Tigers Take Their Bumps, Lose 35-12 to Glen Rose

As was expected, Hico ran up against a formidable foe last week, and dropped a 35-12 decision to their counterparts, the Glen Rose Tigers.

A big second quarter spelled doom for the locals, with the home team putting 21 points on the board to take a commanding 28-0 lead into the dressing room at the half. But the Tigers didn't give up. They bounced back strong in the second stanza, and through the final two periods, the Tigers actually out-scored Glen Rose 12-7. Hico was on the Glen Rose one-foot line when the game ended.

Glen Rose jumped out front 7-0 midway of the initial period, going 66 yards in ten plays for the score. Hico didn't threaten in the first quarter.

Glen Rose started the second quarter onslaught by recovering a Hico fumble, and marching 55 yards in six plays to open the door. They followed with a punt return to the Tiger 28, and with the aid of a pass interference call, scored in three plays, upping the count to 20-0. Glen Rose used only one play, a 43-yard pass completion to score

Hico Man Has Lead Role In Community Theatre

Seven former Community Theater Willie Award winners, plus 13 actors and actresses taking their first roles with Community Theater, will open the group's 16th season at 8:15 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 17 at Wm. Edrington Scott Theater, Fort Worth, in Jean Anouilh's "Becket."

The play will have a total of eight performances. It will run through Saturday, Sept. 19, with a matinee performance at 3:15 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 20. During the second week of its run, curtain time will be 8:15 Wednesday through Saturday, Sept. 23 through 26.

Stars of the production are Dwain Fail, a junior at Texas Christian University, as Becket, and Dave Jarrott, popular KKOL radio disc jockey, as Henry. Fail's wife, Delena, will play the role of Becket's mistress, Gwendolyn. This will be her first role for Community Theater, however, she played opposite her husband in the Cisco Junior

College production "Camelot." Fail is also a newcomer to Community Theater circles. He is a drama major, and starred in Camelot at Cisco Junior College.

Director William Garber has a cast of 27 in the production. The play was first produced in New York in 1961 with Anthony Quinn as Becket and Laurence Olivier as Henry II. It was later made into a movie, produced by Hal Wallis, and starred Richard Burton as Becket and Peter O'Toole as Henry.

A dramatic conflict between two strong men, the play concerns the tragic relationship of two close friends and towers of British thought who changed the course of English history.

Fail is a graduate of Hico High School, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Fail. He is also the grandson of Mrs. Vada Fail.

Road Will Be Widened From Hico To Bosque Co. Line

Glen L. Beckner, Resident Engineer for the Texas Highway Department at Hamilton, has announced that the Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 6 in Hamilton County from the East City Limits of Hico to the Bosque County line, a distance of approximately 2.5 miles.

The improvement will consist of the reconstruction of grading, structures and surfacing. The contemplated location for the proposed project follows the existing highway facility.

Additional right of way of 120 feet minimum width will be required throughout the project, but no re-locations will be involved.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office in Hamilton. Also, the drawings have been placed on file with the County Judge, and with the Central Texas Council of Governments in Belton.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for the highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before Oct. 2, 1970. In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.
