## Gene Lindsey Named 'Most Valuable'

Eugene Lindsey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lindsey, was presented the coveted "Mickey Maguire Award" Monday evening at the annual Athletic Banquet.

Sponsored by Hico Civic Club, the banquet honors both boy and girl athletes. Mr. Maguire was on hand to make the presentation to Lindsey, a senior and two-time all-district linebacker and fullback for the Tigers.

Theme for the banquet was "Tigers World," and Harold Walker was master of ceremonies. Civic Club President Roy Bates gave the opening welcome, and Rickey Jaggers, also a senior member of the football team, voiced the invocation. Supt. O. C. Cook introduced the

three coaches and commended them for their outstanding contributions to Hico High School Athletic Department. Coach Jimmie Ramage introduced the girls basketball and volleyball teams. Coach Charles Erick introduced the boys basketball team, and Coach Ed Pettitt presented the 1970 Tiger football team.

Lloyd Taylor, head coach at Tarleton State College, was guest speaker. Coach Taylor, a Texas A&M graduate, played football under Coach "Bear" Bryant at A&M and was a member of the 1956 National Championship team. Coach Taylor served as backfield coach at Texas A&M before going to Tarleton in the spring of 1970.

## Sales Tax Collection Is Highest

City of Hico collected the largest check to date last week, when the State Comptroller remitted \$3,527.68 representing the city's take from the Sales Tax for the months of October, November and December.

Previous high quarter was the preceding three months when \$3,501.59 was received.

The first quarter that the tax was collected in Hico, Oct., Nov. and December of 1969, the city collected \$2,924.80.

January, February and March, 1970 was the smallest quarter, with \$2,768.22 collected.

April, May and June collections totaled \$3,119.92.

July, August and September brought in \$3,501.59, and the last quarter was \$3,527.68.

Total collected for the first 12 months was \$12,314.53, and for the 15-month period, the total was \$15,842.21.

## City, School Voting Slated Saturday

Little or no interest has been shown in two elections to be held at City Hall Saturday, April 3.

Both the School Trustee and City official elections will be held Saturday, with polls opening at 8 a.m.

In city balloting only two candidates are seeking the two posts to be filled, both running for re-election. Wayne Rutledge and Al-

vin Casey are the veteran aldermen asking for another two-year term of office.

In school voting, three candidates are asking for three places to be filled on the board. The three, Tommy Johnson, D. L. McCoy and Guy Bulman are all asking for their second 3-year term of office. Polls close at 7 p.m.

### Iredell City Election

At Iredell, four candidates filed for three places on the city council. Three are seeking re-election, while a fourth, J. T. Wellborn Jr., is asking for his first term of office. The three incumbents are Wayne Vanwinkle, Bill Helm and Wayne Wellborn.

## Oriented Mails Be Prevented, According to Postmaster

Effective Feb. 1, 1971, residents have the advantage of a new law which prevents them and their family from receiving obscene advertisements in the mail.

Postmaster Harry Hudson has the following information concerning the new law. You list your address with the Postal Service, stating you wish not to receive advertisements through the mail. You may also list the names of children under 19 years of age who live with you or who are under your care, custody or control.

The Postal Service compiles a list of such names and makes it available to mailers. This prohibits any commercial mailer from using the names of children under 19 years of age in his advertising.

After 30 days from the date your name is added to the list, any mailer who sends you an advertisement which is a violation of the law is liable to a civil penalty of \$500. Should you receive such a mailer after the 30-day period, you will turn the mail over to the local Post Office, who will send it to the Postal Service.

Form number for you to examine and may be obtained from the local office. If you desire to file out this form, some office will aid you.

## Hico Lady Exhibiting Doll Collection at Stephenville Museum

"The history of dolls," states Mrs. George Einfeldt of Hico, "is as old as man. First they were used for worship and communication and only much later for play."

Mrs. Einfeldt has been collecting dolls for 10 years.

Her Mary Todd Lincoln doll is china with a pink luster head. It is wearing a lovely pink silk and lace dress of the type fashionable in Mrs. Lincoln's days.

The one-inch doll, called the Naughty Lady, is reclining on a couch. The whole figurine is carved alabaster.

A very early type doll is the wax portrait doll with dyed corn silk hair. Dolls of this kind were made before photography.

Two appealing wax dolls are elderly French peasants. The man is smoking a pipe and the woman is reading the Bible. Both are seated.

The peddler doll in Mrs. Einfeldt's collection was used by a peddler to display dress styles for women.

Her dolls of known manufacturers represent some famous makers, as Armand Marseille, Schoenhut, Madame Alexander, Simon & Halbig, Heubach, Kestner, and Amber.

Thirty-five of her dolls will be on display in the Stephenville Historical House Museum from April 3 to April 11. **Social Security**

Questions & Answers

Question: I have been drawing Social Security about 8 years. I am over 73 years of age. I took a full time job last year and earned over \$6,000.00 in 1970. Will I lose my Social Security benefits?

Answer: No, you will not. There is no earnings restriction for any months after you are age 72. Since you were over age 72 in all months of 1970, there can be no deductions from your Social Security checks. Those who work in the year they become age 72, and earn over \$1680 in the year, could lose some checks because of excess earnings in that year. However, they could only lose checks for months before they became age 72.

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**How to choose the proper light bulb**

New bulb labeling helps you make the right choice

By checking the information on the bulb jackets, you can select the bulb that will best serve your lighting requirements. Information included shows the brightness (or lumens) the bulb will deliver . . . how many hours the bulb may be expected to burn . . . and wattage, or the amount of electricity the bulb uses. In areas where less light is needed or where changing bulbs is more difficult, you may want the "longer-life" bulbs which last longer but usually deliver less brightness. For study or work areas you should choose bulbs that deliver more brightness.

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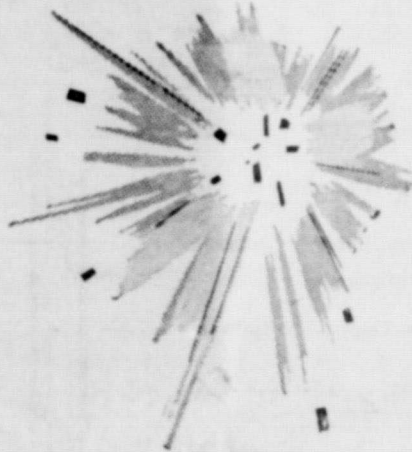
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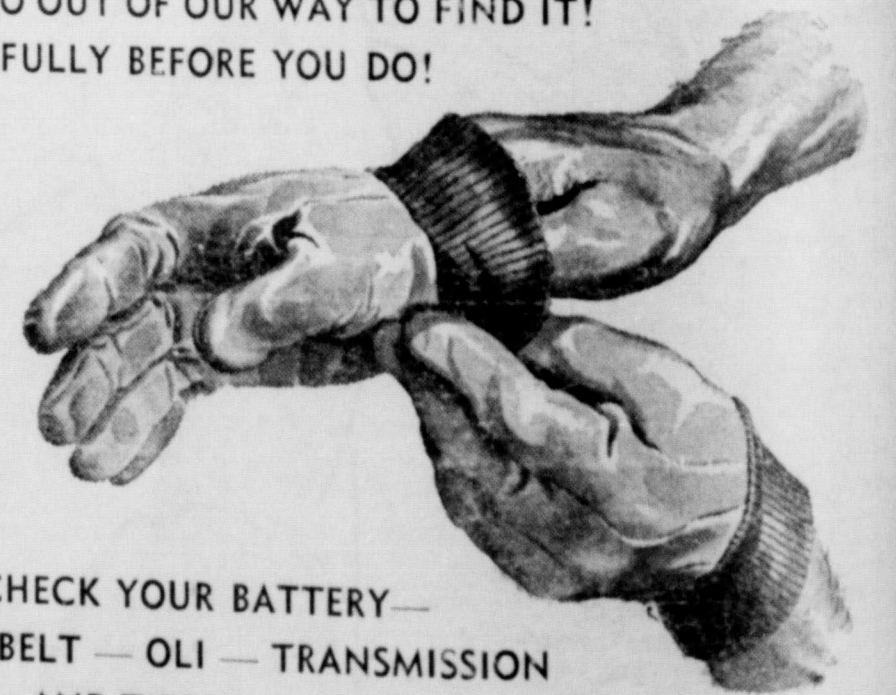
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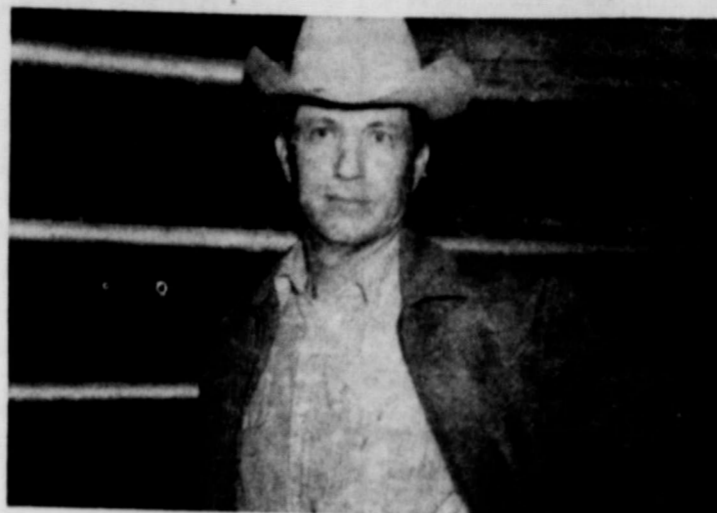

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL MCCUTCHEON

Did you know that by planting a tree or shrub that you were doing more than beautifying your home? You are also helping to check air pollution.

Green plants play a vital role in our survival and well-being. They are the great air purifiers of the world. They have the ability to take carbon dioxide from the air and convert it to oxygen which is vital to all animal life. In the process of photosynthesis, plants

manufacture the basic carbohydrate materials which we ultimately use as food.

In a season of active growth, grass in a well-maintained 50x50 foot lawn will liberate enough oxygen to meet the needs of a family of four day after day.

Estimations made by Dr. Karl Boer, University of Delaware scientist, show that each of us requires at least 78 large trees each day to utilize the carbon dioxide given off in the various processes needed to maintain our well being.

Here is the way he sees it. One tree is needed to take up the carbon dioxide from our breathing; 20 for our automobile; 20 for heating and air conditioning our home; 5 for household electricity; 2 for garbage disposal; and 30 trees to utilize the carbon dioxide produced in the manufacture of the industrial goods each of us uses.

Greater use of plants in home gardens, in home and public landscaping, and in community beautification is suggested as a positive contribution for reduced air pollution.
