Local Firm Will Continue to Serve Prescription Needs

More and more pharmacies and drug stores over the country have fallen in line with refusing to dispense drugs under the new law, which went into effect Sept. 1. Hico's Howard is continuing to accept prescriptions from past customers.

Mr. Howard, owner of the firm, said this week that business would continue to be through the red tape and care of customers of long standing, merely as a public service. However, Mr. Howard did ask for the cooperation of those affected by the new law, bringing in prescriptions on the days, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. The days in between will allow the local business time to process forms from the previous days.

Student Immunization Set By State Health Authorities

School officials in Hamilton County have designated three days in which all students in the county may receive free immunizations required by a new Texas law.

The free "shots" are being made available through the cooperation of the State Department of Health, the Hamilton County Medical Society, and all the schools in the county.

School clinics will be held for Hico students at 9:30 a.m. on three dates, Sept. 23, Oct. 21 and Nov. 18, and at Hamilton on the same dates for Hamilton and Pottsville school children. Pottsville students will be bus-

An individual mail count by all United States rural carriers is in effect, having started Monday, and will continue through Sept. 25.

Telephone Manager Asks For 'Careful Shooting' by Hunters

Now that the hunting season is underway, Gulf States-United Telephone Company has issued a plea for "Careful Shooting" by hunters near telephone equipment.

Purpose of the count is to get the volume of mail handled by each carrier, to get the amount of office and route time used by carriers to determine the adequacy of service to the rural public, and efficiency and performance of carriers.

Tom Venable, local manager for Gulf States-United, said that there have been several instances recently of gunfire damage to telephone equipment in the Hico area.

Each class of mail is designated separately on the report. Postmaster Harry Hudson said the reports will be used by the new postal system to better serve the public.

Even the smallest shot can cut a wire, shatter an insulator, or otherwise disrupt telephone service.

Tigers Drop Glen Rose 19-12 In Successful Season Opener

The Hico Tigers withstood an immediate scare last Friday night, and then came roaring back to win their season opener 19-12 over Class A Glen Rose.

The scare came in the form of speedster Ricky Rhodes, who scooped up the opening kickoff and raced 90 yards for a six-pointer that gave the visitors a temporary lead.

to take the opening game. Hico's first TD climaxed a 68-yard drive using eight plays. The pay-off came on a 17-yard keeper by Benny Baley. Big play in the drive was a 23-yard Baley pass to flanker Galen Christian. Kick for point was wide and the score remained 6-6.

The lead was short-lived, however, and Hico stormed right back with a six-pointer of their own to tie the game with only three minutes elapsed in the contest.

Hico had another scoring opportunity late in the first quarter when the Tigers pounced on a loose football at the visitor's 43. However this drive was killed by a good Glen Rose defensive effort at the 29 yard line.

The second quarter went scoreless, with Glen Rose mustering the only serious threat of the period. The Tigers worked to Hico's 27 before a stout defensive effort staved off the march.

After the initial shocker, the two teams settled down to do battle in earnest until early in the third quarter, when a Hico fumble put Glen Rose in business at the Tiger 30. It took the visitors ten plays to cover the 30 yards, with Lloyd Martin getting the marker from the three. Point try was no good and Glen Rose had a 12-6 lead.

The Tigers fumbled the second half kick-off, giving the visitors possession at the 30. Ten plays later and Glen Rose owned a 12-6 lead. Hico started their go-ahead TD

drive late in the third quarter, with Galen Lindsey getting the marker on a five-yarder, and then kicked the extra point to take a 13-12 lead.

The Tigers showed much determination and character by overcoming two adverse situations and still win the ball game. The opening run-back of the kickoff and the fumble of the second half kick-off would have been too much to overcome for a team with a lesser attitude.

Scores of other games which involved future Hico opponents were: Meridian 36, Godley 0; Evant 14, Richland Springs 13; Comanche 33, Dublin 0; Gorman 36, Hawley 0.
