Catfish Delivery Due Here Friday From State Hatchery

Channel catfish and redear fingerlings will be delivered to Hamilton at 8 a.m. Friday, Oct. 8, at Jones Gin.

The truck will leave Hamilton about 12 noon and be in Hico to make delivery here at 12:30 p.m. at the intersection of Highway 281 and Farm Road 1744.

Approximately 31,200 catfish and 16,115 redear will be ready for distribution. One hundred and seventy farmers and ranchers in Hamilton County will stock 268 ponds from this delivery.

The Soil Conservation Service has a list of everyone that will receive fish, and landowners are asked to bring their cards. The fish are hatched at Inks Dam and are delivered and distributed by the US Department of Interior, Bureau of Sports, Fisheries and Wildlife.

All farmers and ranchers that will get fish have received a card from the Bureau. If you did not get a card, your name is not on the list to get fish at this time.

SCS Slates Meeting October 12 to Elect District Director

The Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District will hold a meeting on October 12 in the District Courtroom in Hamilton at 8 p.m. for the purpose of electing a District Director for Zone 3.

Zone 3 is located in the southeast corner of Hamilton County. Zone 3 is bordered by Highway 22 on the North, Highway 281 on the West, and the Hamilton County line on the South and East. Serving at the present time is Gepe Pruitt. District Directors serve a 5-year term, and anyone owning land in Zone 3 is eligible to vote.

Violators Told to 'Clean 'Em Up' By City Dads

Hico City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night of this week, spent more than one hour discussing the various eyesores within the city limits, and means and ways of eliminating the problem. Emphasis was placed on those actively engaged in hauling trash, old appliances, auto bodies, etc., for the public.

Four persons residing here that are engaged in that business were invited to meet with the Council and express their views about the situation, and were asked to start getting rid of the rubbish in an effort to clean up certain sections of the town.

The people were further instructed not to take any more refuse to these particular sites, and all were agreeable to working with the city in every way possible in ridding their property of the unsightly dumps. The matter is to be taken under study during the next 30 days, and those involved are to report back at the next Council meeting.

Ronnie East, local Boy Scout Troop member, also met with the Council in the interest of traffic safety at the intersection of West 1st and Elm Streets (by the City Hall). East, who is working on his safety merit badge, told Councilmen that he had conducted a survey at the intersection, and had found that many motorists were not observing the yield signs. He suggested that stop signs be placed at the site. During one of his surveys, East said that 97 vehicles passed through the intersection, and that nine of those failed to observe the signs. He also pointed out that cars, trucks, etc. were obstructing the view of motorists traveling both ways.

The Council put the matter into further study, and commended young East for his interest in local safety.

Other phases of discussion centered around a dog control ordinance, delinquent taxes, and delinquent water bills.

Sales tax report for the quarter ended June 30 was given, revealing a collection of \$3,529.38, highest since the tax was started here. Three thousand dollars of the amount was earmarked for the special water fund set up at the last Council meeting.

Councilman Bill Howard, who was authorized to investigate the various forms of interest-bearing certificates that the City might place the special fund money into until needed, suggested that the City transfer a lump sum from the general fund to purchase a Certificate of Deposit on a six-month basis. Howard said that the larger sum, \$10,000, would draw a much higher rate of interest, and that the money was readily available should it be needed. After considerable discussion, the Council agreed to transfer the money to the special fund.

The water fund was created at the last meeting with an eye toward drilling and equipping a new water well between now and next summer to alleviate a minor water shortage experienced here last summer.

Remainder of the session, attended by the Mayor, City Secretary, City Street Superintendent and all members of the Council, was spent in discussing various other minor details.

The two teams have met three times previously, with Rising Star holding the upper hand. The Wildcats won over the Tigers 42-6 in 1968, 30-14 in 1969, but the Tigers turned the record around last year, winning 19-6.

In other games this week, Gorman goes to Blanket, and Meridian entertains powerhouse Valley Mills.

National 4-H Club Week Being Observed in County

Hamilton County 4-H Club members are joining 4-H Club members over the state and nation in observing National 4-H Club Week, October 3-9.

County 4-H members are learning to "Bridge the Gap," a theme adopted this year for National 4-H week. They are participating in community, school, state and national activities.

4-H is an action-filled organization that has a primary goal to help young people between the ages of 9 to 19 years become responsible and useful citizens.

According to many 4-H'ers, they do have a good time in club work, whether it be at camp, showing a calf at the livestock shows, making a dress, preparing a meal for the favorite food show, going to the

Tigers Dump Zebras 33-12 For 4th Consecutive Win

It was "Danny Kennedy Night" at Grandview last week, as the 145-pound junior halfback romped for three touchdowns, and in general, was a pain in the side of the home team in Hico's 33-12 victory.

Not only did Kennedy score on runs of 3, 4 and 9 yards, he also set up his last marker by covering a high center snap on the Zebra 13. The output brought Kennedy's total to five TD's in the last two games.

While Kennedy was putting points on the board, super back Galen Lindsey failed to notch a single TD for the first time since the Meridian game last year. Danny Polk scored one for the Tigers on a half-yard slant, and Benny Baley got the other on a 5-yard keeper. Polk also kicked two extra points.

The game was really more one-sided than the score might indicate, as the Tigers were leading 33-0 before allowing the Zebras to cross the goal. Grandview got their first marker midway of the fourth quarter, and the final TD with only 21 seconds remaining in the game.

After having their initial touchdown wiped out by a slipping penalty early in the first quarter, the Tigers bounced right back on their next possession to go out front 7-0. The counter was set up by a 57-yard punt return by Lindsey to the Zebra 3. Kennedy got the TD on the second stab, Lindsey kicked the extra point, and the Tigers were on their way to their fourth consecutive victory.

The Tigers had to work a little harder for their second score, moving 85 yards in 11 plays to cover

the distance. Danny Polk got the TD on a half-yard run. Workhorse Lindsey was injured in the drive exited the game, not to return during the night.

A fumble recovery at the Grandview 36 set the stage for the last TD in the first half. The Tigers used only three plays to cover the distance, with Baley hitting Galen Christian for 29 yards to the seven, Polk moved the ball to the four, and Kennedy scored on the next play.

Hico's drive on their next possession fizzled at the Grandview 6, but on their next outing the Tigers weren't to be denied, and scored after putting together a 55-yard

march. Big play in the drive was another Baley to Christian pass, good for 36 yards to the 19. Baley scored the TD from the five.

At the start of the final period, Kennedy recovered the high center snap at the Grandview 13 to set up the last marker. Polk moved the ball to the nine, and after an incomplete pass, Kennedy bulled in from the 9 to wrap up local scoring for the night.

In contests involving other district members, Gorman fell from the undefeated ranks by losing a hard-fought 14-6 battle to Class A power DeLeon, and Meridian got back on the winning trail by bopping Abbott 28-0.

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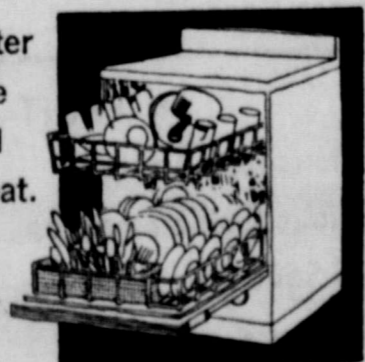

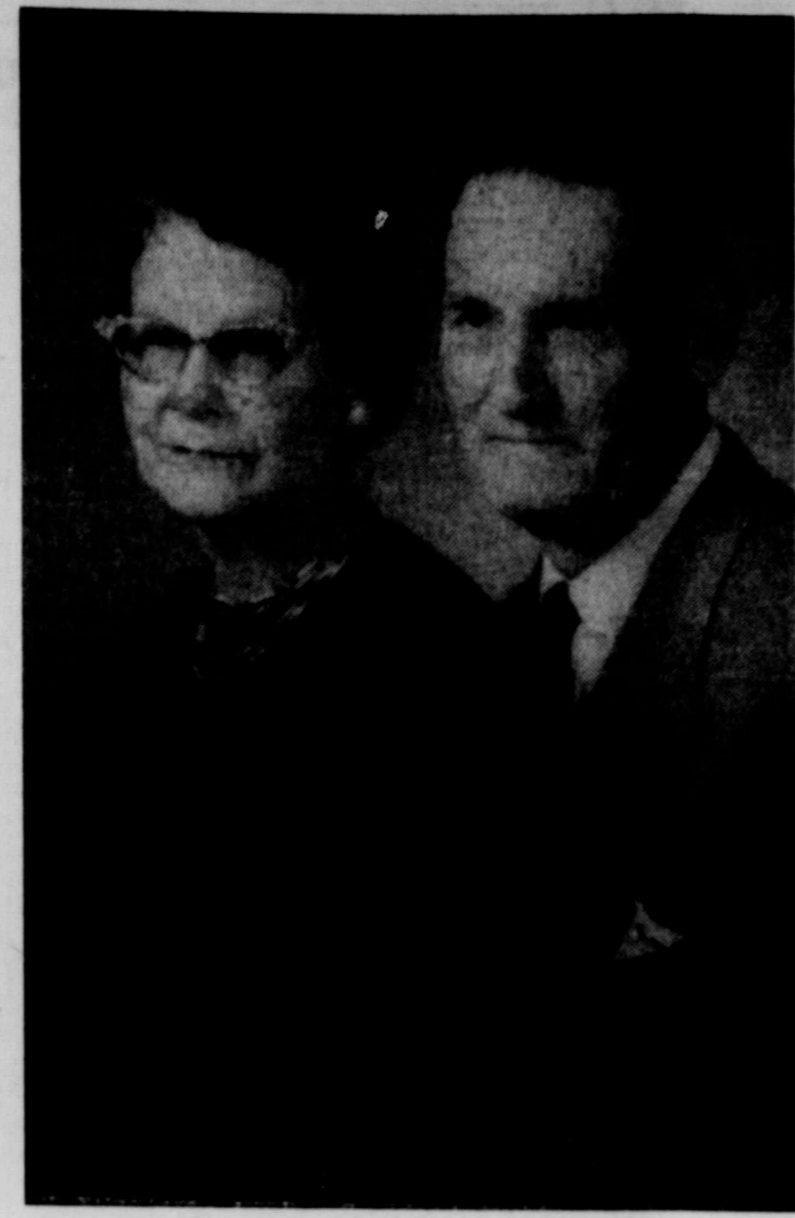

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The Hamilton County 4-H Awards Banquet will be held Monday, Oct. 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the Hamilton High School Cafetorium. The annual Awards Banquet is the climax of the 4-H year, and medals are awarded to those turning in record

books. The announcement of Gold Star Boy and Gold Star Girl will be the highlight of the banquet. Speaker for the banquet this year will be Mr. Tom Joseph.

Farmers and ranchers who plan on oat pastures for winter forage should be in the process of planting, if this has already been done. It is essential to plant early where maximum growth can be obtained before December, January and February. Small grains do very little growth during these three months due to cold temperatures. It is essential to plant oats early and let them obtain a height of 6 to 8 inches before starting to graze. If you have already planted oats for winter grazing and did not fertilize them this would be a good time to do as moisture conditions have been very favorable in regards to having an abundant amount of forage.

Two Hamilton County livestock producers mailed larvae samples to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory during the last week in September. One case was confirmed as a screwworm case. Two worms were found in the nasal cavity of a calf. The sample was taken from a rancher in the Star community.

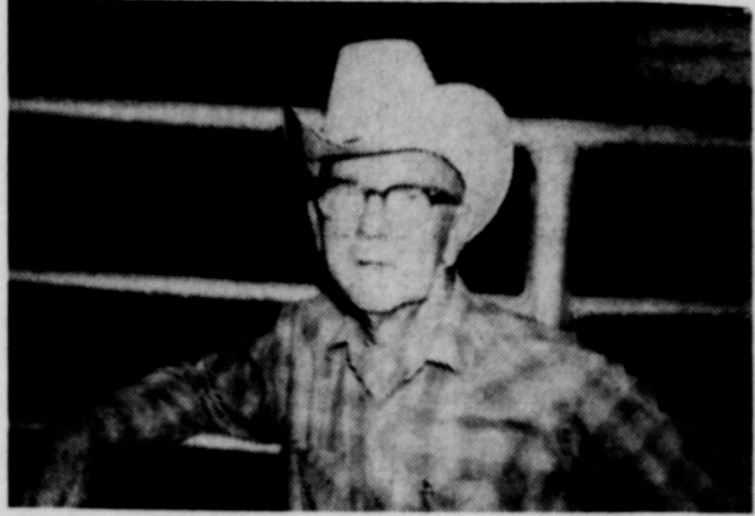

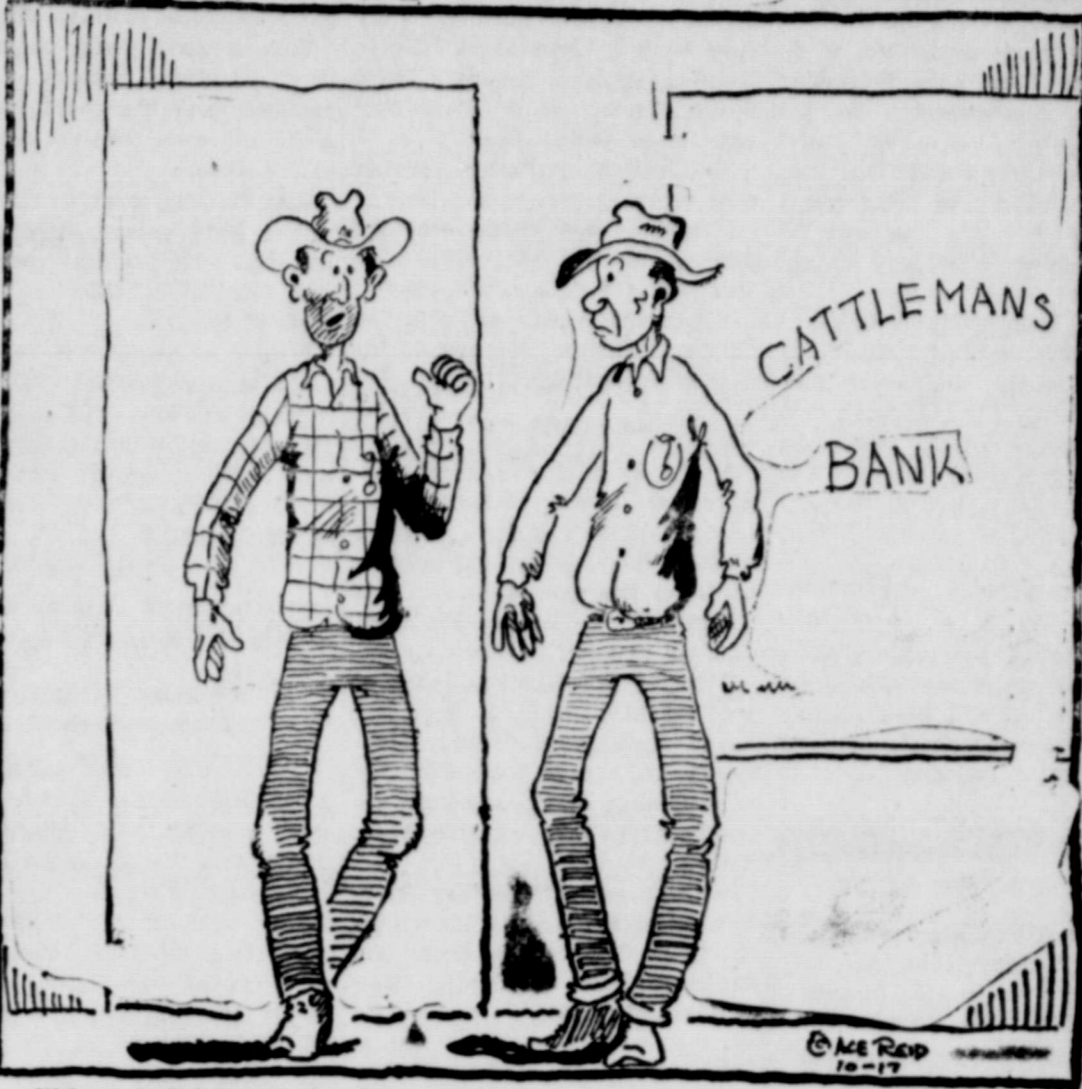

Questions & Answers

Question: I will be 65 in April. I have always been a homemaker and I have never been employed. My son tells me I should apply for Medicare. Can I get Medicare?

Answer: Yes. You should apply for Medicare three months before you are 65. Since you have never worked under social security yourself, you will not be eligible for the hospital part of Medicare unless your husband qualifies for social security or railroad retirement benefits. But, you can sign up for the medical insurance part of Medicare even if you cannot get the hospital insurance protection.
