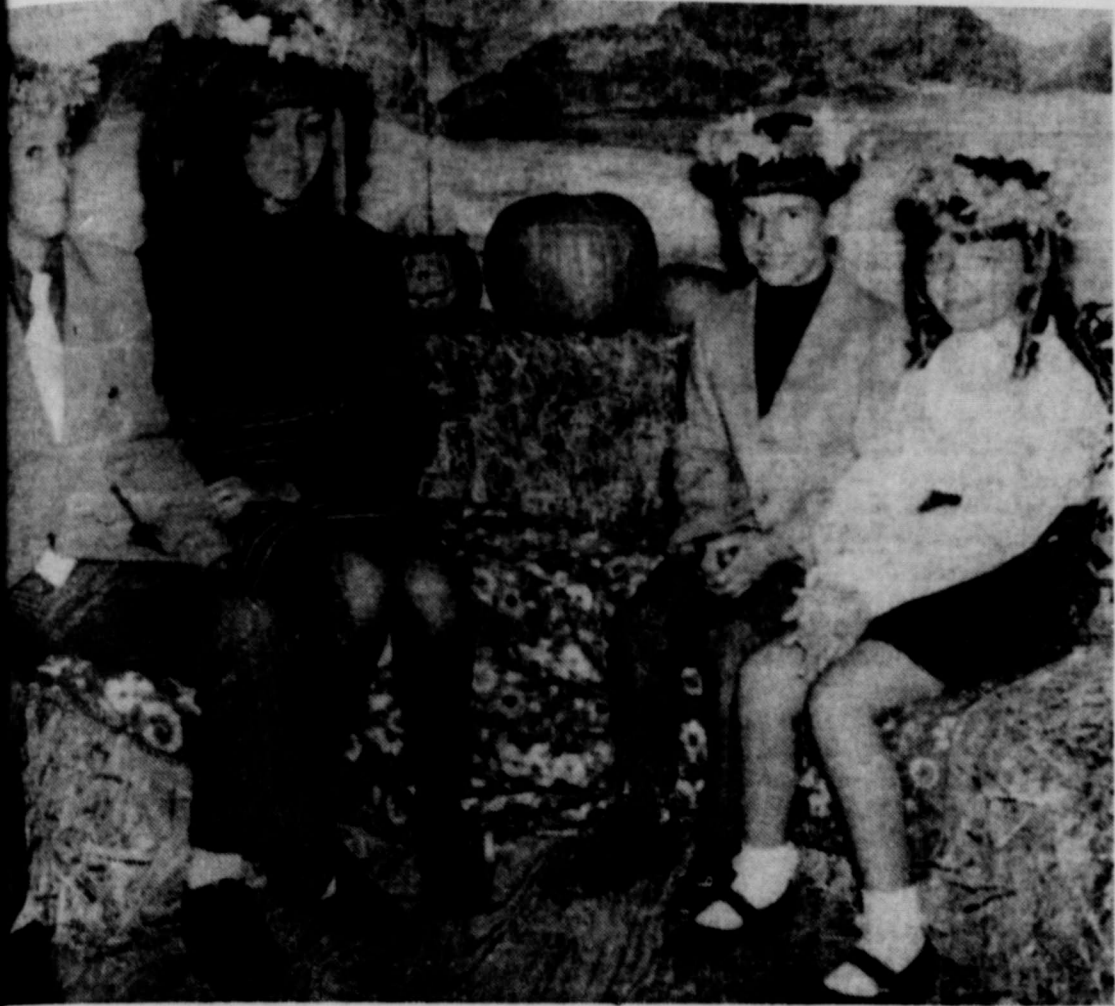

The Hico Tigers swing back into action Friday night, going to Lometa to tangle with the hot and cold Hornets in a crucial district game. The contest is a "must win" game for the Tigers to keep their slate clean and set up the show-down game with Gorman a week from Friday.

The Hornets have had their ups and down this year, winning four games and losing four, but only last week played heavy favorite Gorman to a

close 8-0 halftime score before opening the gates and letting the Panthers romp for 30 more points in the final two quarters.

Last year, Lometa battled the favored Tigers right down to the wire before losing 20-12, but in 1969, the Hornets spoiled Hico's homecoming by clobbering the locals 42-6.

The Tigers used the open date last week to heal minor wounds, and the team is expected to be in the best condi-

tion since the opener.

## VETERAN'S HOLIDAY NOVEMBER 11TH

Next Thursday, November 11, is when the majority of Hico businesses will close up shop in observance of Veteran's Day.

In setting up town holidays last January, a Civic Club committee voted to maintain Veteran's Day on Nov. 11 instead of the fourth Monday in October.

As far as is known here, the bank and post office will be the only two businesses remaining open next Thursday. Both institutions were compelled to take the fourth Monday holiday. Postmaster Harry Hudson said that rural delivery would be as usual, and regular window service would be available.

## City Council Has Lengthy Session

Hico City Council spent nearly two and one-half hours in their regular session Monday night, and most of the meeting was devoted to discussions of various projects either underway at present time or proposed in the future.

First order of business was a session with local trash haulers, who were ordered at the last meeting to find some place to take old appliances and auto bodies with an eye toward cleaning up certain sections of the town. Neither of the three men present had been able to find a suitable place to haul the rubbish. Mayor O. L. Davis and Councilman Wayne Rutledge informed the group that such a location had been found, and in-

structed the haulers to start moving the refuse just as soon as possible, which all three agreed to do.

Raymond Loyl met with the Council on a tax matter concerning the rendition placed on a vacant lot behind his home. The Council agreed to investigate the matter. Another tax matter on mobile home renditions was also discussed.

Davis reported that the housing project was 85 percent complete, with final completion expected around Dec. 8. The mayor also noted some changes that have been authorized for the Community Center, foremost being the change from sheetrock to paneling in the interior. The group also discussed furnishings for the Center, and a possible rental fee to be charged.

Other discussions centered around the current paving program, possible sale of city-owned lots, drilling and equipping a new water well to be located in the eastern part of town, and a short discussion on the possibility of beautifying Main Street by curbing the center section and preventing parking in that area. No action was taken on any of the proposals.

Only other item of business was changing the meeting time from 7:30 to 6:30 p.m. on the first Monday night of each month.

## Loot Galore Awaits Area Deer Hunters

Two valuable deer rifles will be given away during the approaching deer season, which opens Saturday, Nov. 13, by two Hico merchants.

Jackson's Superette, who has given away a rifle the past two years, will again present a gun for the trophy buck bagged in this area.

Blair's Hardware, who entered the give-away program last year, will also give a rifle for the heaviest deer checked at the store.

C. R. Jackson, who owns the grocery firm along with his son, said this week that he would give a new .243 caliber Deluxe Savage rifle to a hunter bagging the deer with the widest beam. The winner will be determined by measuring the widest point inside the horns and for uniformity. In case of a tie amount of points will determine the winner.

Horns which have been sawed off the head will be disqualified, and to be eligible for the prize, the

deer must have been killed within a 20-mile radius of Hico. All measurements must be made at Jackson's, whose decision on the winner will be final.

In the heaviest buck contest, the deer must be weighed at Blair's and must have been bagged within a 20-mile radius of Hico. Field-dressed weight only will be considered.

The rifle to be given away by Blair's is a 30.30 caliber.

Both contests were popular with area hunters last year, with many deer being brought here from surrounding leases.

The deer harvest is expected to be heavy here this year, due to ideal conditions and habitat for the animals. Last season saw one of the largest kills in history for this area.

The season opens 30 minutes before sunrise November 13, and continues through Sunday, Jan. 2.

## Hamilton County Eligible for Redevelopment Funds

Judge H. W. Standifer this week that official notification has been received that Hamilton County is now eligible for the programs of Economic Development Administration.

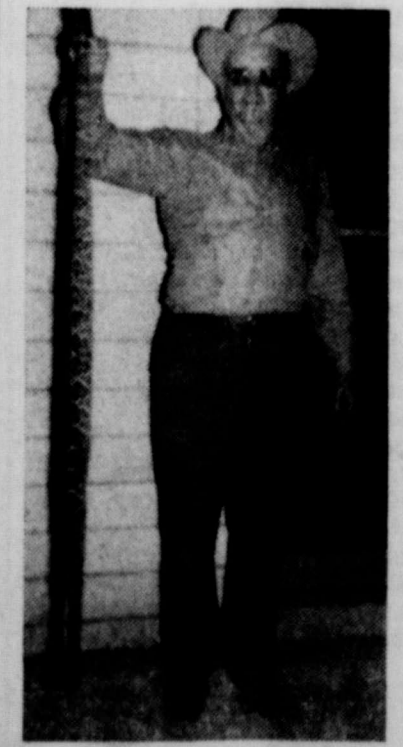
Standifer pointed out that designation will provide eligibility for certain types of federal projects which have not been available to Hamilton County prior to this week.

several years of the Central Texas Economic Development District, which assists local areas to make use of the EDA and other Federal programs in efforts to improve the economy and increase employment in Central Texas. Judge Standifer has just been re-elected to a second consecutive term as Vice-Chairman of this organization. In addition to Judge Standifer, other members of the Board of Directors from Hamilton County are: Don Haile, Executive Director, O. L. Davis of Hico, Bervie A. Turner, Keith Curry and Claude Gautier.

While the county must take some further actions to complete its final designation, when this is done governmental units and non-profit development organizations will be eligible for grants and loans for

public works and development facilities which provide new jobs; and potential new industries will be eligible for low-interest loans and loan guarantees. Applicants in previously eligible Central Texas areas have received about \$7 million dollars of federal assistance from job-creating projects with a total value of over \$12 million over the past four years. Manpower training and technical assistance projects can also be assisted through this program when EDA program requirements can be met.

Judge Standifer stated that he is expecting further instructions and information from EDA in the next few days and that the opportunities which this new program is expected to open up may have great importance to Hamilton County in the future.

## On the Home Range

Consumers in the United States lose about four billion dollars a year through gyms and fraud. The only way consumers can guard against such losses is to learn to recognize dishonest business gimmicks.

A popular gimmick is the promise of a free gift. Best remember, very few things are really free with no strings attached. Businessmen who made a habit of giving away free goods and services cannot make a profit or stay in business. Consumers, then, should investigate before being taken by claims such as "free" and "low, low prices," consumers usually get no better quality than they pay for.

Another attention-getter is "you have been selected." You probably were selected because your name is next in the telephone book, or because your house happens to be next in the block.

Watch for the "supply is limited" claim. Often the supply really is limited, but this is not always the case. The company may be over-stocked and the salesmen instructed to push the product. For some reason, the product may not sell on its own.

"If you get 10 buyers, it's yours free" is a phrase usually spouted by door-to-door salesmen. Be cautious: you may not be able to get buyers for the product, and the salesman may have already covered the neighborhood. Or you may not really want to sell the product to neighbors.

A product that "can't be purchased in the store" may be a good product from a reputable company. Many well-known companies conduct their business only through door-to-door salesmen. Dishonest businesses may also operate through direct contact, peddling low quality, poor merchandise. So be on the alert.

"Formerly \$30, now \$10" is another gimmick. Such a claim is not always legitimate; the original price may never have existed.

Always beware, then, of unrealistic promises. Watch out for "too good to be true" and "something for nothing" signals. Remember, legitimate bargains come and go everyday—but so do frauds. Take your time spending money on anything questionable.

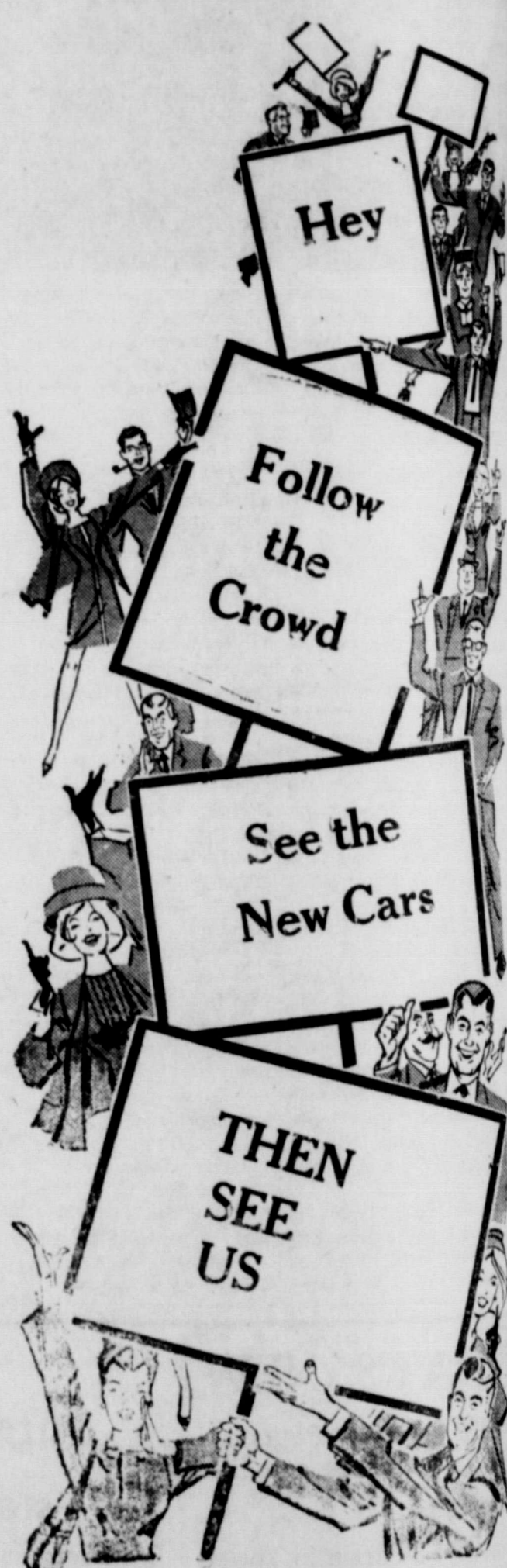

Voter registration in Hamilton County was lagging considerably last week, according to Pearl Williams, Tax Assessor-Collector, who made her official October visit to Hico last Thursday.

Mrs. Williams said that very few registration forms had been completed properly and returned to her office through mid-week.

With the deadline for registering more flexible this year, Mrs. Williams said that she feared many people would fail to qualify for voting privileges. A voter may now register any time 31 days prior to any election.

The law was changed from the previous January 31 deadline to 31 days prior, which means that people may wait until March 1 to qualify, since the first election of the year will be held April 1. Both city and school balloting will be held on the first Saturday in April.

A plentiful supply of registration forms are available at the News Review, and those who haven't received a form may secure same there.

1972 shapes up as being one of the biggest political years in his-

tory, from both a national and state level. Unrest among people about the national political scene is sure to inspire more voting, and the recent scandals in state government is expected to bring voters out in record numbers. Predictions are that not a single political figure in Austin will escape having at least one opponent.

In Hamilton County, it is a com-

plete new ball game, where residents will have the privilege of voting for a new State Representative, new State Senator, and a new Congressman. All this was brought about by shuffling of districts by court order.

## Prussic Acid Poisoning Threat To Livestock Producers

Hybrid sorghum-sudan pastures, fast growing and excellent forage for livestock, can also be deadly during the fall grazing season.

The plant's own enzymes break down plant material and this results in prussic acid poisoning for animals which eat the forage, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The actual agent causing death is hydrogen cyanide. "Prussic acid poisoning generally occurs at two times," explained Armstrong. "It is especially prevalent after a frost that has damaged plants. Also, poisoning occurs when plants perk up and begin fast growth after a very droughty period."

Hay that is improperly cured can also present prussic acid poisoning problems for a short time.

Hydrogen cyanide is very volatile and therefore stays in the plants for only a short time. But while it is present, animals must be kept off the pasture for a few days, cautions the veterinarian.

"In severe cases, cows exhibiting symptoms when the veterinar-

ian is called may be dead before he can arrive," points out Armstrong. "He will probably be able to save only those which are still breathing."

The veterinarian also urges farmers and ranchers to be on the lookout for nitrate poisoning that may occur during the late fall on winter pastures when there is a lot of cloudy weather.

"Under these conditions, the plants, instead of growing and changing nitrates into protein, just accumulate the nitrates," explained Armstrong. "Animals must also be taken off these pastures until the plants have had a chance to grow and convert the nitrates to protein."

Armstrong noted that the blood of animals that have died from nitrate poisoning will be chocolate brown, while those dying from prussic acid poisoning will be cherry red.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

With a sigh of relief you mow the lawn for the last time for this season and shove the mower into the corner until Spring. I am sure we have all felt this way, but think how much better you will feel if your equipment is ready to go when you need it next Spring.

If the mower has been hard to start, maybe it needs new plugs, points and a carburetor cleaning. Surprise your small appliance repairman and bring it to him when he has time to repair it properly before you need it again. If it does not need an overhaul, at least drain out the gas, then start it up and allow the engine to run until all gas in the fuel system is used. This will prevent a gummed-up carburetor next Spring. Clean out the oil filter, change the oil in the crankcase, and sharpen the blade.

Other chores that should be taken care of during the winter months include sharpening tools and coating all metal surfaces with a light film of oil to prevent rust. A light application of linseed oil to wooden handles will aid in keeping them smooth and easy to use. Clean out sprayers and check for worn or damaged parts, oil the leather plunger cap in the pump to keep it from drying out. Coil up water hoses in a convenient location. You may need to use these throughout the winter to prevent drought damage to evergreen shrubs and to the lawn. An old bucket fastened to the wall with screws or nails through the bottom makes an excellent hanger for water hoses as it won't allow kinks to develop in the hose.
