Goals Established By County EDA Steering Committee

Main order of business at the Monday meeting of a committee working on approval of Hamilton County as a member of the Economic Development Act was centered around approving goals to be established by the county organization.

After considerable discussion, the goals of the 12-county Central Texas District were adopted, with minor modifications.

The meeting, which drew 22 interested participants, was presided over by Chairman Bob Miller of Hamilton. Members of the committee from Hico attending were O. L. Davis, Roy Bates, W. R. Hampton and E. V. Meador.

Goals of the county group, as adopted in the Monday meeting, are:

1. To create and expand manufacturing industries based on local materials, agricultural products, labor availability and local factors.
2. To improve the quality, yield, processing and distribution of the agricultural sector.
3. To develop tourism by identifying and promoting the development and improvement of adaptable areas and individual attractions, and auxiliary facilities.
4. To improve the educational and vocational training system.
5. To create an adequate system of hospitals, homes and activity centers for the indigent, sick, aged, and the very young.
6. To encourage the development of sound and adequate housing.
7. To increase and improve water and sewer facilities.
8. To increase and improve recreational facilities.
9. To eliminate water and air pollution.
10. To improve cultural opportunities.

Two of the goals, numbers seven and nine, were modified in their priority listing by the county group, giving priority "A" to each instead of the "C" as listed in the district goals.

The Hico group presented a list of six immediate needs to be included in the application.

The six were: Extension of water and sewer facilities to the Northeast and Northwest sections of town; Purchase and install a 200,000 gallon overhead water tower in the Northeast section; Resurface 50 blocks of existing paving and 30 blocks of new paving; Widen old railroad bridge to new addition on the West side of town; Purchase old run-down houses in all areas of the city and request additional low-income dwellings; and extend additional water mains and fire plugs in areas which do not exist at present.

Gerald Nafe, assistant director of the Cen-Tex District, met with the group, and said that approximately three months would be required to secure approval for Hamilton County.

Former Resident Financed His Theatre Tickets Selling Buttermilk

"If you want to go to the show, go out and sell buttermilk!"

That's what an interested former Hico resident did many years ago to secure the admission price to Hico Theatre, presently in a refurbishing program, and expected to open within the next three weeks.

Joe A. (Babe) Wieser of Houston, who has been keeping abreast of the doings of the Civic Club members in their effort to re-open the entertainment facility, wrote the following letter—and enclosed a generous donation—to Ellis Randals at First National Bank:

"Please add this amount to your growing fund for the restoration of the old Hico Theatre. I should give more because I may have been one of the people that helped tear it up. I can remember in 1910 when they were showing the Perils of

Pauline, The Clutching Hand, and a lot of old silent films. I would sell Mrs. Trippet a gallon of buttermilk for 10¢ so that I could see the show on Saturday afternoon. I had to milk two cows to get the milk, and I did the churning too. While my father gave us 50¢ per week to cut the grass in the yard, I had four brothers who at times helped with that job. Sometimes I did it by myself and as you may know, that yard is big. That was 60 years ago. Ask someone if they remember a monkey called Hico that they had at that time. He would be sent up in a balloon with a parachute that would burn in a burning rope that would burn in two before he got so far out of town. So I know something about the old Hico Theatre. Also add the other check to the Hico Football Lighting Fund. I would like to be a part of the wonderful place where

I was born, and this is one way that I can be part of the city. With best wishes for a good year and success of your many programs for the young people of your city, J. A. (Babe) Wieser."

People far and wide have kept abreast of the local project, and many have responded with contributions.

In the meantime work was progressing on the remodeling, with walls plastered, a new roof, ceiling added to the ceiling, and other work on the front, etc.

WHEREAS, the City of Hico for many years was known far and wide for its outstanding beauty, and the Hico Garden Club wishes to see that image restored through personal participation of every citizen in this planting program, and

WHEREAS, the Hico Garden Club has initiated this project for the Mini-Park.

Many New Soil Conservation Practices Established in '71

During 1971 many land owners in the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District improved the environment and helped make this area a better place in live by establishing many conservation practices on the land.

Erosion was reduced and sedimentation was slowed down by many farmers and ranchers that established over 7,555 acres of cropland to grasses such as coastal bermuda, Kleingrass 75 and TAM winter hardingrass. Range seeding of native grasses was planted on 1598 acres. All of these newly planted grasses can be used by livestock, quail, deer and dove for food and

cover.

The soil at this time is full of moisture but livestock men, dove hunters and fishermen will appreciate the 185 new farm ponds established in the District this year. Most of these ponds have been stocked with fish.

Other soil and water conservation practices established to combat water pollution include 39,332 acres of proper range use of native grasses, 13,280 feet of diversion terraces, 107 acres of grassed waterways, and 78,613 feet of parallel terraces.

Brush control was done on many acres to improve the quality and quantity of native grasses. Many desirable trees were left to im-

prove the habitat of deer, dove and quail. Many other practices that will improve the environment were established.

During the past year 204 new or revised conservation plans were completed on 75,043 acres in the District by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service.

Considerable upstream and flood control watershed progress was made during the past year. Easements were cleared on four of the five sites in Pecan Creek Watershed. Most easements in the Hog Creek Watershed have been cleared, the only flood control dam in Hamilton County in the Upper Bosque River Watershed has been completed, surveying has been started in the Meridian Creek Watershed, and a great deal of interest in the Mustang-Plum Creek watershed has developed.

The District made considerable progress this year because of hard work done by the SCD Board of Directors composed of Carl King, Chairman, Homer Perryman, Vice Chairman, Paul Hinson, Secretary, Alfred Marwitz and Moody Courtney, members. 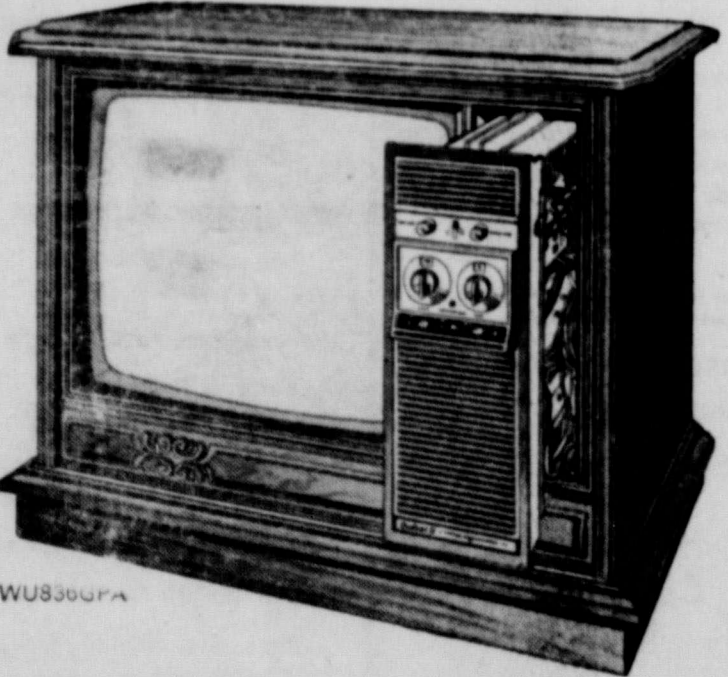
