Deadline Near For Voter Registration

It's later than you think. And if you haven't already done so, better hop to and register before the January 31st deadline if you want to take part in any election during the year.

Local people were registering in greater numbers than was first expected, with 128 being recorded at the Hico sub-station through mid-morning Wednesday. This figure does not include the number who have previously registered with the tax collector.

A small bit of history was also recorded here this week, when the first 18-year-old was registered. Miss Johnette Walker, Hico High School Senior, was the first to register under the new law which allows 18-year-olds to vote in Federal elections. Another under-ager was also registered here, when Rusty Cryer, 19, completed a registration form. At present time, the

under 21's have nothing to vote on during the year.

Two elections are already forthcoming, with the City and School balloting heading up the slate. Rumblings from the infant session of the State Legislature indicate that a special Constitutional Amendment election will also be held in early summer. Four amendments have already been proposed, and more are likely to come up at a later date.

Local residents will be able to register at the News Review office through Saturday, and at the County Court House through Friday. The courthouse is closed on Saturdays. Or they may mail in their applications, just so long as they are post-marked no later than January 31.

Hico's Boys Streak Toward Coq Title With Two Victories

Hico boy's basketball team took two more steps toward an unblemished district record by recording one-sided victories over Jonesboro and Iredell. The girl's team played only one game the past week, and were victorious 43 to 28 over Jonesboro.

The boys held a hot hand in the Jonesboro game, ripping the cords for 63 points and giving up only 38. They were even more proficient in the Iredell game, racing to a 73 to 45 win.

Iredell isn't fielding a high school girls team this year, and Hico Junior High and Iredell Juniors furnished the second game, Hico winning 43 to 34.

The Hico teams host Cranfills Gap Friday night, and close out district play on Friday, February 5 at Evant.

Education, Pollution, Drugs, Crime Cited in Student Talk

"Uncle Sam's Delicate Condition" was delivered to the Hico High and Junior High students and faculty by Ed Daniel Thursday morning. Representing the Cen-Tex Schools Student Assemblies on American Heritage, Mr. Daniel is assistant director of the MacArthur Academy, Howard Payne College.

Emphasizing the importance of education, Daniel challenged the Hico youth to prepare for the future. He quickly pointed out that not all students were college material and they should not all plan to attend college. He noted the value of technical school in learning and obtaining a vocation that could be useful throughout life. Connally Tech at Waco was cited as an example.

"The number one problem facing today's young people is that of drug abuse," stated Daniel. Using marijuana, the weakest of the drugs, as an example, the speaker emphasized that marijuana restricted the flow of blood to the brain, causing sluggishness and inability to make concise decisions. He warned the group that the major problem of drugs was the result of the malformed children born to drug users.

Discussing pollution, the speaker asked the students to observe the sky, looking straight up they would notice the sky very blue on a clear day, but from a distance a grayish brown haze hovered close to the horizon. Daniel named bodies of

water that have no life in them due to large factories dumping their waste products in the water. One of these, the Houston Ship Channel, was given a funeral by Houston youth signifying the great loss to the city.

The crime rate of America was discussed with the group. Daniel noted that Americans considered themselves a Christian nation; however, the largest crime rate in the world is in the United States. Explaining his point further, Daniel said that every 40 minutes a murder is committed in the U.S.; every 19 minutes, a rape; every 3 minutes an armed robbery; every 2 minutes a beating; and every 20 seconds, a burglary.

To help overcome these problems, America has a voice in the government of this country, Daniel noted. That voice comes through voting, he continued. "If you don't

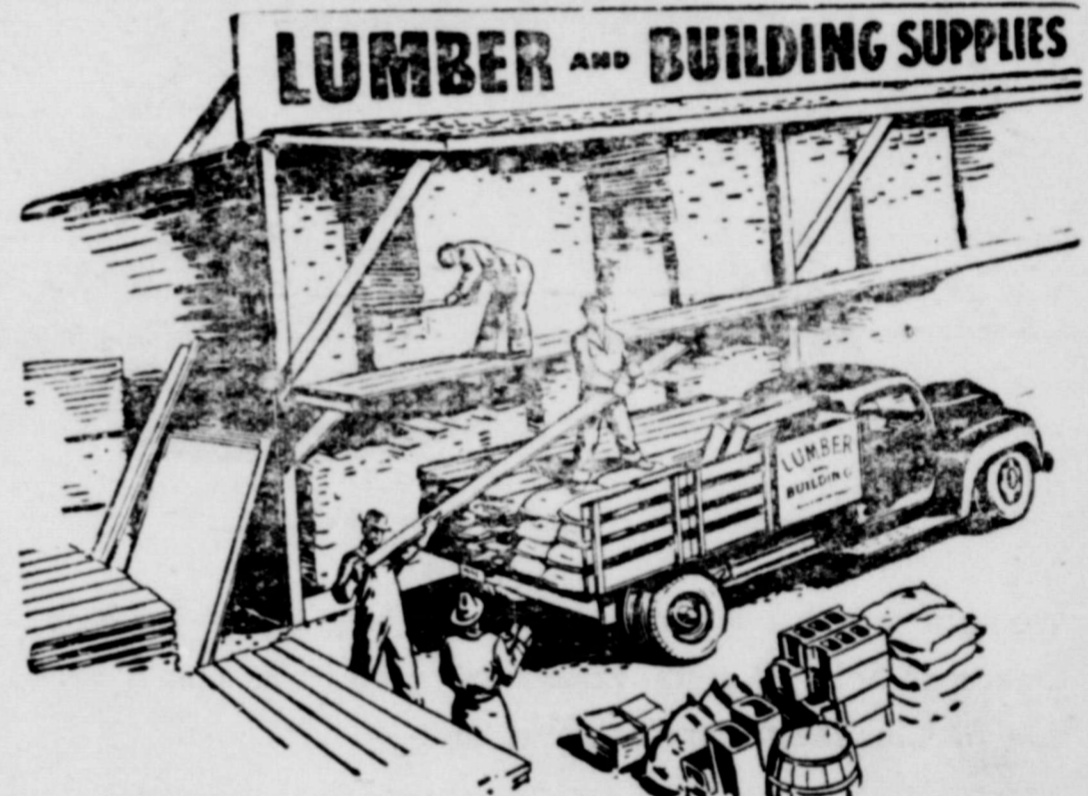

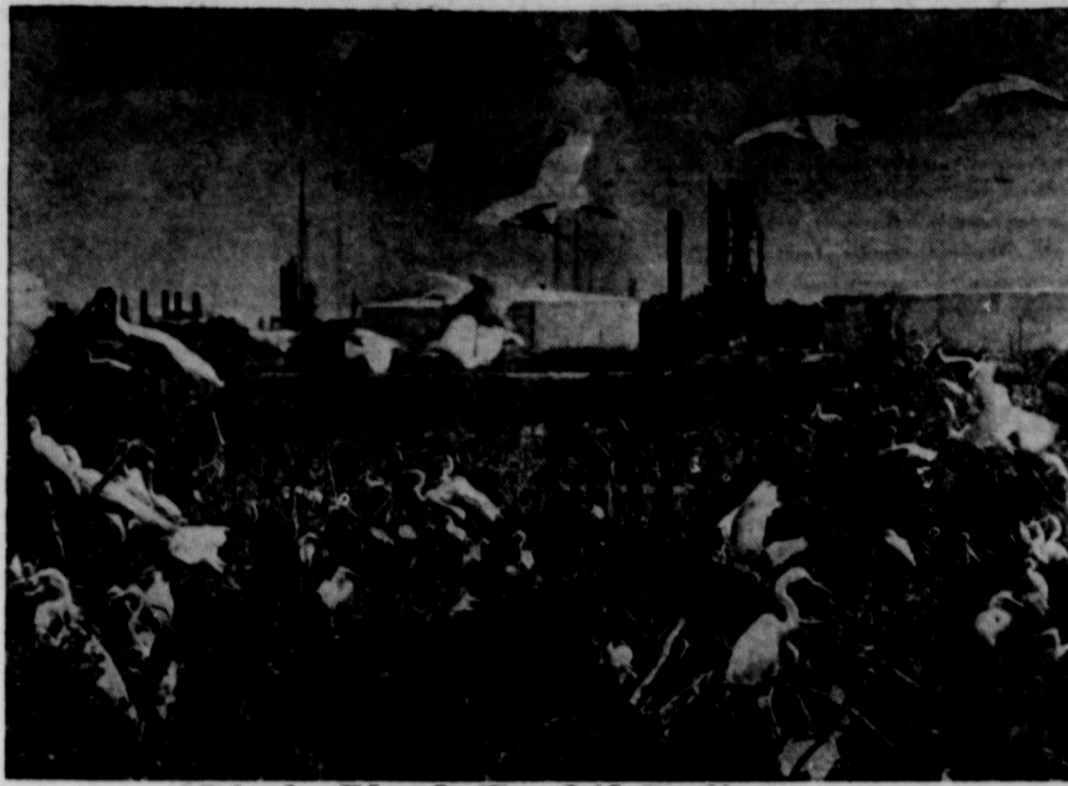
10 YEARS AGO

Hundreds of cranes, egrets and herons flock each year to a 380-acre lagooning system at Humble Oil & Refining Co.'s refinery at Baytown, Tex. The lagoons were built several years ago as the final stage of an extensive water treatment system designed to remove impurities from the refinery's waste water. The refinery lagoons and surrounding vegeta-

tion have become an unofficial bird sanctuary for many types of birds, including numerous roseate spoonbills, a pink-feathered bird now considered an endangered species by the American Audubon Society. Many birds spend nine to ten months at the refinery, migrating farther south only during the severe winter months.

Social Security

Questions & Answers
By JACK CALVERT

Question: I know people who draw Social Security are required to notify you if they have over \$1,680.00 income in a year. My question is what counts on this \$1,680.00 limit? How about interest?

Answer: Only earned income counts on the \$1,680.00 limit. This means earnings from working on a job for wages, or net profit from operating a trade or business. This does include net profit from running a farm or ranch. Other types of income do not count on this Social Security earnings limit—or "retirement test," as it is called. Rent, interest, stock dividends, or other pensions or benefits do not count, and have no bearing on your Social Security checks. A person who receives Social Security checks, is under age 72 all of the year, and has earned income of more than \$1,680.00 in the year, is required to notify the Social Security office by April 15th after the year's end.

On the Home Range

By BERNADETTE KOLAR

I will be meeting with the Hamilton County Home Demonstration Clubs during February and presenting the method demonstration on "Sewing Notions for the Knit Fabric." The schedule of clubs and dates are as follows: Littleville, Feb. 5; Blue Ridge, Feb. 17; South Hico, Feb. 18.

Visitors are always welcome to attend a Home Demonstration Club meeting.

Hamilton 4-H Club will hold their regular meeting on Feb. 1 at 7 p.m. in the Lions Youth Center. A program on "4-H Club Work" will be presented by the Extension Agents. Plans are to show slides and have group discussions on what makes an effective local 4-H Club program. Also how to adopt these guidelines to individual clubs, will be discussed.

Both Bill McCutcheon, County Agriculture Agent, and I plan to present this same program at the West Point, Hico and Pottsville 4-H Clubs later in the month of Feb.

Humidity, as well as temperature, contributes to a comfortable home environment. Most of us work best and are more comfortable in air that contains 35 to 40 percent relative humidity. During winter, when homes depend on heating systems, the air inside may become dry enough to cause damage to furnishings. Wallpaper may peel or crack, furniture warps, cracks or becomes unglued and the piano may be out of tune often.

People are also susceptible to dry air. Touching metal objects produces static shock, and nasal passages feel dry. Also, one may feel cold even when the room temperature is high.

To increase the relative humidity, place pans of water near heating units or in the furnace. Open doors and windows occasionally to ventilate the rooms. In extreme cases of low humidity, a commercial humidifier may be used.

See how they run is the frustrating slogan for many panty hose wearers. But help may be on the way, when it comes to the hosiery market.

The major hose makers plan to adopt standardized charts before

the winter season is over. Eventually, any woman who knows her correct weight and height can count on a proper fit.

Hose producers also speculate that uniform sizing will prevent runs that often result in ill-fitting hose.

To insure good performance for hosiery now on the market, proper care is important. Care begins with care of feet and legs. Rough heels or toenails that are too long can snag or run your hose.

Launder hose often, using mild soap suds and rinsing well. Roll in a towel and gently squeeze to remove excess water. To dry, hang hose on a smooth rod or use clothes pin-type hangers. Double back legs over the rods to prevent stretching from weight of the water.

To launder by machine, use the gentle or delicate wash cycle. It is wise to use a nylon mesh bag to hold panty hose. Never use chlorine bleach.

den" has the best and most concise explanation of how to use mulches and compost in a garden that he has ever seen.

"The leaflet explains how mulches cushion falling raindrops which reduces soil loss and soil compaction," Harris said. "Mulches keep soil cool in the summer, conserving moisture. They also furnish food for earthworms which are valuable for aerating the soil. Organic matter added by mulches helps keep soil crumbly and easy to work."

Harris said some mulches are more valuable if composted before using. The new publication shows how to build a simple compost bin out of wire or boards and is complete with drawings and pictures. The leaflet lists the number of cupsful of various kinds of fertilizer, wood ashes, or epsom salts to add to a bushel of compost to

speed decomposition and increase the compost's plant value. Details are also given how to make acid compost with azaleas and rhododendrons.

"Proper handling of mulch is one of the most important understood soil and water conservation measures used in Harris said. "All good conservationists leave the stalks and from their crops on the land to reduce erosion and conserve soil. Few conservationists do more to reduce pollution blowing dust or from sedimentation."

The district conservationist gardeners could use the same principles in flower and vegetable gardens by utilizing mulches grass clippings, tree leaves, stems and stalks from harvested vegetables, and other materials.

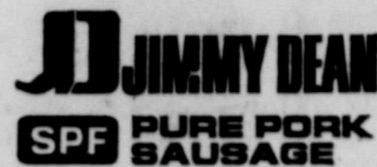
