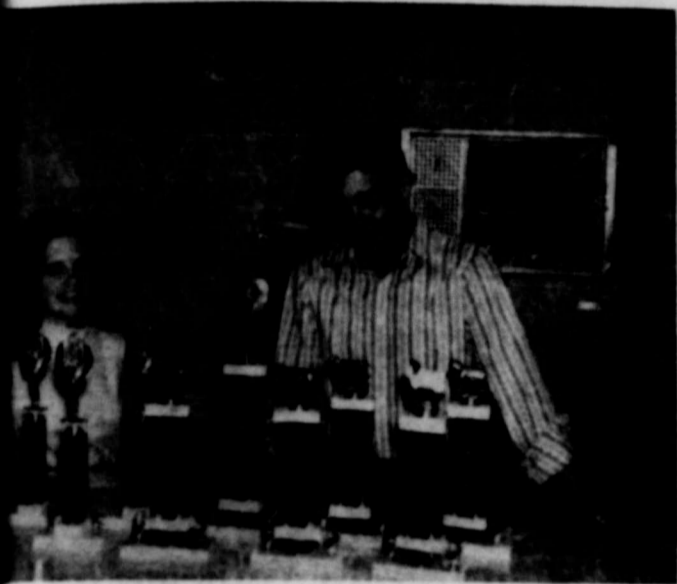
"The people of Hico bought a total of 1,608 packages of cookies during the ten-day sale. The quota was 1,368 packages," Mrs. Bell said.

## Two From Hico Nominated For Conservation Awards

The Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District entered the 1971 Texas Conservation Awards program in six categories. The Awards Program is sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with 183 Soil and Water Conservation Districts in Texas.

State Champions Night will be Saturday, May 1, at the Student Center Ball Room, Texas Christian University in Fort Worth. TCU will join as hosts. New state champions will be presented there.

The awards dinner will be followed by five regional dinners in May, exact dates to be announced later. This District is in Region 5, Central and North Texas. The dinner

will be in Stephenville. Awards will be presented to those who are winners in the region, which consists of 51 counties.

Entries from Hamilton-Coryell District were:

1. The district entry consisted of a summary of activities and operations for the year 1970. A cash award will be made to the best district in Texas during the past year. Cash awards will also be made to winners in each of the five regions.

2. "Comeback Farmer." The Directors selected Roscoe Karnes of Pottsville for this recognition. This award is made to an outstanding farmer-rancher who with limited resources, overcame seemingly unsurmountable obstacles, and did an outstanding job of conservation and restoration of land.

3. Weekly Newspaper. This year the directors, not unmindful of the very excellent support of all newspapers in the district, designated the Gatesville Messenger for outstanding support of conservation in the district and in the State. Editorials on conservation are forceful and convincing. All news items and conservation articles submitted are published in full. Many pictures depicting conservation are carried in connection with news items and articles.

4. Radio Station. KCLW was cited for an award for outstanding contribution to conservation in the district and in Texas. The station has a daily program devoted to agriculture.

5. Teacher. Harold Walker, FFA teacher at Hico High School was designated outstanding conservation teacher in the district. He has already received recognition and was presented an award by the Texas Education Agency.

6. Essay. All high schools in the district were invited to enter the Essay contest. Three entered, Hico, Hamilton and Evant. The subject was "Our Natural Environment—

Saturday night finals started at 8 p.m. with Dublin defeating Cranfills Gap 63-51 for the consolation title.

The championship game followed with Fort Worth defeating Hico 57-72 for the title.

The Hico team will enter a tournament at Evant March 4, 5 and 6 and will play Thursday at 7:30 p.m.

## 5 Accidents Occur Here Last Week

A rash of accidents starting last Thursday kept local officers on the jump investigating the crashes, but fortunately no injuries were recorded in any of the five mishaps.

The accident chain started Thursday during the season's first major rain, when a two-car collision occurred on Highway 6 near the Grady Hooper Sta. Wayne Thomas was driver of one of the vehicles.

Later Thursday afternoon, a large truck went out of control on rain-slick Highway 281 south of the Bosque River bridge and jack-knifed through a guard rail and into a deep ravine. Driver of the truck was A. G. Martin of Arlington. His vehicle was traveling north. Martin said that just as he came over the hill, he saw a large house

trailer on the bridge, and he knew that both his vehicle and the trailer couldn't pass on the structure. A touch of the brakes caused the truck to go out of control.

Still later Thursday, a cattle truck driven by Robert Mahan, and owned by Dwain Wolfe was involved in an accident about half a mile north of the city limits on Highway 281. The car involved was driven by a Vernon man.

Next crash occurred Friday just south of the Bosque bridge, and involved a pickup driven by Oris Bakke of Iredell and a Gatesville man.

Last of the crashes occurred Monday morning when a pickup driven by Red Lackey was in collision with a car driven by a San Antonio woman in front of the Steak House.
