## Byron McClellan Appointed District Judge; Leslie Vance Is New District Attorney

District Attorney Byron L. McClellan of Gatesville was appointed last Thursday to become the 52nd Judicial District Judge, succeeding Judge Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton.

The appointment was announced by Governor Preston Smith.

At the same time, Gov. Smith appointed Leslie B. Vance of Clifton to succeed McClellan as District Attorney.

Judge Roberts will vacate the bench January 1 when he moves to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Both McClellan's and Vance's appointments are good until the general election in 1972.

McClellan, 52, is a native of Gatesville and received his law degree from Baylor University. He was in private law practice until August, 1961, when he was named District Attorney.

He is a member of the Gatesville Lions Club, the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the First Baptist Church.

He has served as president of the Coryell County and 52nd Judicial District Bar Associations.

Mr. Vance is the son of Mrs. Mary Belle Vance and the late L. B. Vance of Bloomfield, Missouri. He attended public school there and graduated from Bloomfield High School.

He received his undergraduate and pre-law education at Southeast Missouri State College and Texas Christian University, and received his Juris Doctor of law degree from Baylor University in 1965.

Mr. Vance has practiced law in Bosque County for five and a half years, living in Meridian for three years before moving to Clifton. He was elected County Attorney in Bosque County and has served in this office for two years.

Prior to entering law school, Mr. Vance gained valuable experience as a member of the Tarrant County Criminal District Attorney's staff in Fort Worth, where he worked as an investigator for several months after finishing his undergraduate college work.

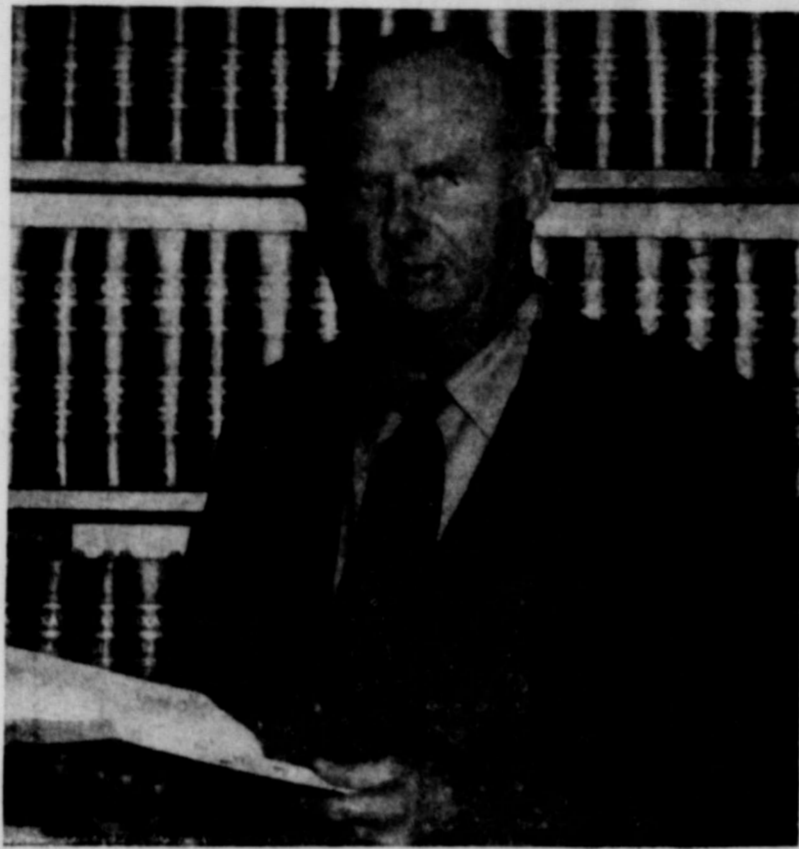
In a statement following the Governor's appointment, Vance said: "I am very pleased and honored that the Governor has appointed me to this position. I am vitally interested in it, and have actively sought it. I intend to work for and represent the people of this district to the very best of my ability, and I also plan to seek election by the residents of this district to a full term as District Attorney at the next regular election. I hope to get to meet as many people as possible in all the counties in this district, but I realize that with an average of about 9,500 square miles in each of the four counties and the work load of this office, there will not be a lot of time for visiting."

Mr. Vance and his wife, the former Barbara Louise Berglund of Fort Worth, have two children, Kathryn, 5½, and Byron, 2½. They reside at 404 N. Ave. Q in Clifton.

carry out our responsibilities by healing the hurts of others, relieve the loneliness of others and recapture the joy of sharing with others."

In closing Rev. Malphrus said "Let us not think of what we are getting this Christmas but how we can share what we have with others."

Concluding the meeting refreshments were served in the cafeteria.

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### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The Coryell County Pecan Association is holding its annual Pecan Show December 10, 11 and 12 at the civic room of the National Bank in Gatesville. Pecan producers from Hamilton County have been invited to enter pecan varieties in this show.

Each year, up to a million credit cards are lost and 300,000 are stolen. To protect a consumer plagued by disappearing credit cards, Congress has passed a new law that will be effective January 23rd.

The new law states that an individual will not be liable for any loss from unauthorized use of his card after he has reported its disappearance to the issuer. Notice may be by telephone or by letter. Most companies will cancel use of the card once they have been notified. If the notice is by letter, cancellation is effective the day the letter is postmarked. For losses occurring before notification liability is limited to \$50.

The \$50 liability applies separately to each card that is lost. So, if a billfold or purse containing five credit cards is misplaced, the potential maximum liability is a total of \$250. If a husband and wife lose their cards on a joint account, however, the total liability is limited to \$50.

The new law also prohibits firms from mailing out unrequested credit cards. Companies must inform the user of his rights and potential liabilities, plus they must assume the legal burden of paying for liabilities the card holder may suffer.

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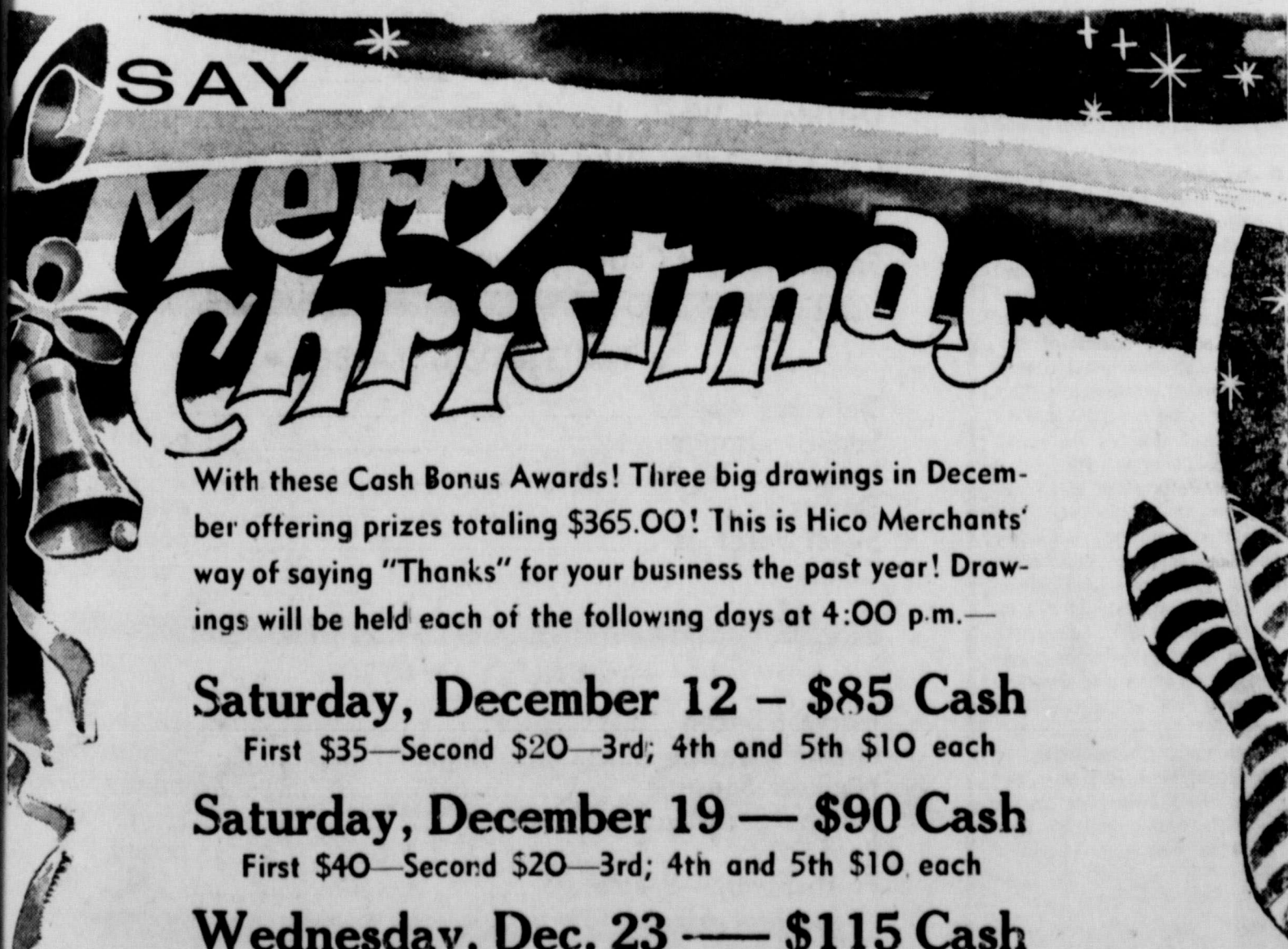

## On the Home Range

Be just as careful with your credit cards as you are with your cash, especially during the holidays. Know how to take care of the cards and what to do if you lose them.

Credit cards are used instead of money to buy goods and services, and cards are accepted as payment without other proof of identification. The person whose name is on the credit card gets the bill.

One way you can help protect yourself from credit card losses is to be sure you get your card back after you use it and then put it away safely in your wallet or purse.

Never keep credit cards you don't intend to use. Inform the bank, store or oil company to close the account. Before discarding a credit card, cut it into pieces. Don't throw away a credit card without first making it impossible for someone to use it.

If you lose a credit card, immediately inform the company that issued it. A good idea is to keep a list of all numbers of the family's credit cards in a safe place—not in a wallet. If a card is lost, the information needed to identify the card is available and the account can be stopped immediately.

Americans are paying more money every year because of the illegal use of credit cards. Some estimates of this loss go as high as 50 million dollars, with up to a million credit cards lost and three hundred thousand stolen annually.

Washington, D.C.—For the past several months numerous complaints have been received about mail service.

The United States Post Office exists for one purpose and that is to provide prompt and dependable mail service.

Mail service has obviously deteriorated in all parts of the nation but it seems that the area served by the Dallas Regional Office, which covers 5 states, has especially been chosen for an experimental plan. The plan includes the elimination of window service on Saturday, curtailment of distributing mail to boxes on weekends, elimination of parcel post delivery on weekends, drastic cuts in collection services—all of which have resulted in a slowdown in deliveries.

It should be pointed out that the local Postmaster is not at fault. The Post Office Administration in Washington has ordered the cut-backs through the Regional Office. The policy indicates that individual Postmasters are granted a certain amount of discretion in implementing changes in service and personnel practices but that discretion has not been broad enough to permit an operation which would not only be cheaper but provide better service.

One glaring example of the inadequacy of these tests programs is what is referred to as "managed mail processing program." This is designed to replace the old system of sorting letters at the point where they are mailed. Mail that previously could travel overnight to virtually any place in the nation now takes from three to five days and particularly if the mail travels less than 750 miles. In some instances it would appear that deliveries could be made more quickly by pony express.

When the policy of the Post Of-

fice Department was inaugurated, it was alleged that there could be expected substantial cuts in cost. From investigations it appears that such is not the case. As a matter of fact investigators from the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee report that the experimental system in Texas is actually resulting in added costs. They found for example that first class mail from California destined for El Paso is airlifted to Fort Worth, 600 miles further east, where it is then dispatched to El Paso—a total of 1200 miles in additional transportation costs.

In instances, newspapers require up to three days for delivery 10 miles distance from the mailing point. The elimination of window services has precluded patrons from purchasing stamps. In many places vending machines are often left empty or broken.

In some places banks are having trouble in check returns because of insufficient funds due to mail delays.

Added to this experiment is the fact that train service has also been curtailed. Mail service is not handled over long distances with the efficiency which the railroads once provided. Truck-hauled mail has provided additional service in recent years to places and people who had not had the deserved service until this type of transportation was provided. The abandonment of once-used rail facilities, however, has been the cause of some slowdowns. Mail which cannot be dispatched from the collecting point simply waits until there is room for it, which may be a matter of days.

The Congress has voted to create a Government-owned corporation with the authority to impose a \$40 billion indebtedness on the Government for handling our mails. There is little doubt that the price of post-

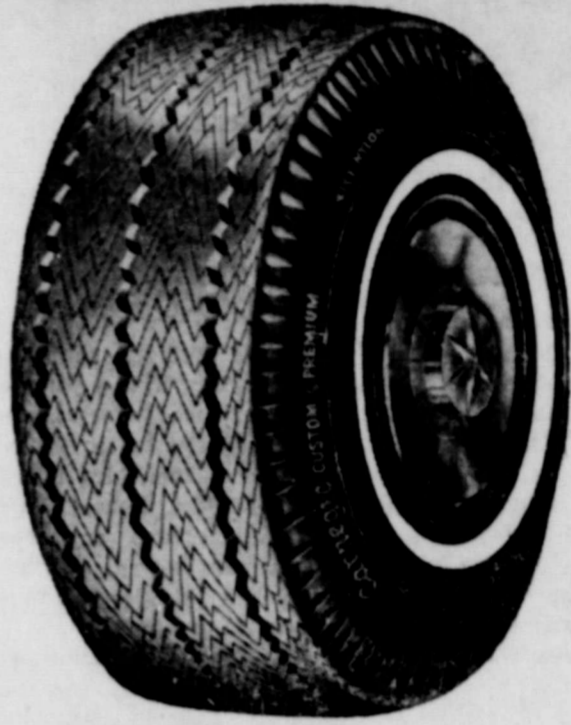

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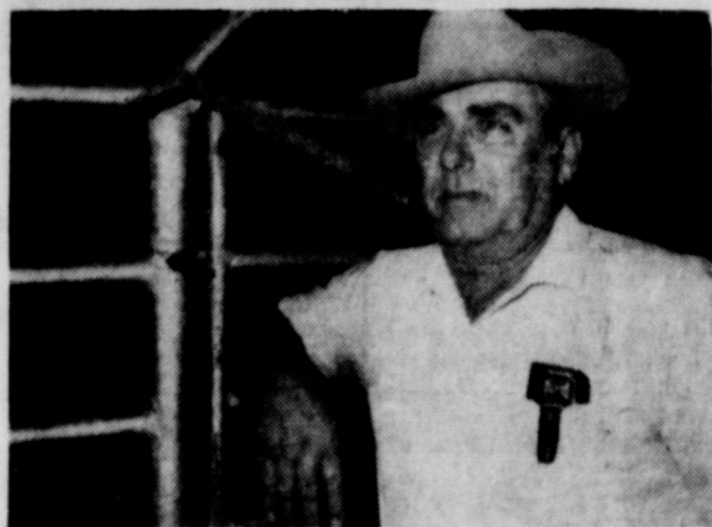

**Questions & Answers**

**QUESTION:** I've been getting my social security since I was 64. I was told that after I drew benefits for 12 years, that my benefits would be increased. I'm now 77 years old. Please tell me if I can get more now that the 12-year period is up.

**ANSWER:** I'm sorry, but there is no provision for increasing a person's monthly checks when they took reduced benefits before age 65. I'm sure that our representative, in explaining to you the effect it would have on your benefits by taking reduced benefits before you were 65. As a general rule, a person is dollars ahead for the first 12 years that they receive benefits by taking their reduced benefits before age 65. If a person lives longer than the 12-year period then they will actually receive less in total dollars than if they had waited until age 65 to start getting their benefits. The decision to take reduced benefits or not is the choice and election of the claimant. We do not advise a person to take reduced benefits but in many cases, they are ahead in benefits, as explained above.
