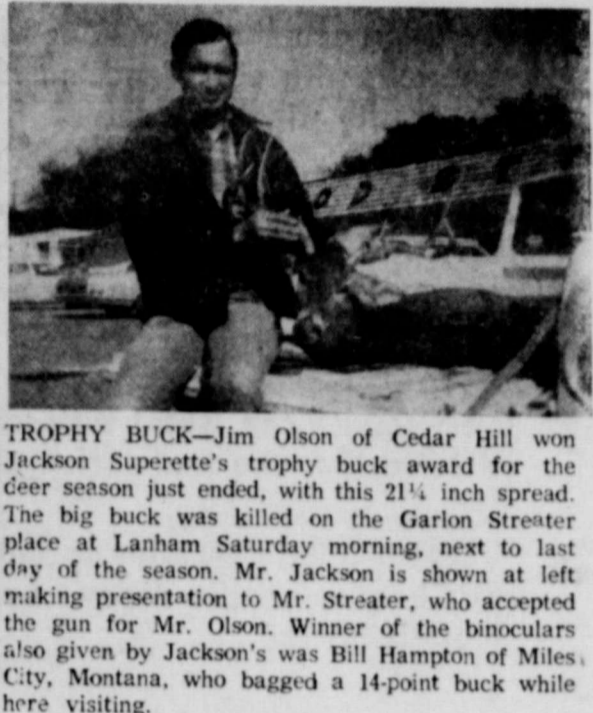

Supreme Court Member—

Judge Roberts Takes Oath

(Spl.)—Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton, presiding judge and District Judge Ernest Belcher of Dallas, presiding judge of the 52nd Judicial District for the past 10 years, became a member of the state's highest court in public ceremonies at the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals on Monday, Jan. 5. Judge Roberts was elected in 1970 to replace Judge Ernest Belcher of Dallas, who retired. Judge K. K. Woodley presided at the ceremonial session, and Judge Harrell of Dallas, president of the State Bar of Texas, made opening remarks and introduced Judge Woodley administered the oath to Judge Roberts. Judge Roberts, 53, was born in Crawford and attended public schools and at Abilene.

Following Army service during World War II, where he rose from private to captain, Roberts did undergraduate work at Baylor University and graduated from Baylor Law School in 1949. He was admitted to the Texas Bar the same year. He practiced law at Hico and Hamilton before his appointment in 1950 as County Attorney. In 1956, he was elected District Attorney of the 52nd District since his appointment in 1961.

Roberts was president of the District and County Attorneys Association of Texas in 1960.

He currently is a member of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council, and in 1967-68, he was chairman of the State Bar of Texas Judicial Section. Roberts is a member of several key committees of the State Bar, including the committee on the Revision of the Penal Code, committee on Pattern Jury Instructions, and the Bar-News Conference Committee on Fair Trial and Free Press. He also is a member of the State Senate's Advisory Committee on Youth Affairs.

Judge Roberts is active in the Methodist Church. He is a member of the official board of the church and teaches a Sunday School Class. He is married to the former Gloria Stevens of Valley Mills, and they are parents of two children, Robyn and Tracy.

She also reminded residents of the current Voter Registration period, which ends January 31.

The tax collector designated the News Review as an agent to assist with registration in the Hico area. Another agent or two will be named later.

Only elections facing voters this year are the city and school, with a possibility of one or more special elections.

A new wrinkle has been added to registration this year, following a Supreme Court ruling that 18-year-olds would be eligible to vote in Federal elections.

County tax collectors have been notified that registration certificates should be issued to applicants 18 years above and those who will be 18 by March 1, 1972.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., chief state election officer, has sent out instructions for implementing the U.S. Supreme Court order giving 18-year-olds the right to vote in federal elections.

Certificates issued to those under 21 will be labeled for "federal elections only until 21 years of age." Same document will contain birthdate so it can be used for state and local elections after applicant turns 21.

Public Hearing Set Monday On Cotton Acreage Transfer

The Hamilton County ASC Committee has called a public meeting for Monday, Jan. 11 in the District Courtroom on the subject of transferring cotton either by sale or lease from this county. It is most important that all cotton producers and businessmen attend this meeting that they may express their opinion on this important decision to be made by the county committee. In all fairness to all cotton producers and other interested people, the County Committee wants the producers to voice their opinion that they carry out the desires of the producers of the county.

Prior to this year this decision has been determined by referendum in which all cotton producers had the privilege to vote on. The vote in prior years is as follows: 1967—87 for, 310 against; 1968—60 votes for, 197 against; 1969—95 votes for, 224 against; 1970—78 for, 236 against.

1971 Farm Programs.
At the public hearing, the first item on the agenda will be an explanation of 1971 farm programs presented by a representative of the State Committee. The entire program will conclude within one to 1 1/2 hours.

Also at the meeting the County Committee will give all available information for the 1971 ACP including allocation per man, sign-up date, and general provisions of the program.

Signs of the Times.
On December 31, 1970 Mrs. Golda Van Winkle concluded her work as an employee of the Hamilton County Committee. Mrs. Van Winkle has been employed in the county office for the past 13 years. She began work in January 1958. The County Committee had been able

to obtain extensions of time up until Dec. 31. Reason for this action which was caused by the State Committee was due to workload. All personnel in all counties who have been working under limited appointment have been released. During her tenure, Mrs. Van Winkle has rendered invaluable service to farmers and ranchers of the county. Farmers are indeed losing an employee who has been very faithful and very understanding of their problems. The personnel and County Committee regret the action which was requested and demanded.

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The Hamilton County Junior Livestock Show is just a little over one week away, and it promises to be a good one in respect to quality and also in quantity in most departments.

Youngsters are reminded that the entry deadline is Friday, January 8. All entries should be submitted

by this date so that classes can be set up and the show planned.

The Livestock Association has been working hard to line up the show and support for the show has been excellent. I would like to say thanks to everyone who has contributed time or funds toward this project. Support for activities such as this makes working in Hamilton County a pleasure.

I hope that everyone will take time to come out and see the show, January 15 and 16.

With current soil moisture and grazing situations not so good, supplemental feeding of the beef herd is likely to be mighty important during the next few months.

Cattlemen should be able to save

both time and money by feeding protein supplement twice a week rather than each day.

Texas A&M University tests have shown that cattle fed protein supplement twice a week performed just as well as those fed each day. The result from the twice weekly feeding was about 60 percent saving in labor and travel. This method of feeding doesn't necessarily mean feeding less supplement, just feeding less frequently.

During the cold winter months cattle need plenty of forage for the production of body heat. A low quality forage that is high in fiber is a good feed for storm periods, because of the high body heat generated from digesting the fiber in the roughage.

A well fed cow can withstand low temperatures. Researchers say the critical temperature is just above the point at which cattle begin to shiver. A cow on a fasting diet, or without any feed, reaches a critical temperature at about 55 degrees F. A maintenance ration lowers the critical temperature to about 23 degrees. With an increase in feed consumption, the critical temperature is well below zero.

Wet hair and wind velocity raise the critical temperature drops and thus increase the amount of feed required for body heat production by the animal.

Good dividends can be expected if the cattle are well fed during the winter stress months.

Social Security

Questions & Answers

QUESTION: I would like to know if a person has to work right up to the time they reach retirement age to get social security benefits. What if I decide to retire at age 62.

ANSWER: No, it is not necessary for a person to work right up to the time they retire and file for social security retirement benefits. If a person retires from social security jobs before they are 60 years of age, then the amount of their social security benefits will be reduced since the amount is based on the person's working lifetime, except for five years of no work, or low earnings, which can be dropped from the computation. Naturally, if a person works right up to age 65, then they may have some low years of earnings several years back that can be dropped and this would increase their benefit. But the retiring person can retire at any age and still be eligible to their social security benefits, just so they have the minimum amount of work-time on social security jobs.
