FAIRY METHODIST CHURCH

Dedication Services Held Sunday at Fairy Church

Dedication services were held at the Fairy Methodist Church Sunday, June 20, for the report and history of the church which was submitted by Mrs. W. E. Goynes.

The ceremony was held Sunday afternoon, June 20, at the Fairy United Methodist Church. The church was the scene of a homecoming in the past and descendants of those whose church home was built to join in dedicating an historical marker which was placed on the grounds recently.

The marker gives the date of the founding of the church, the names of the charter members, and a brief history. Cost of the marker was paid by past and present members.

A picnic table was placed on the north side of the building by Myrtle Duncan Lusk of Dallas in honor of her late father, Duncan.

Memorials were built by Mrs. Johnson of Hico. Twenty-five guests were registered by Mrs. Lusk and her sister, Esie Mae Duncan Hendricks of Midland.

The occasion was a happy day for all who attended, and one which everyone will remember with pleasure.

Members extended thanks to those who helped with the program. The Fairy Homecoming Association who loaned chairs, a waffle maker and donated paper cups.

Church History
The religious life in the Fairy community prior to the organization of the several churches was like that of other rural areas that day: meeting in school houses, in homes, under big trees or in brush arbors.

In January of 1886 the Reverend S. Moore and his wife and family moved into the Fairy district and joined the other Methodist churches in their activities. They began planning for a church, and on the third of July the church was established with nine charter members under the leadership of Rev. S. Moore. Charter members were Mrs. B. F. Anderson, Mrs. Anderson Harvey, Mrs. Hattie Anderson Chenualt, Lee Anderson, and Mrs. Scott Stewart, Mrs. S. Moore, and Mrs. G. W.

The new church was the first of its kind in the community. It was designated as Martin's Gap Methodist Mission in 1887. The Methodist Annual Conference appointed Rev. Jno. S. Moore as supply pastor.

Captain Battle Fort and his wife were asked for the present building and they readily granted their request. The first building was

erected in 1886. On Dec. 17, 1888 the Captain had the proper papers for the transfer of the land executed. The deed states: "Battle Fort and Sallie C. Fort, wife of the said Battle Fort, for the consideration of one dollar and further consideration of our love of Christianity and to promote religious instruction, have conveyed to the trustees of Martin's Gap Methodist Mission and their successors in office in trust for the use and benefit of the ministry and the membership of the Methodist Church South within whose bounds the said premises are located."

Trustees named were T. E. Saulisbury, S. A. Cousins and F. L. Walker. The size of the lot was one acre. The deed was recorded July 15, 1889 at 1:45 o'clock p.m. On the 23rd of October, 1889, an acre of land in the south side of Fairy was bought from the good Captain Fort and his wife. This was for the parsonage. The cost of the lot was \$25.00, which 2500 percent of the sum the Forts had paid for it, but it was still a fair price. A house was moved there from Latham and it was added to from time to time until now it is considerably larger than its original size. No longer used as a parsonage, it is the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Goynes.

Trustees who signed the contract for the parsonage lot were S. A. Cousins, T. E. Saulisbury, F. L. Walker, J. J. Leeth, J. H. Morris, A. J. Russell and Morgan Bridges. The deed was recorded May 27, 1892.

The first church house was replaced in 1920 by the present structure. There was a tabernacle on the grounds just north of the church which was used by all local churches until a few years ago. It had served well its time and when it was no longer needed and falling into disrepair it was taken down. It lives on in memories.

The membership has fluctuated with the years. In 1888 there were 122 members; today there are 19.

Social Security Plays Major Role in County's Economy

Just released records show that 2,121 residents of Hamilton County are being paid \$188,100 a month in social security benefits, Jack Calvert, district manager of the Temple social security office, said this week.

This amount includes the ten percent increase in benefits recently passed by Congress and signed into law by President Nixon on March 17.

The number of social security beneficiaries represents 29.5 percent of the total population of Hamilton County. Total yearly benefits paid to these eligible persons amounts to \$2,257,000, Calvert added.

Of these social security beneficiaries living in Hamilton County, 1,169 are retired workers; 83 are disabled workers; 452 are dependents of retired or disabled workers; 384 are survivors of workers who have died; and 33 are receiving the special age 72 benefit.

In the United States, there are 26,228,629 persons receiving \$2,628,327,796 in benefits every month. In Texas 1,276,977 beneficiaries are being paid at the rate of \$114,526,427 monthly.

In the six Central Texas counties served by the Temple office, Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas,

Milam and San Saba, there are 23,736 persons collecting \$2,124,100 every month for a yearly total of \$25,489,200.

Although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one in every four is under age 60, and one in every eight is under 18. These under age 18 beneficiaries receive benefits because a working father or mother is retired, or disabled, or has died. Nearly all of the beneficiaries between age 18 and up to 22 are getting student benefits under a provision in the social security law that permits the continuation, or resumption, of benefits if the child is attending school full time.

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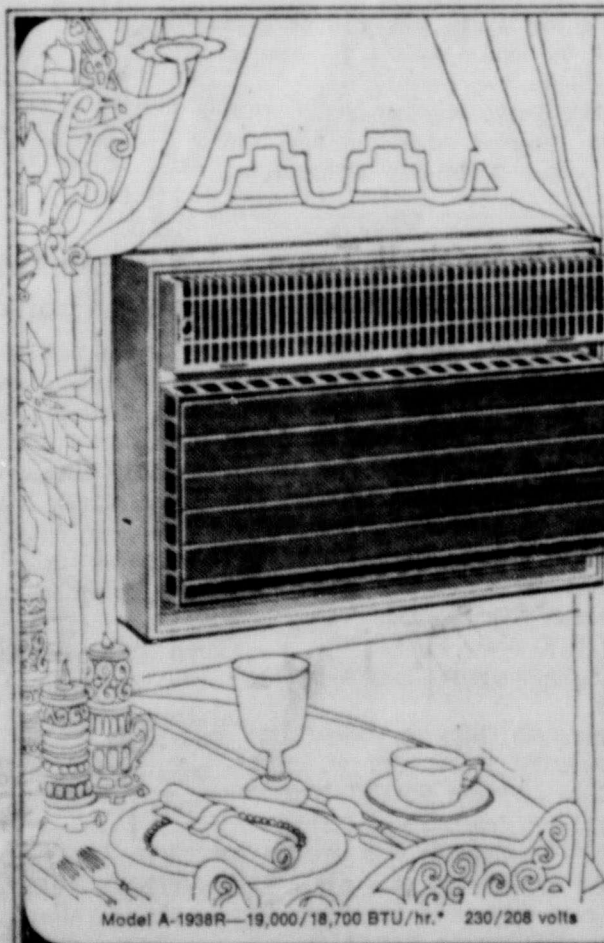

Social Security

Questions & Answers

By CHARLES E. BASS

Question: I've been getting monthly social security benefits since I was 62. I'll be 65 in March. What do I have to do to sign up for Medicare?

Answer: There are two parts to the Medicare program. You will automatically qualify for the hospital insurance part without doing anything. Hospital insurance, financed through employee and employer contributions to social security during a person's working years, requires no premium payments.

The other part of Medicare is Medical Insurance. You should receive a form in the mail several months before you are 65 asking if you want this part of Medicare. If you want the Medicare medical insurance, complete this form and return it in the envelope furnished. If you do not get the form, or if you have any other questions, call any social security office.

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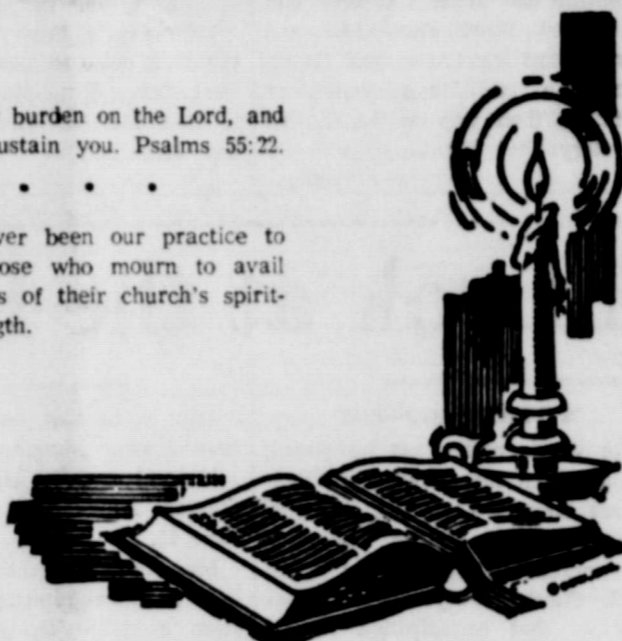

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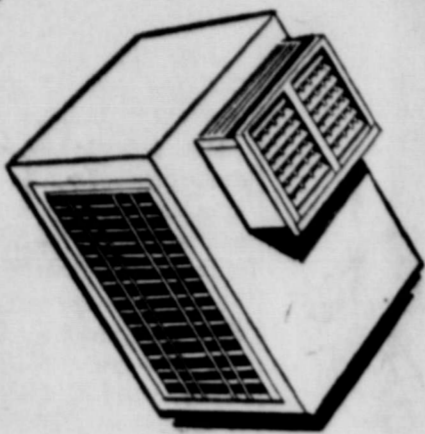

Cattlemen should be keeping a closer eye out for Vitamin A deficiencies where drouth conditions have reduced forage quality.

Breeding cows that are Vitamin A deficient will probably give the stockman his most harmful and costly problem. While breeding cows that are deficient in the vitamin may continue to have estrus periods, fewer cows become pregnant. If the pregnant animal is severely deficient, she may abort the calf or give birth to dead, weak or blind calves.

One of the early symptoms of Vitamin A deficiency is night blindness, but other signs such as watering eyes and some swelling joints are easier to recognize.

In the later stages cattle become less alert and lose their appetites. Other symptoms of prolonged Vitamin A deficiencies are nasal discharges, rapid breathing, staggering gaits, convulsions, or complete blindness.

Alfalfa and silage are two of the better natural sources of Vitamin A. Synthetic Vitamin A may also be administered with feed, as an injection, or in controlled drinking water.

From some observations I suspect that many local producers are presently facing this problem and it will be evident later particularly in low calf crops if it is not remedied soon.
