## Local Stadium Lights Will Be Changed

A drive was started this week to completely replace existing lighting facilities at Hico Tiger Stadium, and through Tuesday noon, \$320.00 had been contributed to the fund.

Eighty light fixtures have been purchased from Tarleton State College at a cost of \$800.00, and leaders in the movement estimated that about \$2,000.00 would be needed to change out existing fixtures and replace with the new.

Funds are being accepted at First National Bank, and anyone desiring to contribute to the needed project may deposit monies there.

The present lighting facilities were erected in 1938, and have for many years been inadequate. A savings of several thousand dollars can be made by purchasing the used fixtures from Tarleton.

## Indian Stadium is Site of History Making Contest

Hico and Santa Anna, two Central West Texas Class B football powers, will meet Friday night at 7:30 in Indian Stadium, Comanche, in a showdown for the bi-district title for districts 17 and 18-B.

Both teams, the Tigers and the Mountaineers, have excellent season records, with Hico sporting a 10-0 slate and Santa Anna an 8-2. Both teams were undefeated in District play.

Comanche was selected as the game site last Tuesday night in a meeting of officials from the two schools. Comanche Jaycees will host the contest, furnishing programs, tickets, etc., while retaining the concession rights. Stephenville and Brownwood also made bids for the games, but Comanche was selected because of location, being an equal distance from both towns.

Not too much is known about the Mountaineers, except that they are big and powerful. Their season record (game by game) wasn't available, but Hico got to the playoffs—the first time in history as far as can be determined—by defeating ten straight opponents.

The Tigers started their grind to bi-district with an opening 19-12 win over Glen Rose, followed with a 12-0 verdict over Dublin, stopped Godley 28-6, downed Grandview 33-12, barely nudged Rising Star 7-6, and toyed with Stephenville JV 34-18 before district action started.

The Tigers jumped a major hurdle by downing Meridian 29-12 to start district play, and followed with a 26-12 win over Lometa to set up what was supposed to be the biggest game of the year, with Gorman. The locals got their highest point production of the previous eight games in dumping

the Panthers 40-14, setting the stage for the easy 55-20 romp over Evant in the season finale.

The Rising Star and Meridian games proved to be the toughest, scoring-wise for the Tigers, but in the Rising Star contest, the locals missed out 6 times on scoring opportunities due to penalties, fumbles, etc. The Meridian game was perhaps the hardest played during the entire season, with the contest going right down to the wire before the Tigers proved superior.

In reflecting on the Tigers' 10-0 season, no one can be found who would dispute the belief that this is the first time in history that the locals have had an undefeated season. Records at the News Review only go back to 1929, and in those 42 years the Tigers have never won a district championship.

In rolling to the perfect mark, The Tigers scored 274 points to the opposition's 112, which is indicative of the desire, effort, and balance of the team. Linemen never come in for their fair share of the credit, but the only three seniors on the squad, Cecil Holley, Lee Ramage and Chuck Bowden, led the charges all through the season to accomplish the almost-impossible feat of scoring ten straight victories. They were the leaders, and usually popped up with the big play. And don't forget the other linemen. Smallest man listed among the starters was little Jim Turner, who turned in superior performances against players much, much larger than his 135 (questionable) pounds. Tony Mayfield, Buddy Mayfield, Leroy Grice, Ken Woolsey, Brian Jones, Curtis Haley and Jan Christian were other linemen who played remarkably well in the drive to the championship. Walter

Lucas, a freshman, was another who helped the team much more than he has publicly been given credit.

In the backfield, everyone knows who the leaders were—Galen Lindsey, Benny Baley, Danny Polk, Galen Christian, Danny Kennedy—all underclassmen who will have to be contended with another year. Each had superior performances in separate games. Roy Edwards and Steve Crawford also helped in the cause.

The season has also been satisfying to the coaching staff, who suffered much disappointment last year by losing the district crown to Meridian. Ed Pettitt, Jimmie Ramage and new-comer Carl Guthrie led the charges this season.

Pettitt, in three years as head man at Hico, has compiled a 24-6 (won-lost) record, leading the Tigers to a 7-3 season in 1969, compiling an identical 7-3 in 1970, and coming back with this year's 10-0 reading.

The Tigers have a 13-game winning streak going, closing the 1970 season with three wins, to chalk up the longest winning streak in this area. Not since October 24, 1969 have the Tigers been defeated in a home game.

Every man on the team realizes the importance of the Santa Anna game, and know that to reach this stage in a season, a team must be tough, so respect for the Mountaineers won't be lacking in the contest.

The Comanche stadium is large enough that plenty of good seats will be available, and the largest crowd in perhaps all of Hico history will witness the contest. Admission will be \$1.75 for adults and 75c for students.

## Tigers Down Evant 55-20 For Perfect 10-0 Season

Hico raced for three touchdowns in the first quarter and three more in the second period to post a 41-6 halftime lead, and then coasted to a 55-20 easy victory over the Evant Elks in the final game of the regular season last Friday night at Evant.

In another game of interest to local fans, Meridian pushed Gorman into third place in the district standings by downing the Panthers 20-14.

In the Hico-Evant game, the Tigers used but three plays to put six points on the board. Benny Baley passed complete to Galen Christian for 35 yards and the TD.

Evant bounced right back with a score of their own, with Mike Grba passing 48 yards to Rex Brown for the tying points.

But their hopes were short lived as the Tigers again used but three plays to get more points. Galen Lindsey took off on a 60-yard scamper to the two yard line, and Baley sneaked in the TD. Lindsey ran for two points and the

Tigers were out front 14-6.

After allowing the Elks one series of downs, the Tigers took a punt on the Evant 47, and wham. On the first play, Baley lofted a pass to Leroy Grice who rambled the 47 yards to the end zone. Lindsey's kick was good, upping the count to 21-6.

A pass interception by Buddy Mayfield late in the first period set the stage for Hico's first TD in the second quarter. Christian moved for six to the mid-field stripe, Danny Polk hit for 11 to the 39, Baley threw to Grice for 11 to the 28, and then the quarterback moved the final 28 yards for the TD. Kick by Lindsey was good and the score was upped to 28-6.

A series of three turn-overs—two by Evant and one by Hico—set the stage for the next marker. Cecil Holley intercepted a stray Elk pass for the first, Hico fumbled the ball back to the Elks, and then Evant returned the compliment by fumbling back to the Tigers.

Taking possession at the Elk 39,

Baley roamed for 20 yards to the 19, Lindsey picked up 11 more to the eight, then Polk scooted through for the TD. Again Lindsey's kick was good, running the count to 35-6.

Two series of downs later, the Elks recovered a Tiger fumble at their own 1, and cranked up a 99-yard drive, using 7 plays to score. Big play in the drive was an 81-yard scamper by Doug Freeman to the Hico 12. Mike Grba got the score on a three-yard run, making the count read 35-12.

But the Tigers weren't through in the first half. They recovered an Elk fumble at the 36, and on the first play Polk scampered the distance. Points were missed, and the Tigers went to the dressing room with a 41-12 halftime lead.

Hico's other two TD's for the night came on a 30-yard run by Polk and a 2-yard run by Lindsey. Both conversions were good making the count 55-12. Evant got their final marker late in the game on a 2 yard run by Doug Freeman and a run for the two points by Grba.

## Two in Race For New State Senatorial District Post

political year rolled around as two candidates announced this week that they would make a bid for the newly created 24th Senatorial District seat. The two candidates, from the most eastern and most western portions of the district, are Grant Jones of Hico and Tom Moore of Waco.

Mr. Jones, currently serving as a Representative, in making an announcement, said "Response in state government is the one issue. With state spending increasing at the rate it is, the demands of the people require responsible elected officials to determine the necessary means with equitable funding." The campaign progresses.

Jones indicated he will issue statements as to his beliefs on important issues presented to him by the voters in the new district.

Jones is an Abilene businessman and civic leader. He is married and has a son, Morgan Andrew, in law school at Texas Tech, and a daughter, Janet, at SMU. Jones is on the official board of the St. Paul United Methodist Church. He is serving his fourth term as a member of the House of Representatives.

Moore announced his intentions of seeking the Senate seat at press conferences held in Waco and Abilene, the two major cities at opposite ends of the new district.

He said his campaign will be based on the necessity for legislative reform and will represent a continuation of his fight for honest state government which started with his leadership of the so-called "Dirty 30" reform group during the 62nd session of the Texas Legislature.

Currently serving in the House of Representatives from McLennan County, Moore has been active in Texas Democratic circles for a number of years. The 53-year-old native of Waco holds a law degree from Baylor University.

Moore was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1967 during a special election and has won two unopposed terms since.

He is active in the work of the Episcopal Church and has held every position for laymen including Senior Warden and member of the Executive Board of the Diocese of Texas.

Moore and his wife, Natalie, have three children, Mrs. John Harris of Waco, Margaret and Thomas P. Moore III, both of whom are students at the University of Texas, Austin.

Counties represented in the new 24th Senatorial District are Taylor, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Concho, McCulloch, San Saba, Mills, Lampasas, Hamilton, Coryell, Menard and McLennan.
