## Schools Bulge With 351 Enrollment

Hico schools opened their doors Monday morning with an over-flow crowd of both students and visitors at the special assembly program. Rev. George Whitfield, Carlton Baptist minister, was opening day speaker.

A standing-room only crowd was present for opening ceremonies.

At the end of the day, 351 students had enrolled for the current term, a jump from the 330 enrolled on opening day a year ago. However, when school was dismissed last May,

enrollment stood at 348.

Elementary school showed 221 students Tuesday, and High School registered 130. Among the 130 in high school were six students from Three Way (Johnsville) who had previously attended classes at Stephenville.

Largest class enrollment Tuesday was the 11th grade where 48 students were divided into two classes due to limited seating facilities.

Smallest class of the current year is the 12th grade where

only 22 were enrolled.

## Special Film Will Be Shown Saturday Night At Baptist Church

The latest Billy Graham film, "Lost Generation," features special appearances by Art Linkletter and "Dragnet" star Jack Webb. Linkletter, whose daughter, Diane died as the result of the use of drugs, discusses drug usage in America and points to what is being done voluntarily by many teenagers to combat the problem. Webb states his views on the role of the police officer and his relationship to the laws of the society.

"Lost Generation," filmed in Eastmancolor by World Wide Pictures, is a probing documentary which takes a close look at the attitudes and morals of the nation. Location filming was done in Alaska, the Southern states, on the farms and in the small towns of mid-America, and in the dying Haight-Ashbury hippie district of San Francisco.

"Lost Generation" will be shown Saturday, August 28 at the First Baptist Church. There will be no admission for the 8 p.m. showing. Rev. Eddie Malphrus, pastor of the church, extends an invitation to the public to attend.

## Proposed Phone Rate Increase Is Shelved by Company

A proposed rate increase on long distance telephone calls has been shelved, according to Gulf States-United District Manager Tom Venable.

Venable said that the proposed increases, which affected only some calls, would probably be put into effect at a later date when and if price control restrictions are lifted.

## Boy Scout Court of Honor Set Thursday Night at School

A special Boy Scout Court of Honor will be conducted Thursday, August 26 at 8 p.m. in the School Auditorium.

Mr. Lou Carrington, Scoutmaster of Troop 378, and Mr. Austin Emery, Advancement Chairman, have announced that the occasion will also mark the initial meeting for Hico's Explorer Scouting Post, of which Mr. Emery will serve as Advisor. Several awards are to be made, with an explanation of the Scouting program scheduled.

The public, parents of Scouts, and boys interested in the program, ages 11 through 13, or the Explorers, ages 14 through 17, are invited to be present.

## Gospel Meeting Set Aug. 29-Sept. 3 at Carlton Church

Members of Carlton Church of Christ have scheduled a Gospel Meeting to be held August 29 through Sept. 3. Services will be conducted daily at 7:30 p.m.

Damon Smith of Comanche will be evangelist for the meeting, and J. T. Butler will be in charge of singing.

Mr. Smith is also a singing school instructor and will conduct 30-minute sessions of gospel singing each evening before the regular services.

The congregation has issued an invitation to everyone in the area to worship with them.

## Five County Voting Boxes Consolidated

Five more Hamilton County voting precincts have gone out of existence because of diminishing population and a law that requires a precinct to have at least 50 registered voters in order to exist.

Hamilton County Commissioners voted last week to consolidate the five precincts which no longer meet this legal requirement with other precincts.

The five boxes by name and number which failed to meet the requirements are Goar 16, West Point 20, Ohio 8, McGirk 11 and Olin 19. Goar was consolidated with Lanham number 5; West Point and Ohio with Hamilton number 23; McGirk with Shive number 9; and Olin with Hico number 7. Hico becomes the largest voting box in

the county. The changes are effective immediately and will apply to the next election involving boxes affected.

The study by the Commissioners Court revealed that Hamilton County has a total of 3,011 registered voters this year.

Prior to the consolidations registration by precincts was as follows: Hamilton 1, 525; Jonesboro 4, 77; Lanham 5, 53; Fairy 6, 99; Hico 7, 514; Ohio 8, 35; Shive 9, 100; Fairview 10, 62; McGirk 11, 41; Aleman 12, 102; Indian Gap 13, 66; Pottsville 14, 116; Carlton 15, 87; Goar 16, 38; Evant 17, 73; Olin 19, 37; West Point 20, 40; Hamilton 22, 464; and Hamilton 23, 482.

## Former Hicoans Killed Near Austin

Funeral services for Lawrence H. Adams, 65, and his wife, Edna, 65, of Hamilton were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Hamilton Church of Christ, with Minister Herman Beauchamp officiating. Burial was in the Hico Cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Adams were injured fatally Monday morning in a two-car head-on collision at Cedar Park, near Austin. The accident also took the life of an 18-year-old girl, driver and only occupant of the other car.

Mr. Adams was born in Carlton and has lived in Hico and Hamilton most of his life. His wife, the former Edna Cashon, was born in the Millerville community.

Mr. and Mrs. Adams are survived by a daughter, Mrs. Garland Latham of Austin, and a son, Jim-

my Lee Adams of Arlington, and four grandchildren.

Also Mr. Adams has two brothers, Clyde Adams of Dublin and Raymond T. Adams of Tivoli, and two sisters, Mrs. Raymond Lowe of Hico and Mrs. David Wilson of Waxahachie.

Mrs. Adams is survived by one sister, Mrs. H. O. Richardson of Fair.

## Long Distance Phone Circuits Are Increased Out of Hico Exchange

Hico's long distance network is growing, according to Tom Venable, district manager for Gulf States-United Telephone Company.

The manager said that long distance circuits have been increased by fifty percent from Hico to Stephenville. The area had been served by eight circuits, and four were added during the past week.

Venable said the new circuits indicate the increasing telephone usage by Hico subscribers.

Studies are made on a regular basis to determine if more circuits are needed to various exchanges. "We are tailoring our service to meet the customer's needs," Venable concluded.

This is the latest on the school bus law. Quote:

Sec. 104. Overtaking and Passing School Bus. (a) The driver of a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside of a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus a visual signal as specified in Section 124 of this Act, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer actuated. (S.B. 183, 62nd Legislature.)






