Scattered moisture over the coun y has been most welcome, but The summer drouth stress has brought to light many problems on trees and shrubs that have previously lurked in the background.

Plants with diseased or damaged root systems can't absorb enough water and nutrients under summer drouth conditions to furnish all plant parts. When this happens, tips of branches die back and leaf tips are scorched. On some plants eaf shedding follows.

Several problems may be involved in producing given symptoms. but there is a general tendency to simplify diagnosis to a single castreatment may be disappointing if extended period of time and likewise, correction of that condition may require a longer period of time than desired.

Some conditions may be simply due to drouth stress, this is true particularly of trees and shrubs that are not completely established. Other causes may be due to

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
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

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
