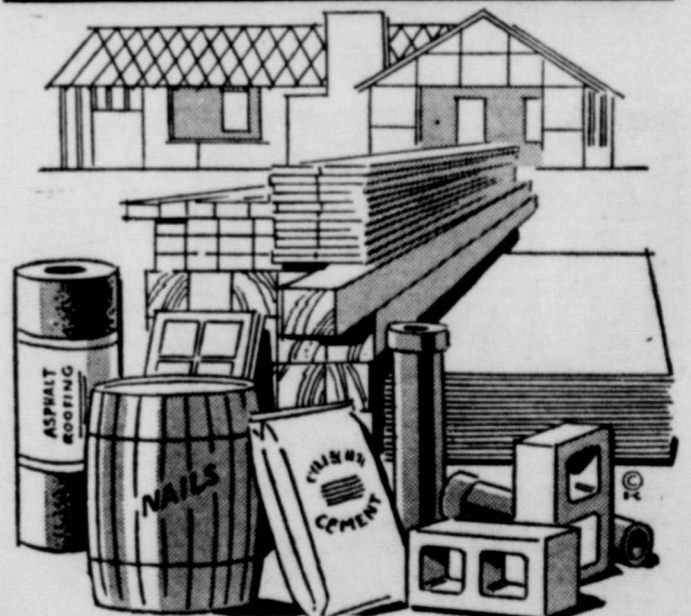

100 percent linens and 100 percent cotton fabrics. With colors of soft yellows, lilacs, pinks, greens and oranges being the favored shades. It has been years since we have been able to purchase 100 percent cotton garments or buy the fabric with any kind of selection. I, for one, am glad to see the cotton and linen back in the fashion picture this spring. These fabrics and fibers are comfortable to wear, they are durable and easy to care.

With the natural and soft look, the trend will be for longer hair with little "back combing" and some curls. 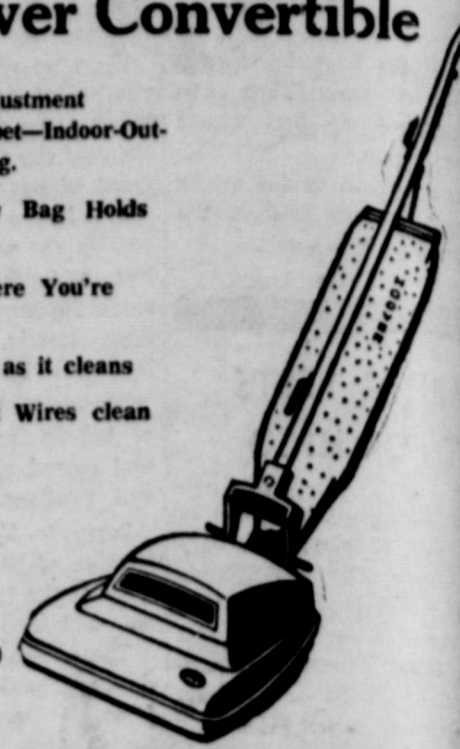

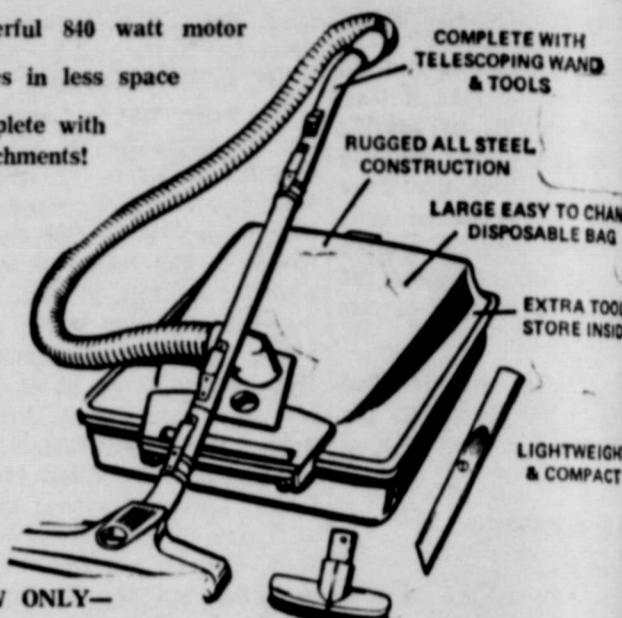

Two excellent programs are scheduled in Hamilton County for the week of February 8.

James Denton will be in Hamilton at the Vocational Agriculture classroom Monday, Feb. 8 at 7:30 p.m. Denton is the Area Farm Management Specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service, from Stephenville. He will cover Income Tax, with particular emphasis on farm income tax and tax changes.

1971 Farmer's Tax Guides will be available at the meeting.

The program is open to all who wish to attend and is co-sponsored by the Hamilton Young Farmers Chapter and the Agricultural Extension Service.

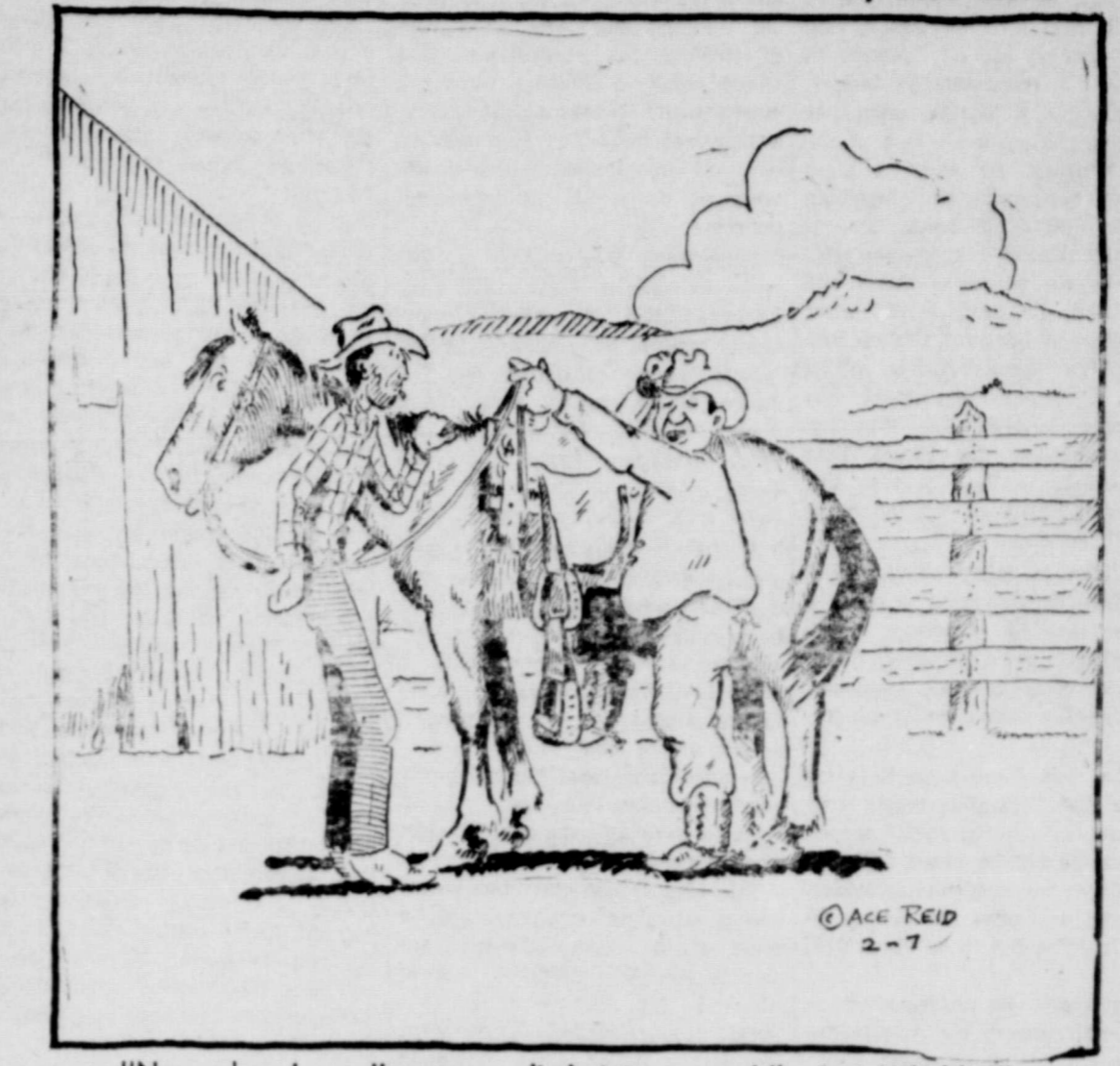
