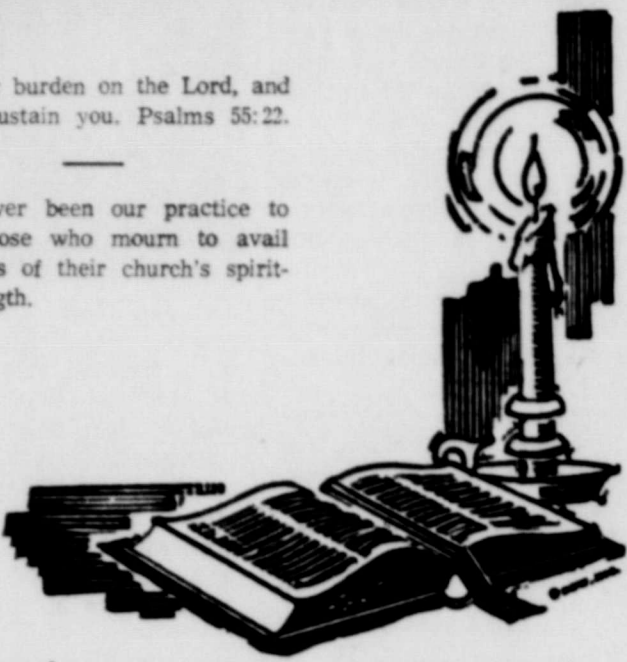

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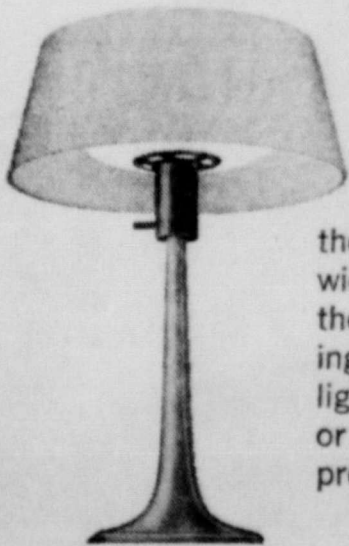

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

If you see a triangle of florescent orange and reflective red ahead on the highway, it means slow down and drive carefully. It's a slow moving vehicle emblem and was placed on the machine as a warning to motorists.

The emblem was developed by agricultural engineers to warn drivers when they are approaching a slow moving vehicle. The emblem can be seen and recognized up to 500 feet away at any time of the day and under almost all driving conditions.

Many accidents are caused simply because the motorist often does not realize that the object ahead is moving so slowly until it is too late to avoid a collision. If the emblem is in place, and duly noted, there is time to slow down or even stop.

The center of the emblem is fluorescent yellow-orange, the most visible color in daylight, and the outside border is reflective to show up at night. The emblem is intended for use on vehicles designed to travel 25 mph or less and can be easily mounted on most farm equipment.

It's inexpensive, durable and movable and doesn't interfere with the machine or its operator.

Hamilton County farmers who must move farm equipment and machinery on highways should attach the SVM emblem on the back of the tractor or implement being moved. The emblem is being used nationwide and motorists should be familiar with it. Its use is cheap insurance against rear end collisions.

The size of next fall and winter litters may be determined by the management given sows during hot weather.

For larger litters, swine producers should make every effort to keep sows and gilts cool during the hot summer and early fall months. Research has proven that heat stress or high temperatures during the early stages of the gestation period reduces sow productivity.

Heat stress during the 15 days following breeding is detrimental to productivity, resulting in fewer viable embryos and lower survival rates.

Sows and gilts can be kept cool quite satisfactorily through the use of a fogging system. On farms which have a pressure water system, cotton spray nozzles have been successfully used in constructing the needed fogging system.

Tom Venable, manager for Gull States-United Telephone Co. pointed out today that many persons unknowingly are putting their own and perhaps other telephones out of service everyday by not replacing the receiver properly when through talking.

For all practical purposes, Mr. Venable said, a telephone receiver off the hook is the same as a telephone out of order. And on a party line, that means every telephone on the line is out of service.

In an emergency, this could cause hardship.

"A common cause of disruption of telephone service is failure to replace the telephone on the hook when someone is told to answer the phone on another extension," Mr. Venable said.

When a person continues to get a busy signal because the party he is trying to reach has his phone off the receiver, the caller usually notifies the telephone company that the phone is out of order. The phone company may then send a repairman out on a service call, only to discover the phone is off the hook.

Such service calls have been increasing. That's why Mr. Venable appealed to telephone users to make a special effort to replace receivers after completing calls.

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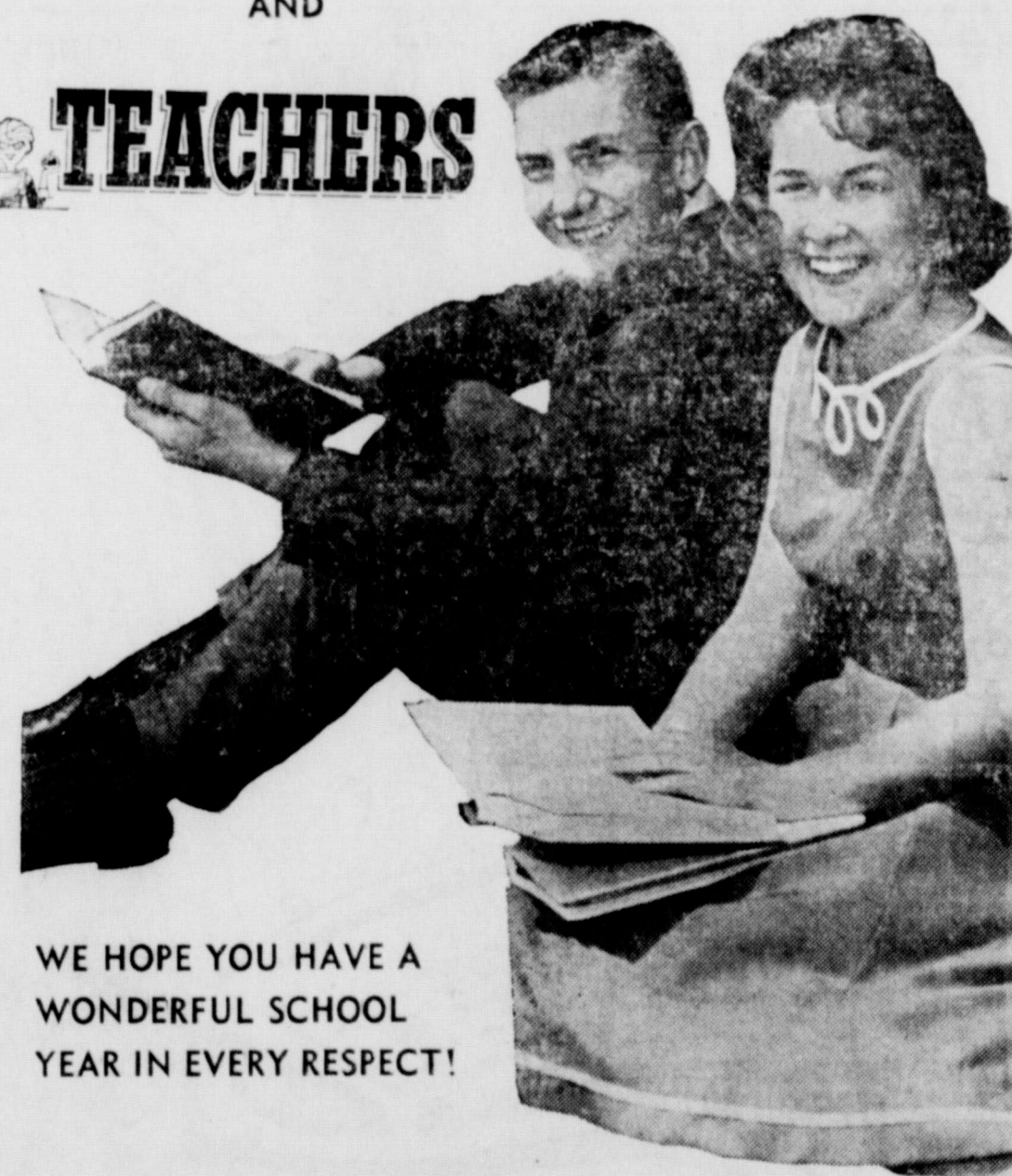

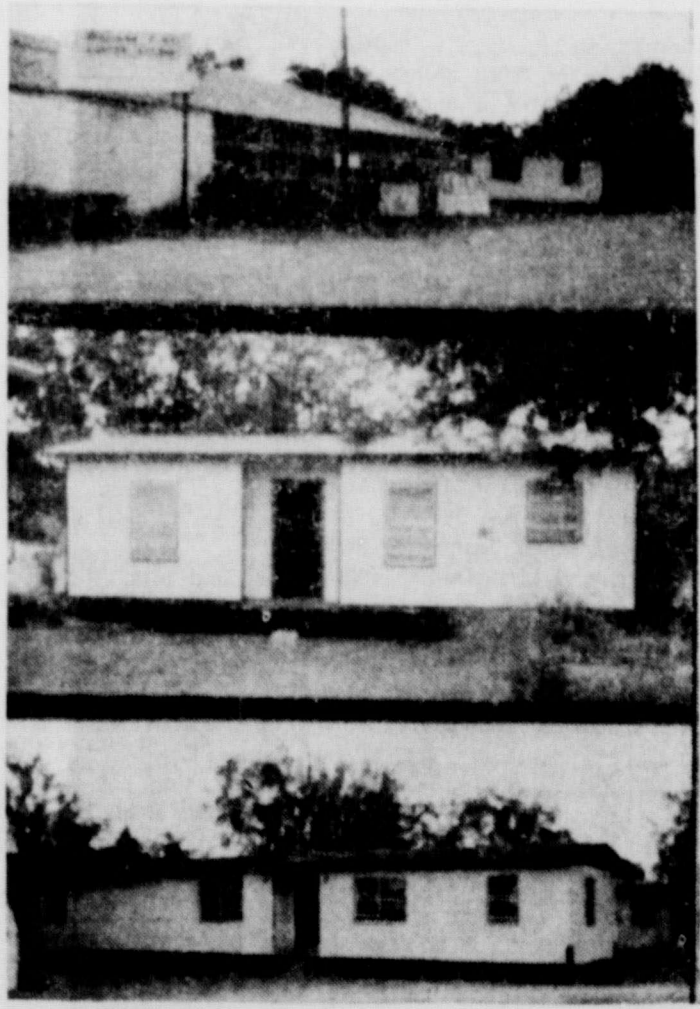

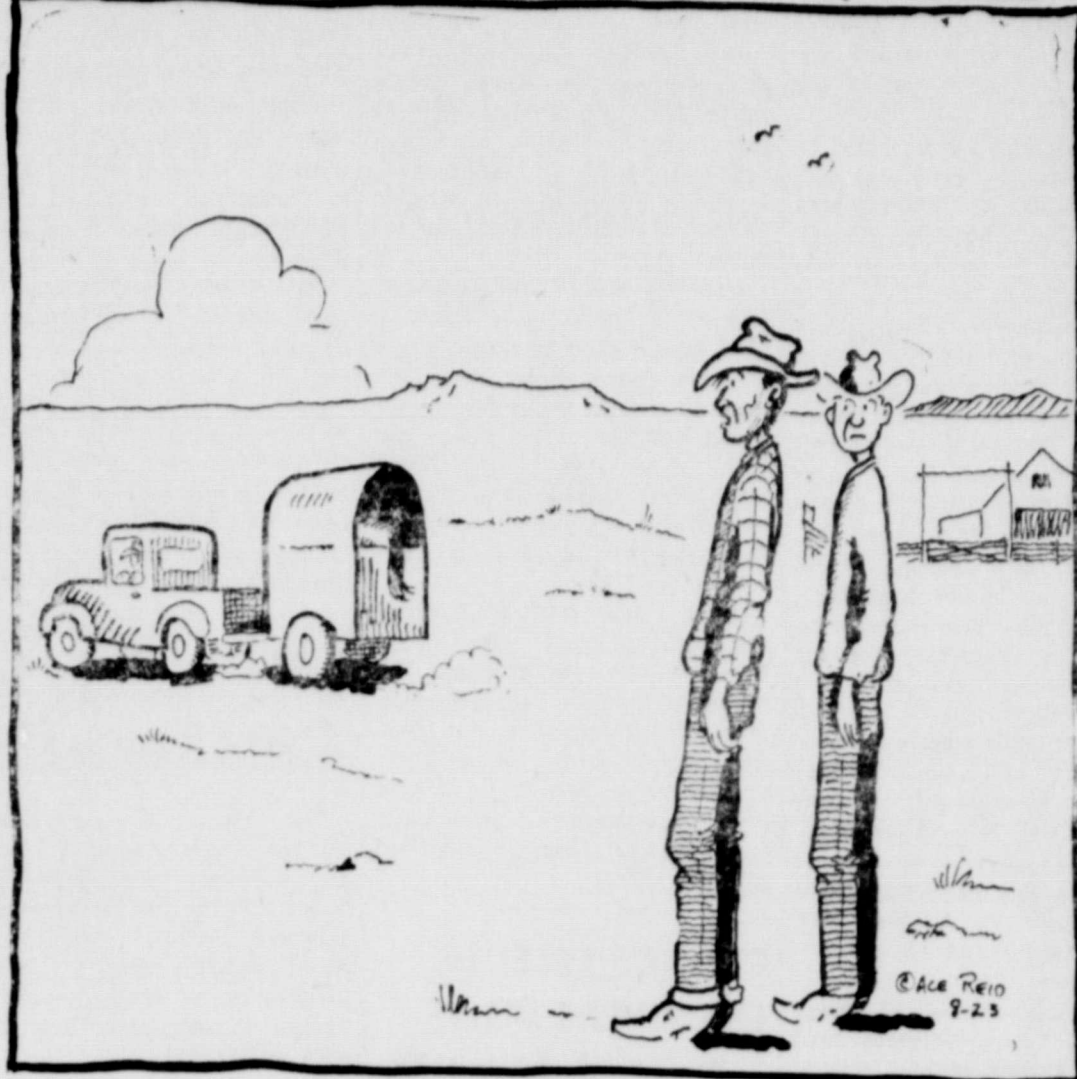

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—John Nance Garner advised new members of Congress, "You don't have to explain that which you never said."

Nowadays it seems everyone in public life thinks he has a few words of wisdom which the country is entitled to hear. It is called our "open society"—and thank goodness we have it.

On the other hand, our enemies must get comfort and, doubtless, a great benefit, from information we give them in public statements.

We have gotten to the point that it is demanded of the President, in televised news conference, that he discuss matters we once thought of as being classified in the interest of National security. Now, if he does not do so, he is accused of

not informing us. In Committees of the Congress, demands are made of military officials and others in sensitive positions to reveal highly secret information. A few years ago members of Congress on certain committees were privileged to high confidence but something has happened. The "something" is that a few—very few, which is too many—could hardly wait to see a newspaper reporter. What was supposed to be highly confidential statements were available in the press in the night edition.

This is our "open society" but how open should it be. While trying to let our own people know what is going on, the question of revealing so much to those who would destroy us, is the dilemma. Just having seen Pearl Harbor

after having been there during World War II, 27 years ago, is a reminder that the Japanese didn't send us a postal card advising they were going to attack our ships tied up at that port, the masts of some still showing above the water.

Should the Commander-in-Chief of the United States be required, either by the demands of some members of Congress or the news media to tell our enemies what we will do or not do on the battlefield?

We are in a "limited" war in Southeast Asia. We are faced with a festering war in the Middle East. We are threatened with the possibility of a war of global proportions by nations who have made clear their aim to dominate the world.

In the name of "tell-all" Hanoi is more comfortable to know exactly our intents.

Would their rulers be less comfortable if we had not ruled out air attacks on their vital installations? Would they not be less comfortable if we had not ruled out the destruction of the harbor of Haiphong and the bombing of the dikes holding back their mighty Red River?

Bit by bit, piece by piece, in official statements, in hearings before Congressional Committees, and particularly Senate inquiries, the enemy has been told the exact details of our plans.

Whether they are ever used or not, our options should be left open. The enemy has revealed none of his and we know little about them.

He acts without news conferences, interviews or global discussions.

He acts with a confidence that slowly but surely the United States will not use its power and that he can eventually be certain of victory.

In a declared war our free and open society has no hesitancy in invoking voluntary restraint on sources of information which might aid the enemy. In today's explosive world situation such voluntary restraints are no less desirable. It should be practiced by all who come into possession of sensitive information.

The best kept secret in our history was the development of the atomic bomb. More than \$2 billion dollars was laid out for its production. Only about a half dozen people really knew what it was all about.

We are living in a world of dictators and totalitarian governments who can part their hair on the other side tomorrow morning. We compete in literally a life and death atmosphere. To sum up, this deadly game not forever be successfully played with the cards face up on our side.

Misleading Insurance Ads Gets Social Security Warning

Some private insurance companies have been sending misleading advertisements to Medicare beneficiaries in the Central Texas area, according to Jack Calvert, Temple social security district manager, in an effort to sell them health insurance to supplement their Medicare protection.

Calvert said that the promotional literature distributed by these companies has been deliberately designed to give the reader the impression that the company is in some way connected with the Social Security Administration, or that it has access to the Federal agency's records.

One company used a window envelope that was almost identical to the envelopes social security uses to send out benefit checks, Calvert remarked. He went on to say that only careful reading of the fine print in the advertisement revealed the statement that the company was "not an agency of the

State or Federal government."

Calvert stressed that the Social Security Administration does not endorse any privately-sponsored insurance plan designed to "supplement" Medicare benefits. He also emphasized that private insurance companies do not have access to social security records, which are confidential by law.

Most private insurance programs supplementing Medicare offer valuable additional protection and advertise honestly in their sales literature. "However," Calvert said, "a few companies have engaged in practices which clearly are intended to mislead Medicare beneficiaries."

Persons who are confused by material they get in the mail offering additional Medicare protection should get in touch with their nearest social security office, or their State Insurance Commission for further information, Calvert concluded.
