Hico to Class 11-A

Re-alignment of athletic districts by the Interscholastic League placed Hico in Class 11-A for 1972 and 1973, according to local school officials.

The re-alignment means that Hico will be competing with larger schools for the first time since 1949.

Other member schools of District 11-A are China Springs, Valley Mills, Dublin, Glen Rose and Goldthwaite.

The Interscholastic League re-aligns athletic districts every two years, based on average daily attendance in high school the previous two years. The break between Class B and Class A is 119 students, and

Hico has averaged 128 the past two years.

After receiving the new alignment, Hico officials were busy making a football schedule for next fall.

City Paving Is Nearing Completion

Seal coating and new paving projects, started by the City two months ago, was nearing completion this week, according to W. R. Hampton, City Street Superintendent.

Hampton said that approximately 10,256 square yards of seal coating had been completed, and approximately 9,524 square yards of new paving was nearing completion.

Total cost of the program is estimated at around \$15,000.00, with property owners sharing cost with the city on new paving on a one-third basis.

Inclement weather has hindered completion of the program, but Hampton said that work would be finished just as soon as possible.

Milton Kirby is New Student Agriculture Teacher in Hico

Milton Kirby, senior Agricultural Education major from Tarleton State College, has begun his student teaching in the high school under the supervision of Mr. Harold Walker, vocational agriculture teacher.

Mr. Kirby will be in the community from October 25 until December 16 for the purpose of receiving training for vocational agriculture teaching. This arrangement has been made by mutual agreement between Mr. O. C. Cook, Superintendent of Schools, and Tarleton State College.

Mr. Kirby will assist with all activities concerning the local vocational agriculture program. Upon completion of this training period, Mr. Kirby will receive the Bachelor of Science degree from Tarleton State College and be eligible for the Provisional Secondary Vocational Agriculture Teaching Certificate.

Mr. Kirby is a native of Big Spring, and completed his high school vocational agriculture work under Mr. Truett Vines and Mr. Ed Seay. He is married to the former Miss Arlene Stevens, also of Big Spring, and they have one son, Marty, a year old.

Drs. Bill Irick and Johnny Johnson are the college supervisors for the teacher education program in agricultural education.

Hamilton Co. Shuffled to New District

In Legislative re-districting completed last Friday, Hamilton County was shifted from the old 54th District to one encompassing Hill, Bosque, Coryell, and Hamilton counties.

J. E. Ward of Glen Rose, who represented old District 54, was placed in another district composed of Erath, Hood, Johnson and Somervell counties.

Hamilton County has been in a district composed of Bosque, Johnson, Mills and Somervell. The latest re-districting is the third time this year that Hamilton County has been shuffled into new territory, with the first move being from Congressional District 17 to District 11, and the State Senatorial re-districting two weeks ago.

Tigers Roll on With 20-12 Decision Over Tough Jackets

Billed as a grid classic, Hico and Meridian fans saw just that when the Tigers and Yellowjackets hooked up before a full house at Tiger Stadium last Friday night in the district opener for both teams.

Mere words aren't sufficient to describe the fierce action of the contest, which went right down to the final seconds before a verdict was rendered, reading Hico 20, Meridian 12.

Everything was at stake in the contest, for a defeat in the 5-team district all but eliminates the loser from title contention. The game was similar to last year's in the hitting department, only the teams battled to a much closer score, and the outcome was still in doubt

until the final 20 seconds when Hico linebacker Cecil Holley swiped a Jacket pass at the five yard line to ice the game away. Until that point the Jackets, with still a chance for a tie, had moved 49 yards to the Tiger seven, and it appeared as if the visitors would put more points on the scoreboard. But Holley said no, and the Tigers ran one play and then stood around and let the final seconds tick away to preserve the first district win.

Action was fast in coming. Fans had barely found their seats when Danny Polk took the opening kickoff, handed off to Galen Christian who broke into the clear and raced 85 yards for a quickie lead that was never relinquished. Galen Lindsey's kick was no good, and the Tigers owned a 6-0 lead with only 15 seconds gone from the clock.

The first quarter was barely half over when the Tigers struck again. Putting together a 67-yard drive, Hico made it 14-0 at the end of the first period. In the drive, Lindsey slashed for three yards, Benny Baley hit Leroy Grice for 12 to the 48, Polk failed to gain, and Baley tossed an incomplete pass before Christian found running room and rambled for 18 yards to the Jacket 35. But the play went for naught as the Tigers were guilty of an infraction, moving the ball back to the 48. The Tigers weren't to be denied, however, and Baley hit Lindsey with a 44-yard aerial to the four, and then Lindsey carried in on the next play, ran for the two points himself, and the Tigers were out front 14-0.

The Jackets certainly were not a "give up" team, and bounced right back with a 55-yard punt return by hard-running David Miller. A pass attempt for the conversion points was no good and Hico led 14-6 at the end of the first half. Both teams threatened in the third period, but neither could find the spark to carry them into the end zone. Meridian worked to the Tiger 12 before giving up possession, and the Tigers hit a bomb for

61 yards to the Meridian 20 before fumbling the ball away.

Taking possession at their own 20, the Jackets put together an 80-yard drive that ended early in the fourth quarter with the TD that made the score 14-12. The Jackets used 15 plays in the drive, with the pay-off coming on a 5-yard pass from quarterback Joe Allen to end Larry Boyd.

After Meridian's TD, the Tigers came back with a bread-and-butter drive of 57 yards for the clincher. The Jackets forced the Tigers to work hard for the marker, with the locals using 13 plays to go the distance. Polk got the counter from the one.

With time fast running out, the visitors made one last futile stab at the Tigers, but saw the drive fall short at the five with Holley's interception.

Tiger Open Date.

The Tigers get a well-deserved rest this week, enjoying an open date after a seven-week grind, and will go back into action Friday night, November 5, with their second district game at Lometa.

In the only other district game played last week, Lometa bounced Evant 22-8. Gorman had an open date.

Games this week finds Gorman at Lometa and Evant at Meridian.

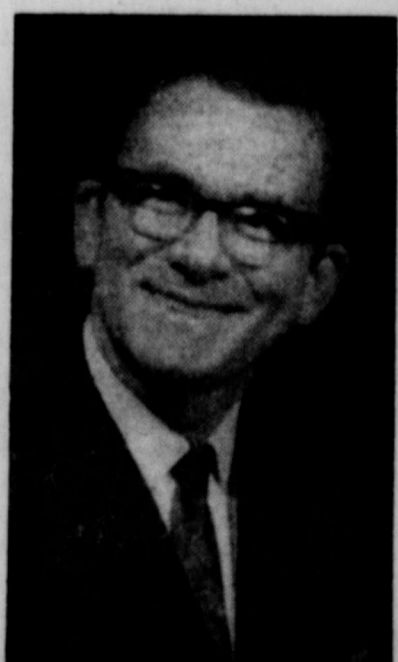

PROGRAM ON POLLUTION WAS PRESENTED THURSDAY AT REVIEW CLUB MEETING

The program was a forum on the subject, "Pollution—The Picture Brightens." Mrs. B. C. Dayton and Mrs. Louise Angell discussed both the national and international progress in controlling pollution. It was pointed out that pollution to

some degree is necessary as long as we live the way we do and the way we wish to live. This pollution is not a problem that can be solved once and for all, and shelved as taken care of: it is a continuing daily problem which consciously must be acted upon by individuals, by families, by communities and by industries.

Although considerable advancement has been made, public opinion must be aroused to the height necessary to shed light upon every incidence of pollution and to force its eradication.

Mrs. Bernell Jernigan concluded the discussion by citing ways in which individuals can help. Using cartoons for emphasis, she pointed out that we can:

1. Use and launder cloth napkins and handkerchiefs. Avoid colored tissues which leave a permanent dye in water.
 2. Plant a tree.
 3. Use soap and soda, not detergents.
 4. Go back to hand tools, such as those used for carving and can opening so as to save electrical power.
 5. Buy shampoo and lotions in glass, not plastic containers.
 6. Order milk in glass bottles. Plastic containers are pollutants. Paper cartons cut down forests.
 7. Run dishwasher only when full to save water and electrical power and to reduce detergent pollution.
 8. Spend one-half day to clean up a vacant lot or a camp ground.
 9. Take your own shopping bag to save paper bags.
 10. Join or organize a car pool.
 11. Cut down, in other ways, the use of your car.
 12. Use lunch boxes instead of a new paper bag each day so as to conserve paper.
 13. Sort trash into bottles, cans, paper and take to a recycling center.
 14. Write letters of complaint to companies that are pollutants. Also commend those that are not.

Fairy Community News

We have had a total of 8 inches of rain during the past week. Four inches fell from 3 a.m. Tuesday morning to daylight Thursday, causing small streams and dips to go on a rampage, and the Hamilton school bus had to wait for some of them to run down a bit before making rounds, as there are quite a number of these low places between Fairy and Highway 22. This and all surrounding com-

munities were deeply grieved when word was circulated that Mrs. Lester Timmerman had been killed in a traffic accident on Highway 281. She and Mrs. Arnold Gleason had been meeting at the Ages Baptist Church and going together to the State School at Gatesville where Mrs. Gleason taught and Mrs. Timmerman was a supervisor. Mrs. Gleason called her early Tuesday morning and said she was unable to get to the highway due to high water near her home. So Mrs. Timmerman felt she just had to be there to take Mrs. Gleason's place. Her friends all advised her not to try to go. She drove up to the Oran Willeford home to have him check her windshield wipers. While there Mrs. Claude Holley called that she would be unable to get to her work at Cranfills Gap due to high water at the creek near Agee. So Mrs. Timmerman knew she would have to go to Olin and hit 281 which she did and had only gone about five miles toward Hamilton when the wreck occurred as she was attempting to pass a pickup truck pulling a trailer and was met by the huge transport milk truck. Her car was turned slightly as if she was attempting to go into the left hand ditch and the truck completely sheared off the top of her car. She was killed instantly.

Mrs. Timmerman had lived in the Fairy community for a number of years, having taught school here several years, also at Hamilton and Hico. She was loved by all who knew her. She tried to give flowers to the living by her deeds of kindness and thoughtfulness, sending a card or letter, or a visit to those who were ill. At the time of her death she was secretary of the Fairy Homecoming, being elected in 1970 for a two year term. We feel sure all appreciated her services this past June 19 when our annual homecoming was held. We are going to miss her.

Mrs. Timmerman was a life-long resident of Hamilton County. She was born Nov. 3, 1914 to the late John and Rosie King Courtney, and was christened Rose Marie. She was married to Lester Timmerman on June 16, 1946 and was a faithful member of the Fairy Baptist Church. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 20 at 2 o'clock, with Rev. Robert Rachig and her pastor, Rev. Bob Ray officiating. Burial was in the Oakwood Cemetery at Hamilton. Serving as pallbearers were Dewey Sellers, Ovie Brummett, Arnold Gleason, Oran Willeford, Irby Petsick, Eloie Stringer, A. E. Nettleton and Frank Hanes. The beautiful floral offering bore

tribute of love and respect for the deceased. Mrs. Timmerman is survived by her husband, Lester Timmerman of near Fairy; two brothers, Frank and Moody Courtney of near Jonesboro. Also several nieces and nephews.

Our deepest sympathy to the bereaved loved ones who are deeply grieved in her passing. Most everyone in the Fairy and surrounding communities attended the funeral service.

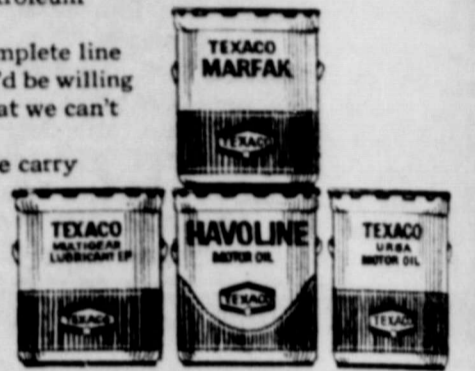

Mr. Durham was a 1921 graduate of Hico High School, and also of Texas A&M. He was a Shriner and member of the First United Methodist Church in Hereford.

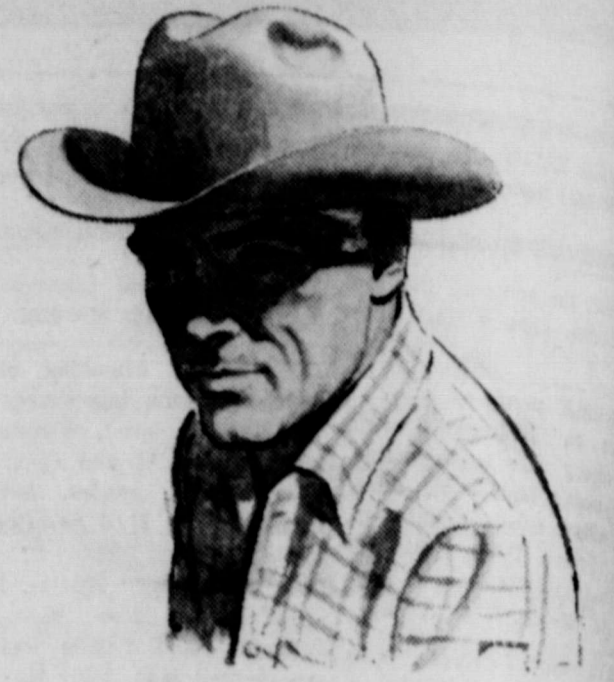

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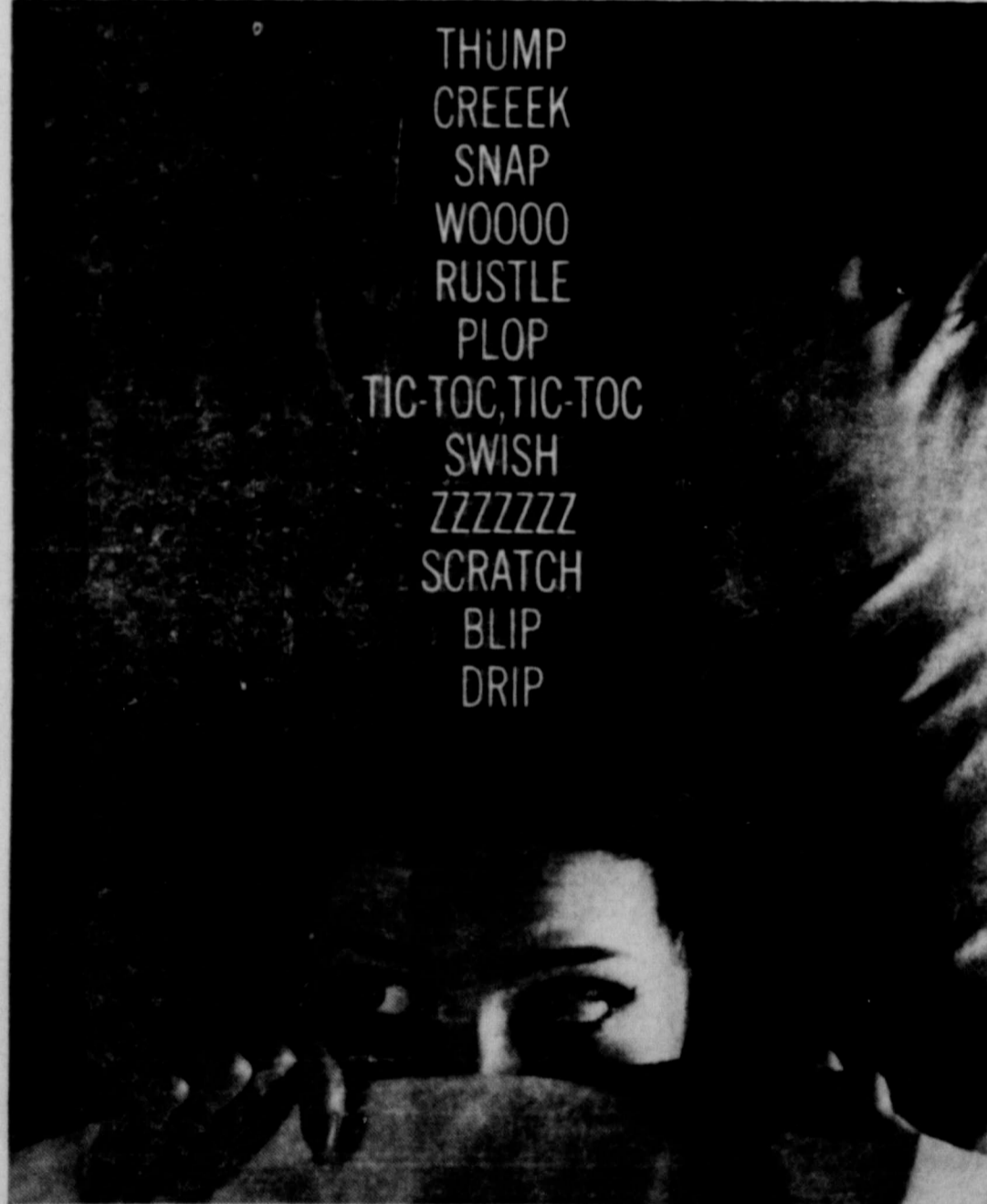

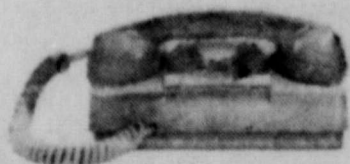
