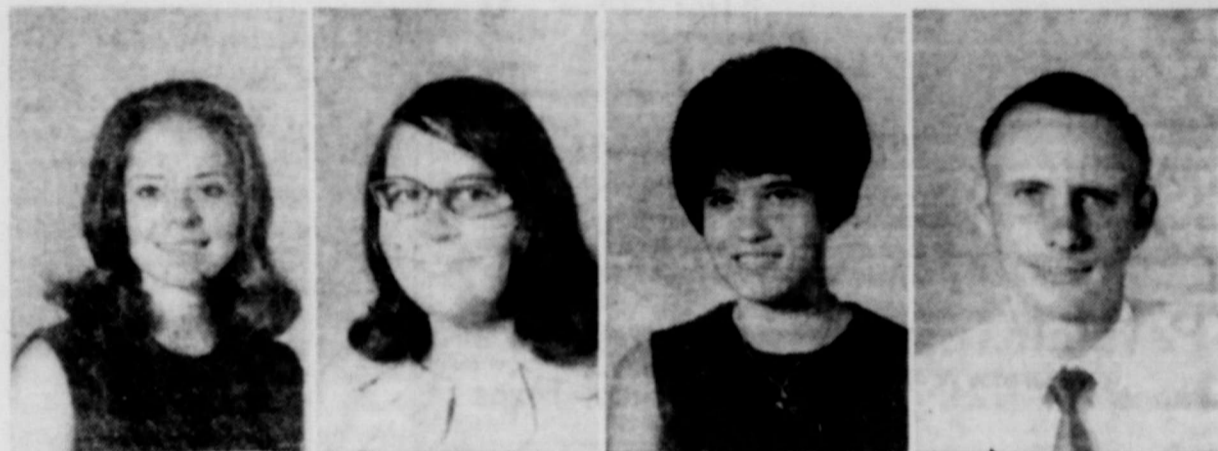

## ★ WORK DAY SET SATURDAY AT LITTLE LEAGUE PARK

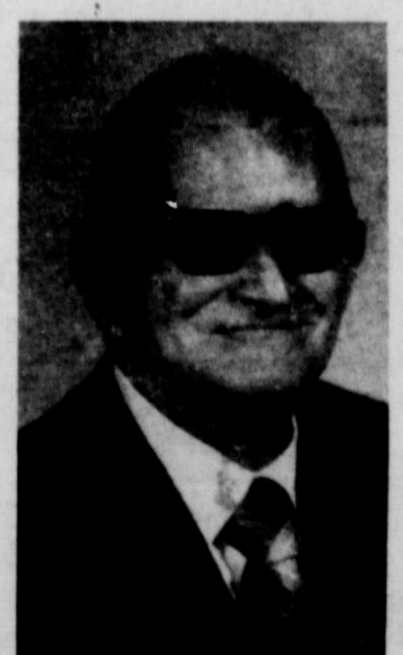
A general work day has been scheduled for Saturday at 1 p.m. at the Little League Ball Park, and again on Wednesday, also at 1 p.m.

## Emergency Loans Available in Hamilton County From FHA

Farmers Home Administration Director J. Lynn Futch has announced that Hamilton County has been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for emergency loans to farmers and ranchers who have sustained substantial losses on account of the drought. This designation continues in effect through June 30, 1972, and will

authorize emergency loans to be made to those persons who suffered losses from any adverse weather conditions, such as high winds, hail, or flood, that have occurred or might occur during the designated period.

Funds are available and applications for such loans may be made at the FHA County office, located at 1003 East Main in the Agricultural Services Building in Hamilton, according to George Krupala, county FHA officer.

Only one of four Constitutional Amendments was approved by Hico voters in the Tuesday special election. Amendment No. 3, removing the ceiling on welfare, was the only one gaining approval here with a 69 for, 60 against count.

Amendment No. 1, establishing an ethics committee, was voted down 92-39, and No. 2, approving submission of amendments during special sessions of the legislature was defeated locally by an 86-42 margin.

Amendment No. 4, the water proposition, was defeated 79-50.

Only 129 people voted in the election, which combined voting boxes at Fairy, Olin and Carlton with the Hico box.
