## Hico-Gorman Set For Big Shoot-Out

What was it they called the Texas-Arkansas grid contest last year? "Shoot-Out No. 2?" Well, the billing appears to be appropriate for the Friday night contest here to be played by Class B giants Hico and Gorman. Last year's game, won by the Tigers in bitter cold at Gorman, could be labeled as shoot-out No. 1, and this year's contest bears a striking resemblance to the last one.

Remember, if you will, that the Tigers were underdogs last season, but played one of their better games to down the Panthers 15-8 to stay alive in district play.

This year, both teams are undefeated in district action, with Hico sporting a perfect 8-0 slate for the season and Gorman only a step behind with a 7-1 chart, losing only to Class A power DeLeon by a mere 14-6.

Winner of the Friday game will probably be the district champions, as each team will have only one game remaining. Hico closes the season with Evant, while Gorman must still play tough Meridian.

The two teams have played three common opponents, and Gorman's record is more impressive against the three

teams. Hico downed Dublin 12-0 while Gorman was defeating the same team 24-6. Hico barely got by Rising Star 7-6 and Gorman blitzed the 'Cats 44-12. The Panthers jumped on Lometa for a 38-0 win, while the Tigers were managing only a 26-12 margin. But past records don't mean anything, and the contest Friday night will probably be won by the team making the fewest mistakes.

A typical Gorman team will come to town—not too large, but long on speed, and they can throw the ball, so fans can expect to see plenty of action in the 7:30 p.m. contest.

## Tigers Stun Lometa 26-12 To Remain Undefeated

In a game that featured a lot of offensive punch by both teams, Hico's Tigers ground out a 26-12 victory over the Lometa Hornets last week at Lometa. The win was victory No. 8 for the Tigers, and sets up the big shoot-out with Gorman this Friday night.

The Tigers got touchdowns from four different players in the Hornet contest, which featured a lot of action. Both teams were able to move the ball, but the Tigers were in command all the way.

After a scoreless first quarter, Hico bounced back to put two markers on the board in the second period and one in each of the final two stanzas. Lometa got on the scoreboard with a second period TD, and another in the fourth quarter. The first period could have been demoralizing for the Tigers, as they saw two scoring threats float away by the fumble route. The Tigers moved to the 25 on the first possession before fumbling, and again to the eight

where still another bobble kept them out of the end zone.

But Hico was not to be denied and they marched 54 yards in 7 plays early in the second quarter for the first TD of the game. Galen Lindsey scooted in from five yards out, kicked the extra point against a stiff wind, and the Tigers were out front 7-0.

The margin was cut to 7-6 only four plays later, as the Hornets took the kickoff at their own 33 and blitzed to the end zone. Senior halfback Tommy Maddox scored from 40 yards out.

The Tigers really began to move on their next possession, rolling 70 yards in 13 plays to score. Quarterback Benny Baley city-slickered the hosts on the TD play, tossing a short pass to Buddy Mayfield for five yards and the score. Mayfield was wide open, but had to make a high leaping catch to bring the ball in. Lindsey's kick was again true, and the Tigers were out front 14-6.

Following the kickoff, Lometa went to a hurry-up offense, and nearly caught the Tigers before the half ended. They traveled 59 yards to the eight before Lindsey intercepted on the last play of the half.

Hico took the second half kickoff 65 yards in eleven plays for the TD that proved to be the clincher. Baley sneaked the final yard of the drive for the score, upping the count to 20-6.

The Tigers started their last scoring drive late in the third quarter, which was climaxed in the fourth period when Danny Polk hit the end zone from one yard out, making the count read 26-6. The 73-yard drive took 13 plays and nearly half of the fourth quarter.

Following the kickoff, Lometa went 56 yards in six plays, with speedster Maddox again scoring from 40 yards out. But that was the ball game, and the Tigers remained tied for the loop lead with a 2-0 record.

## Farm Electric Short Course Slated Here

A Farm Electrification short course on electric motors for adult farmers will be held Nov. 29-Dec. 2 under the sponsorship of the Hico High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. O. C. Cook, Superintendent and Mr. Harld Walker, ag teacher.

Mr. Bob Jaska, Farm Electrification specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at A&M.

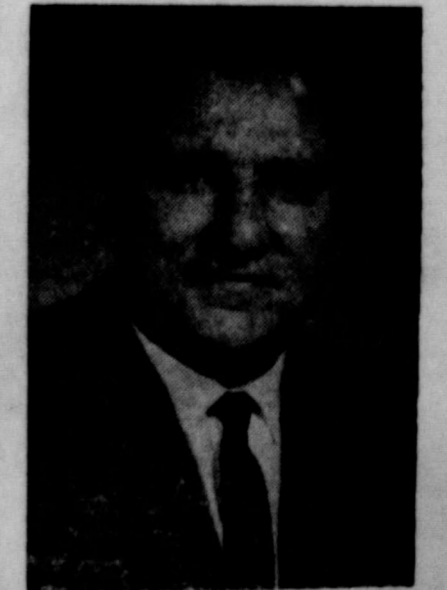
Mr. Jaska holds a Master's Degree in Agricultural Engineering. Since 1947 he has been prominent in research work in Farm Electrification at A&M, in addition to teaching in the Ag Department. His research and field work carried him over the entire state so that he is very familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farm. He joined the Agricultural Education Specialist program in 1958 as Farm Electrification Specialist and has served as coordinator of the entire program since 1962.

The short course here is scheduled to begin Nov. 29 at 7 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings of the four series will be Nov. 30, Dec. 1 and 2. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Jaska will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Walker.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or

call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Cook, or Mr. Walker. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Certificates will be presented to each farmer who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Jaska said that the course could be adjusted to wishes and interests of the farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to select, protect, maintain, and ground electric motors, how to reverse and change motors from 120V to 240V operation, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.

**UPGRADING** — Workers upgrading C&B Pole Line Company have been busy in the area the past two weeks burying new telephone lines for Gulf States-United Telephone Co. At present the company is burying 23 miles along FM 1241 to the community and surrounding areas to provide one party service to customers. Upon completion of project, the contractors

will move to Hico for additional work, burying telephone cables to the Duffau and surrounding communities. Depending on the weather, the \$49,000 project should be completed by Christmas and upgraded service from multi-party lines can be made. Tom Venable, Gulf States-United manager, said that eventually, all lines in the rural Hico area would be put underground.

## Deer Season Opens Saturday Morning

Hunters by the hundreds are expected to converge on the Hico area this weekend for the opening of the 1971 venison harvest, which begins Saturday morning before sunrise.

Conditions for a good opening are bright, with deer plentiful than they have been in years, and the whitetails in excellent condition. Good weather and the deer are fat. The proper time added lush vegetation in this area were early in the year, with all land suitable for the sport.

Deer season runs from Saturday, Nov. 13 through Sunday, Jan. 3. Shooting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset.

**Big Buck Contests.** Big buck contests are being held here again this year, sponsored by Jackson's Superette and Hardware.

Contests will again present a hunter bringing in the set of horns, and Blair's will award a rifle for the deer with the most, field dressed. In the contest, the horns are attached to the head or disqualified.

In the contests, the deer must be killed within a 20-mile radius of Hico, and must be checked by the sponsoring businesses. The management in the contests will be final, and the winner will be awarded at the end of the season.

**Deer Processing.** According to some reports, Vos-

burg Locker Plant will be able to process deer for hunters this year, according to E. R. Vosburg, owner. Many locker plants over the State will not be able to do so because of inspection requirements.

**Quail Season.** In a late release from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., quail season in Hamilton County was set from December 1 through Feb. 15. The dates are a change from last year's, which were from Nov. 12 through Feb. 15.

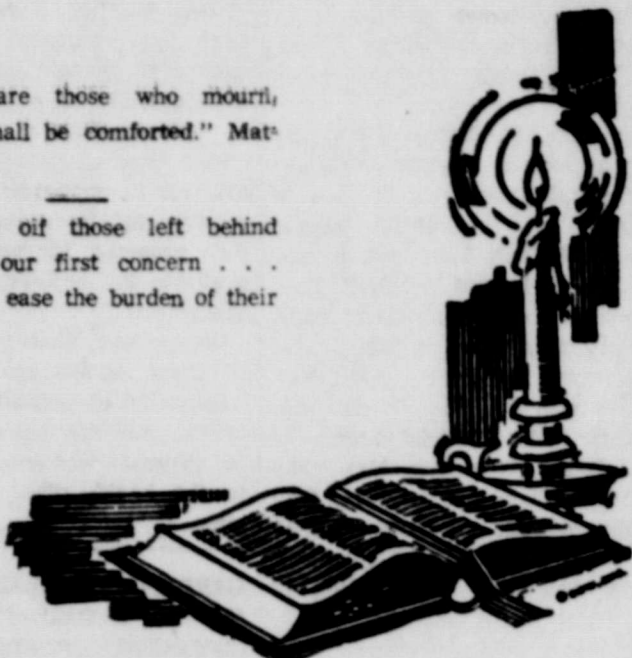

## MRS. MARSHALL PRESENTS PROGRAM ON 'AMERICANISM' AT REVIEW CLUB MEETING

The home of Mrs. Morse Ross was the setting for the regular meeting of Hico Review Club on Thursday, Nov. 4.

The hostess served her guests a dessert plate, after which Mrs. D. E. Bulloch, president, presided over a brief business meeting in which members voted to give contributions to several Texas Federation Projects, and made plans concerning the annual Tasting Tea and Bazaar to be held Dec. 2 at Bluebonnet Country Club.

Mrs. J. C. Braune stirred members with her reading of Patrick Henry's famous speech delivered before the Virginia Convention of delegates in 1775.

Speaker for the afternoon program was Mrs. Marvin Marshall, whose topic was "Editorially Speaking—Our Country Right or Wrong."

Prefacing her remarks, Mrs. Marshall told of the deep influence that her father had welded on her thinking through his example of political awareness and deep pride in his country. She stated that she is, by nature, prejudiced for her country.

Mrs. Marshall's remarks in her talk were quoted from ideals expressed by many of America's outstanding writers, critics and editorialists. She recommended the reading of an autobiography of George Washington, "He Lived in the Hearts of His Countrymen," by Robert Fleming. This book gives a graphic picture of a man who, though vilified by writers of his time, has come through to us as Father of his Country and first leader of the greatest government conceived by man.

In quoting George Pulliam, Mrs. Marshall stated that the liberal press who worked the hardest at pushing JFK into involvement in Vietnam and were instrumental in furthering action there in later years, are now the group who cry the loudest and criticize the most concerning our presence there. Mr. Pulliam quotes a senator who feels no concern for America's POW's because he says they didn't need to be there.

In an article in a recent copy of Deader's Digest, writer George Bale pleads with the citizenry not to turn against the military who have been held back from doing a proper job by an unsympathetic press.

Howard K. Smith has recently stated that a vindictive press who pressured LBJ into not running for re-election are now very busy in their project to assassinate Richard Nixon.

Mr. Ernest Cuneo, who writes the editorial column, "National Whirligig" puts in a desperate plea for our nation's Navy, who have had a glorious history of being our nation's mainstay in every war of America's past. He says that we must keep our Navy first class; that Russian submarines now control the Mediterranean and have five times the fire power of ours. Admiral Rickover warns that we are patrolled by the Russian Navy in the Atlantic, Pacific, and the Gulf of Mexico, and that they possess the potential to hit and destroy any city in the nation.

Hanson Baldwin, in an article in the November Reader's Digest, has stated that our young men have

been repelled from the idea of serving in the armed services because our country has put its military to public trial for the first time in history. He believes that the military in our country is in grave trouble.

Dick West in a column in the Dallas Morning News points out that while our army has been projected to be reduced to 800,000 men in the next six months the Russian military strength has doubled in the last five years. He calls on us as Americans to realize that Russia "is not a Eutopia; that we are practically in one ourselves." He asks us to wake up to the fact that a man can rise to greater heights here than anywhere else in the world and to see that we do care for our own in that we voluntarily give freely to the United Fund and other organizations to help the unfortunate.

Mrs. Marshall closed her remarks by relating three stories of persons that have been published recently in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. The first concerns Eileen Erlich, who was born in Syria and who is now married to an American and is an RN at Carswell Air Force Base. She is shocked and cannot understand why Americans seem determined to run themselves down.

The second story is about Phil Capers, a TCU student, who being dissatisfied with the "establishment," went to Europe, saw, heard and experienced enough to know that there is nothing wrong in our country that he cannot help to change through working and helping here. He is back in school now and wants to do all he can to help to improve his own country.

Berl Cabral, a former native of Mexico and his wife and 15 children live happily in America and sing songs of praise and happiness each night about their adopted country.

A last success story concerns Harmon Kelly of Cameron, a black man who works for Alcoa in Rockdale. In the past two years, four or five children of the family have received degrees. The first, a son, received his M.D. at University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston; the second graduated from the Peabody Conservatory; the third received her master's degree in music from Prairie View; and the fourth completed his BBA at Prairie View. A last son, very talented musically, is still in high school.

Club members were reminded in closing that every citizen in every walk of life owes his allegiance to his country. It is our privilege and our duty.

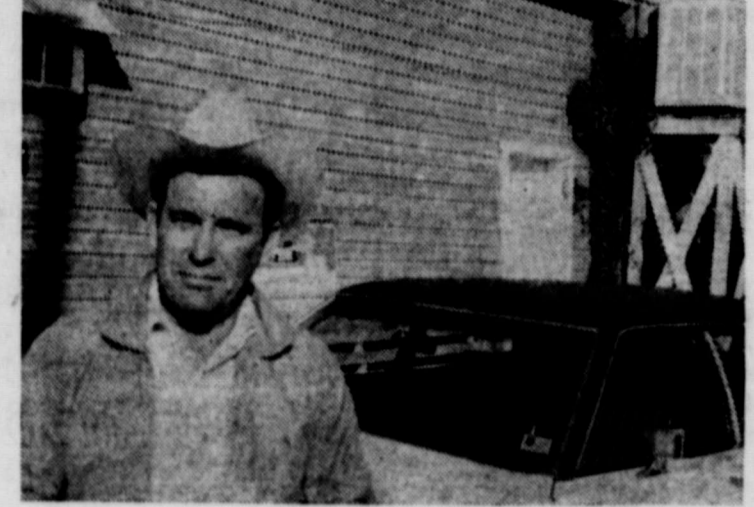

**COUNTY AGENT**  
By **JOE ALLEN**

The smell of an 18c hog is not as pleasant as the smell of a 25c hog. Because of this, we often fall short on good sound management practices. This results in less profit even at the same price.

Dr. Bill Thomas, Swine Specialist for the Extension Service, will present a program on good sound management practices in the District Courtroom on Nov. 15 at 7:30 p.m.

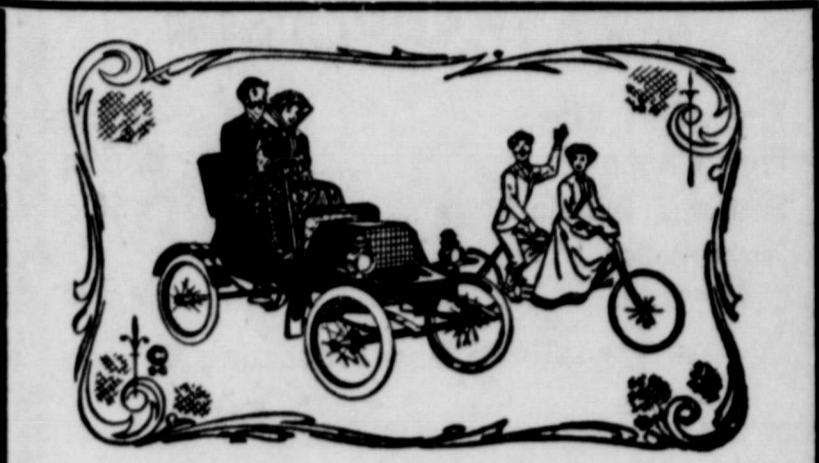
As harvest operations are completed, producers in Hamilton County will be plowing under the crop residue and preparing the land for next season's crop. However, the soil should not be worked with heavy equipment while it is wet to avoid plow pans.

Plow pans are compacted zones in the soil that may form as a result of the compressing action of cultural implements on wet or overly moist soils. Medium and moderately fine-textured soils are particularly susceptible to this hazard. Plow pans can seriously reduce soil productivity by restricting root penetration and the downward flow of water in the soil.

Plow pans become a problem most often when a field is plowed to the same depth with the same type of tillage implement for sev-

eral years. Therefore, the depth of tillage and the type of plow should be varied from year to year.

If producers have experienced problems with plow pans in some of their fields, the soil's physical conditions can be improved temporarily by deep sub-soiling and chiseling. But preventing the plow pan from developing in the first place by good soil, crop, and residue management is much more effective and economical practice.

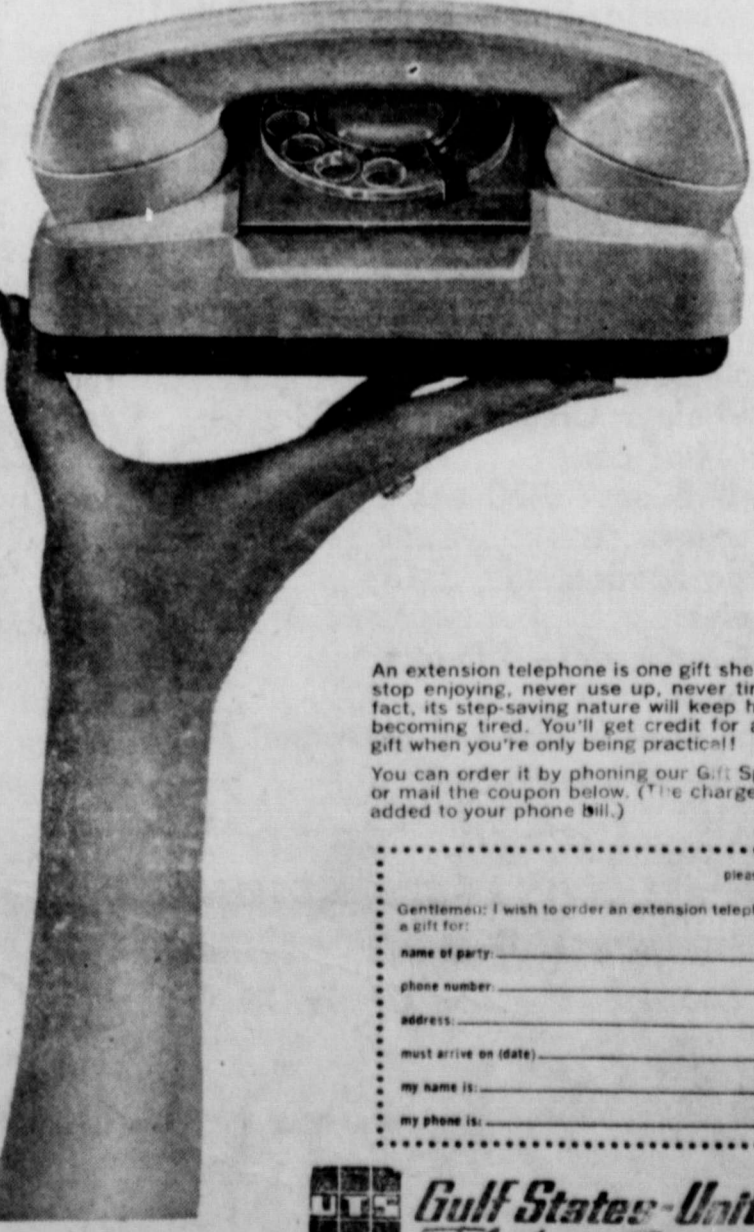
