## Fire Truck Fund Still \$3,000 Short of Total Needed

Hico Fire Chief Eddie Mote said this week that the department would be forced to go to the bank and borrow the additional funds needed to finish paying for the new rural truck, which arrived here two weeks ago.

Mote said that a total of \$7,415.72 had been contributed in the long campaign, and that \$2,995.36 was still needed to retire the full cost of the truck. The new equipment cost \$10,411.08.

Mote said that he hoped a year-end flourish of funds would be received, and that the indebtedness could be paid off as soon as possible.

A campaign to secure funds with which to purchase the new truck was started last February, and got off to a slow start with only \$879 contributed the first month. However, a printed letter with return envelope was sent to all residents in the area, and the fund gained momentum until the past three months when contributions dwindled to almost nothing.

Members of the department have issued an appeal to every person in this area to consider the project for what it is, and send in their contributions as soon as possible.

## Leslie Patterson Takes Oath as Commissioner Of Precinct 3

Leslie Patterson, who won nomination as Precinct 3 Commissioner in the May Democratic Primary, assumed those duties Wednesday morning after taking the oath of office from County Judge Herman Standifer. Others present at the ceremony were County Clerk Genevieve Clark, Commissioners J. R. Hayes, Bob Adams, and Charles Coston.

Patterson succeeds Mrs. Fred Rainwater, who has been commissioner since late January of 1969 when she was appointed by Judge Standifer to serve the unexpired term of her late husband. The appointment was to be effective until the next general election, which was Tuesday of this week. Mrs. Rainwater was the first lady in history to serve as a Hamilton County Commissioner.

Patterson won nomination to the post over two other candidates in the May primary. His present term of office is for the 2-years remaining on the original four-year term of office.

# 358 Cast Ballots

Hico voters, as well as those over the state, stumped the experts by turning out at the polls Tuesday in far greater numbers than had been anticipated, and endorsed all Democratic candidates, and also put their stamp of approval on only one of the seven Constitutional Amendments. Only amendment to carry the local box was No. 1, which called for retirement or removal from office of Judges and

Justices of the Peace.

A total of 358 voters cast ballots in the local box.

State-wide, the story was the same, with voters endorsing all Democratic nominees.

With final tabulations incomplete, it appeared that voters over the state favored five of the amendments, including the controversial Open Saloon bill that will enable "wet" areas to vote on serving

liquor by the drink.

In the Hico box, voters cast their ballots as follows on the amendments:

1. Judges retirement: 169 for, 118 against.

2. Liquor by the drink: 84 for, 261 against.

3. Farm assessments: 131 for, 191 against.

4. Building commission: 99 for, 168 against.

5. Road Bonds: 116 for, 165 against.

6. Homestead exemptions: 133 for, 170 against.

7. Consolidating offices: 101 for, 169 against.

Other tallies from the local box showed the following results:

U. S. Senator: Lloyd Bentsen 233, George Bush 117.

Governor: Preston Smith 218, Paul Eggers 132.

Lt. Governor: Ben Barnes 250, Bryon Fullerton 90.

Attorney General: Crawford Martin 259, Edward Yturri 70.

## Housing Project Bids Will Be Asked

Notice of final disposition of the Hico Housing Authority's request to construct 30 low-rent units here was received by Executive Director Bennell Jernigan and Mayor O. L. Davis this week.

Advertisement for bids on the 30-unit project is to be made within the next 30 days. After bids are received, a 30-day waiting period will be required, and

following that period, another 60-day delay will be necessary before actual construction may begin.

Mayor Davis was optimistic about an early Spring construction start, possibly in March.

The latest order assures that the project will be carried out. The units will be located on former railroad right-of-way, and Civic Club property located on Highway 220.

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

## On the Home Range

Pasta, macaroni products that include macaroni, noodles and spaghetti, is an "easy" food — easy to use, easy to digest and easy on the pocketbook.

Pasta products are distinguished from one another by their shape. Spaghetti is always rod-shaped but it can vary in thickness. The thinnest spaghetti is called vermicelli. Macaroni is usually hollow and tubular, unless shapped as bows, shells or rooster crests.

Noodles, the only pasta product made from dough containing eggs, are always flat and ribbon-like but vary in widths.

Most macaroni products are made from durum wheat—a very hard, amber colored wheat. The highest quality pastas include products made from durum semolina, but the mixture most commonly used includes durum semolina, farina and flour.

Pasta made from softer flours will not have the nutty flavor, bright yellow color or characteristic firmness after cooking as durum pasta has. The product instead is gray-colored and starchy tasting. Check the labels to insure a quality product made with durum semolina.

Well cooled pasta is tender, firm and not sticky. A small amount of oil added to the cooking water will prevent stickiness and foaming while boiling. A basic rule is for every ounce of pasta to be cooked, use a cup of water. Also one-fourth cup of uncooked pasta will double in volume when cooked.

Macaroni is done if it breaks easily when pressed against the side of the pot and isn't mushy. Although package directions still say to wash noodles after cooking, it is not necessary with semolina products. Washing only results in loss of nutrients. If the pasta is tacky after draining, add a little fat or butter.

Eighty-five percent of the macaroni products on today's market are enriched with thiamine, riboflavin, niacin and iron. Check the label since many of the convenient macaroni items do not use enriched pasta.

Pasta products are one of the most versatile foods on the market. They may be served for every course, as an appetizer, salad entrée, vegetable, and even dessert. Dieters may also include pasta at mealtime; there are only 70 calories in one-half cup of macaroni. It is the rich sauces added to macaroni that makes the dish high in calories.

**ANSWER:** Your friend is wrong. If you have a record of your social security number, we can issue you a duplicate card in about three days. Get an application Form SS-5 from the Post Office, complete and mail it to our office, being sure to show your original social security number. If you don't show your old number, or to make an application for a new card, it will take about 14 days to get your card. But—most important of all—a person should never have more than one social security number.



This hasn't been the best fall for crop harvesting and since many

cotton farmers save seed from the current crop for planting, some problems could arise.

When cotton opens during wet weather there is some danger that free fatty acid may develop in the seed. It can be determined by cutting seed and observing the color of the meat in the seed. If the seed has a brown color then care must be exercised in handling the seed.

Seed can be damaged if it is stored overnight on a trailer at a moisture content of over 12 per-



cent, or if it is left on the trailer on the gin lot during rush ginning periods.

Harvesting should be delayed in the morning until the relative humidity at boll height is 60 percent or less. It's better to eat an early lunch and start the stripper around 11 a.m. than to rush the job. Next year's planting seed should be saved from afternoon harvested cotton.

The dove season is now over, and was very successful in terms of income from out of county hunting and quality hunting. Quail, duck and deer season is just around the corner.

To keep the hunting season happy I would like to suggest that all hunters become familiar with the ten commandments of safety before starting on the first hunt and make sure they are obeyed while in the field.

The commandments are: Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the cardinal rule of gun safety.

Guns carried into camp or home must always be unloaded, and taken down or have the action open; guns should always be left in their case until reaching the hunting area.

Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.

Carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you should stumble. Keep the safety on until you are ready to fire.

Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.

Never point a gun at anything you don't intend to shoot.

Unattended guns should be un-

loaded; guns and ammunition should be stored safely beyond the reach of children and careless adults.

Never climb a tree or through a fence with a loaded gun.

Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water.

Do not mix gunpowder and alcohol.

These are simple rules and they

are easy to follow. Following them could save your life or that of a hunting companion, or even a member of the family.

## Make Long-Distance Dialing Easier With These Tips

There are lots of ways to make long-distance telephone calls easier. District Manager Tom Venable of Gulf State-United Telephone Co. points out that area residents can assist the local operators in the following ways so that they can complete long distance faster:

Give the operator the area code and the number being called.

Tell her the name of the called party if you are placing a person-to-person call.

Wait until the operator asks for your number. During the slight pause, she is dialing the number you are calling. She will then ask for your number and by the time you have given the number to her, your called party should be answering his phone.

Be sure and give the operator

your complete number of seven digits. This will cause less lost time and will deter errors in billing. If you repeat only the last five digits, there is no designation as to what community the caller resides. Also, when the caller starts dictating the numbers, the operator places the first number spoken in to the first letter space of the toll ticker. Having to go back and change it, or ask the customer more questions, delays the call and often irritates the caller.

"Helping us in these areas will aid us in helping the customer to make a quicker call," Mr. Venable said.
