### Stock Show Entries Down

Two hundred and eighteen entries paraded before judges last Friday at City Park in the 24th Annual Hico Stock Show, and officials were well pleased with the entry list despite a drop from previous years.

The total entry this year compares with the 222 last year. Entries in the various divisions totalled 43 swine, eight goats, 50

sheep, 41 dairy animals, and 51 beef entries. Twenty-five dogs were entered in that popular division.

The drop in the overall entry list was attributed mostly to the small goat division. In past years, numbers up to 100 have been judged. Lack of interest in the division was attributed to the poor market for the animals.

Judges for the show were Leighton Black of Goldthwaite, livestock, Joel Hillin of Tarleton State College, dairy, and Mrs. Sunny Reuland, Austin, dog division.

County Judge Herman Standifer made the appointment Tuesday. At the same time, Hico City Council met in special session and appointed Mr. Hamilton to the City Judge post, which was also held by Mr. Renfroe.

A retired Katy Railroad employee, Mr. Hamilton served one four-year elective term as Justice of the Peace of this Precinct.

Mr. Renfroe was re-elected to a four-year term last May, and the current appointment is for the unexpired term until the next general election, which will be in 1972.

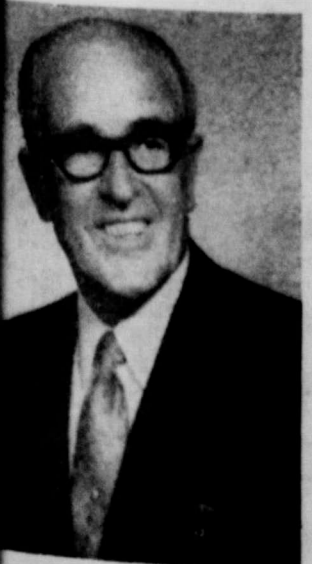

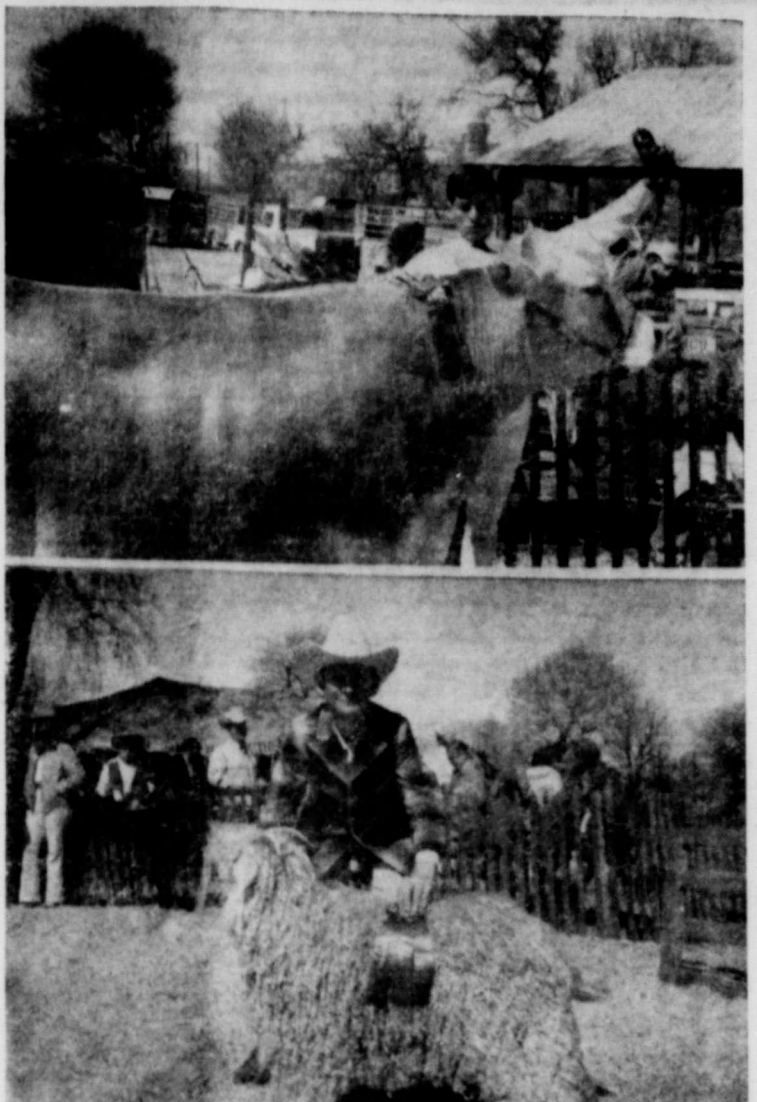

sitive to emotional pressures. A reader must recognize and interpret symbols, review what goes before, and anticipate what is to come to be able to read with understanding.

1. Physical handicaps such as lack of hearing discrimination, dyslexia, low vitality, and inadequate attention span can interfere, as can absenteeism which is caused by physical illness or weakness.

2. Intellectual handicaps, such as a low IQ, are not as often responsible for problems as is sometimes imagined. Mrs. Braune revealed that of students in the grade school program, two-thirds are in the normal range of IQ while two-thirds of the students in the class in high school are of below normal IQ level.

3. Home environment can influence reading progress in that lack of experiences in areas can handicap and unwholesome attitudes toward school, teachers, and programs can influence a child's attitude.

4. Emotional factors can interfere with the reading process. The reading experience is the first time a child finds himself in comparison with his peers. If the material is too difficult, if the child feels insecure, or if he has a need for love or attention, these factors can cause emotional blocks.

5. Educational factors can influence the reading process as well. A classroom with too many students per teacher, a situation where the teacher is burdened by many non-teaching duties, the existing system where a child must start to school at age 6 without regard for readiness, and a system of universal promotion to keep students at an age norm are all factors which interfere with the reading process in some cases.

In summing up the factors mentioned Mrs. Braune commented that there is no one cause for poor reading. There is action and interaction between all the factors.

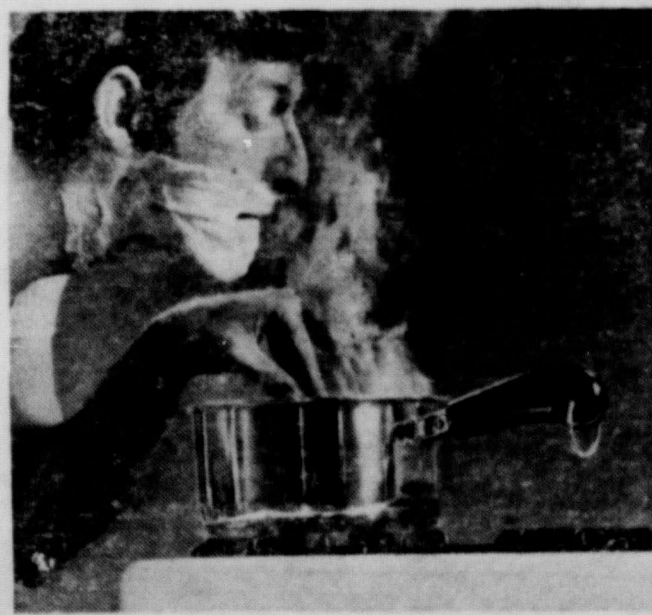
