## Harry Hudson Appointed Permanent Postmaster

Harry Hudson, veteran employee of the Hico Post Office, was sworn in as the permanent postmaster at the local office last Friday. Hudson had been serving in the capacity of officer in charge of the local office since the retirement of Robert Jackson last July 1.

W. A. Austin, field service officer for the Dallas Region, administered the oath and presented Hudson with his commission. In part, the commission reads, "Know ye, that reposing special trust and confidence in the intelligence, diligence and discretion of Lewis H. Hudson, I have appointed him postmaster at Hico in the county of Hamilton, State of Texas, and do authorize and empower him to execute and fulfill the duties of that

office according to the laws of the United States and emoluments thereunto legally appertaining, from the third day of April 1971."

Hudson's appointment was one of 70 in the Dallas Region made by W. L. Crawford, Regional Director.

Mr. Hudson was raised in Hico, attended the local schools, and later graduated from the University of Texas with a degree in Business Administration. In March of 1942 he enlisted in the Navy and was discharged in November of 1945 with the rank of lieutenant. After returning to civilian life, he and his brother-in-law were partners in a dairy farm operation.

His service with the postal department began in August of 1948 as a substitute clerk. As other clerks retired, he was advanced until he became chief clerk.

## 38 Votes Cast in School Election; 33 in City Balloting

Voting interest in the two elections held last Saturday was about as expected, with only 38 ballots cast in the school trustee election and 33 in the city.

The three incumbent school trustees, D. L. McCoy, Tommy Johnson and Guy Bulman, each received 38 votes.

Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey polled 33 votes each to regain places on the City Council.

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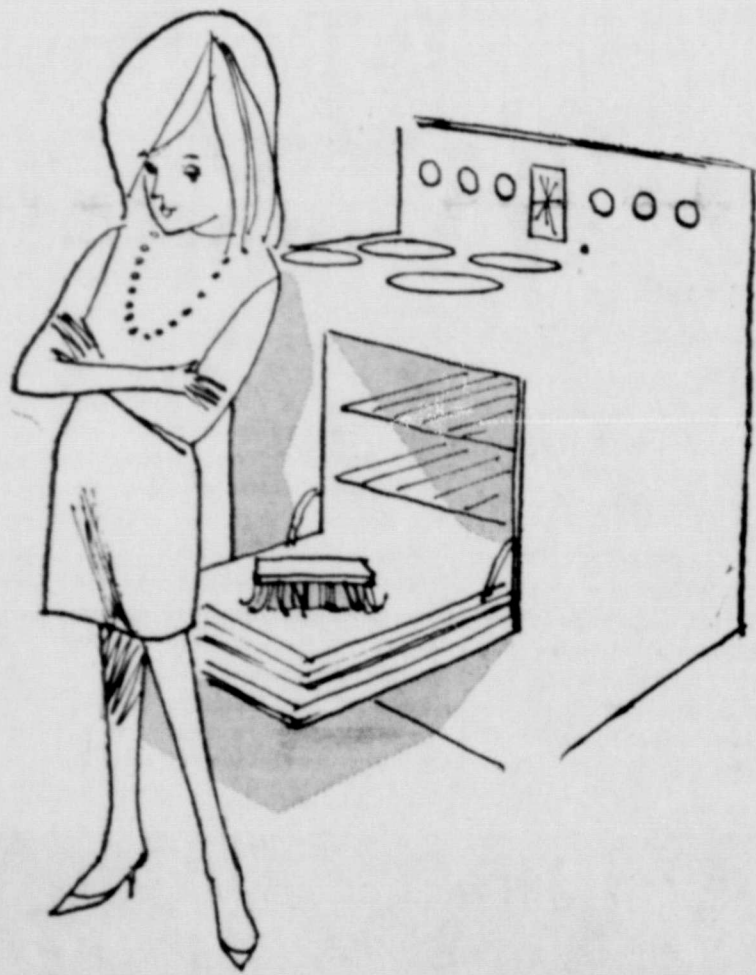

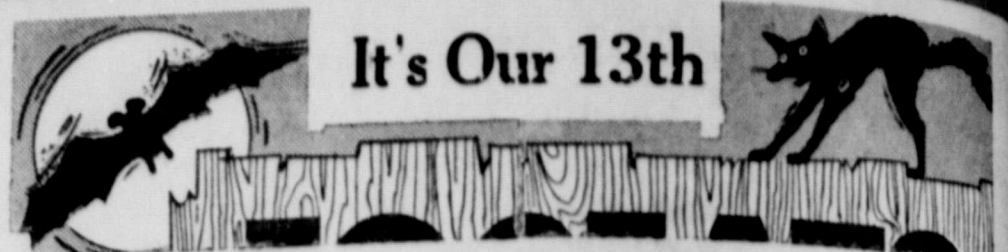

# Hico Students See Coin Collection

Hico High School history students sat in awe as they viewed the hobby of local banker E. H. Randals Jr. The fascinating hobby, and one that has proved to be an investment, is coin collecting. The collector, assisted by his wife, Lorene, explained the significance of money throughout history.

Mr. Randals explained that there had always been a median of exchange between people. Early history denotes the exchange of salt, stones, and whiskey. Included in the Randals collection were such minor coins as 1793 half cent pieces, two and three cent pieces, 1833 half dimes, and 1824-25 half dollars.

Of particular interest to the Hico students was a 1759 eight-bit dollar from Spain. The local banker explained that as less amounts of money were needed the dollar was broken in bits thus originating the present saying of 2 bits, 4 bits, or 6 bits.

A group of pattern coins were examined by the students. The lecturer explained that designers submitted coin designs in hopes that their design might be selected for future coins. Included in the Randals collection were 1871 pattern coins. Commemoration coins were also viewed, and the Lewis and Clark Exposition coin was a very popular coin minted in 1904-1905.

The gold coins were by far the most beautiful. A one dollar gold piece was shown to the group. The coin had been minted in Deloniga, Georgia in 1861. The mint was supposedly closed in 1860 and only seven coins were known to have been minted after 1860. The prized coin possession was secured by the collector's father, the late Horð Randals, also a banker. The coin came through the local bank in the early 1930's.

To complete the collector's presentation, Mr. and Mrs. Randals showed paper currency. Currency first came into existence in 1861,

and a vivid green five dollar bill was responsible for the term "greenback." Legal tender was also viewed by the group.

Mr. Randals explained that ordinarily currency had to pass 13 inspections before it was distributed. Included in the collection were two observed one dollar bills that had been printed in 1935 and through some faulty process, they were over-printed.

The coin collection was examined by the students and following the presentation a question and answer period was conducted. When asked if it would be possible for members of the class to have rare coins, Mr. Randals said that it was certainly possible. He suggested that old coins should not be cleaned except by an expert. And, he further added that bankers would usually be glad to help a person determine the value of their old coins.
