Lone Star Gas Company Will Ask For Rate Increase

Second Shot Day April 30

Future Homemakers To State Convention Friday and Saturday

Miss Kathy Jaggars, newly elected President of Hico Future Homemakers, and Miss Charlotte Tucker, vice president-elect, will represent the local group at the 1972 state meeting of the Texas Association of Future Homemakers to be held at the Convention Center in Fort Worth April 21-22.

The meeting theme will be "We Can If I Will." More than 5,000 members and advisors representing 65,000 members in 1,600 chapters throughout the state are expected to attend. Keynote speaker will be Don Williams, Pepperdine University, Los Angeles.

Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, local homemaking teacher, will accompany the group. They will be housed in the Hotel Sheraton in downtown Fort Worth.

Second Rate Hike In Two Years Sought by Company

In a news release to the News Review, Lone Star Gas Company said that it would apply for residential and commercial rate increases from the cities and towns it serves on its distribution system. Lone Star stated that any residential and commercial rate increase would be limited to ten percent. The company serves 528 towns and cities in Texas, with over one million residential and commercial customers.

Mayor O. L. Davis told the News Review Wednesday morning that the increase request had not been received by the City, but it was expected in view of the news release.

Last rate increase granted Lone Star was in February, 1970, when the company had asked for a 25.36 percent raise in rates. After more than a month of bargaining, Hico City Council and Lone Star compromised on an increase of 19.75. The City had offered a 15 percent increase.

The application for rate increases, when presented to each city, will list increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money, and higher gross receipts, franchise and ad valorem taxes as primary reasons for Lone Star's income deficiency. According to the company, increases are needed in a substantial number of cities to enable it to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public.

It is estimated that when all rate requests are fully approved by the cities, Lone Star Gas Company will realize \$5.2 million in additional revenue, based on volumes sold to customers in 1971 but adjusted to normal weather conditions.

Lone Star is also requesting the cities to pass ordinances permitting automatic adjustment for the cost of gas.

'Pollution' is Topic For Club Program

The Hico Garden Club was privileged to meet in the beautiful new Community Center Friday afternoon. Mrs. Brents Witty of Hamilton presented an inspiring and informative program on pollution.

Mrs. Witty began her talk on "Air," stating that due to the large population, a need for more power plants, factories, cars, and fuel is needed, which creates smog.

The worst causes of smog are sulphur and carbon monoxide and cancer has doubled since the use of lead for greater speed.

Her second topic was "Water"—rivers are being used for waste disposal. Thermo pollution (hot water) kills plant life and fish in streams and lakes. Urban run-off is the biggest cause, and animal waste from feed lots is a bigger problem. Oxygen is depleted and it can't break up foreign matter. Solid waste is sewage that has nitrate and phosphate. This fertilizes plants and deteriorates water to a swamp. Then mercury comes from insecticides, and there is oil. E.P.A. is Environmental Protection Agency.

Other enemies in solid waste are bottles, nails, old clothes, old papers, old cars, planes, and "things" abandoned by the military.

Mrs. Witty told of ways to prevent waste. Don't throw away gift wrap, press it and re-use it. Write on both sides of paper; use washable cups and cloth hand towels and napkins. Use soda as a cleaning powder. Instead of insecticides, use spray garlic, onion spray and protect the lady bug and praying mandix.

Mrs. Roy Wilkins of Goldthwaite, District V Director, also was an inspiration to the local club. She brought the third place prize won by the Hico Club with a grade above 95 for their yearbook. Then she brought "Woodsie the Owl," symbol for ecology. She told the group, "Love and communicate to preserve and conserve this wonderful land of ours. The solution to pollution is you. Be informed, concerned, cooperate. Our children and grandchildren will play in gas masks. We cannot live. We are stewards of the land and we must act. Youth communication is outlook for 1972."

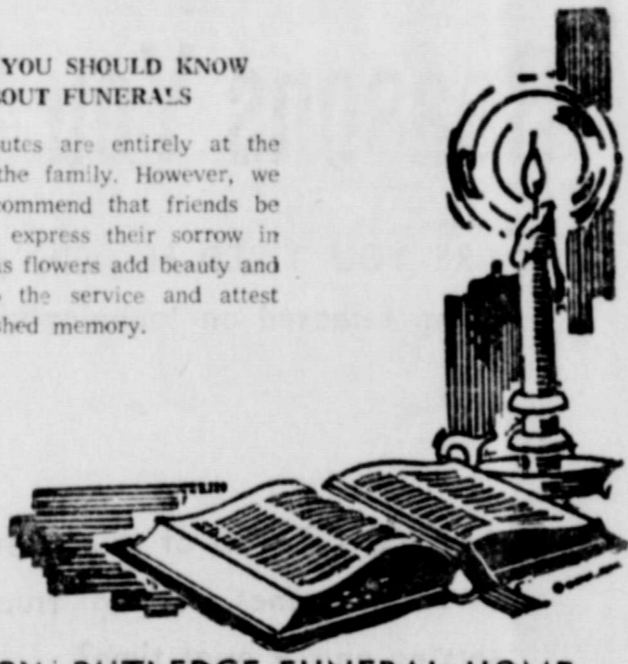

On the Home Range

By BERNADETTE KOLAR

Not everything grows big in Texas. At least, it doesn't have to. If you've got a green thumb, why not try your hand at bonsai?

Bonsai (pronounced bone-sigh) is the Japanese art of growing dwarfed, ornamental trees or shrubs in small, shallow pots.

For bonsai, choose a container-grown nursery plant such as a piniper or pine. One that's root-bound will have a partially trained root system and often will already have a stunted and interesting branch structure.

This is one time you will go to the nursery looking for the poorest landscape specimen they have. That's not to say good plants won't make fine bonsai, but the results may not be as instantaneous.

It is easiest to prune and shape the tree before taking out of the pan. Try duplicating an old tree you've seen growing under trying circumstances. For example, on a rocky slope in the hill country.

Here's how to plant bonsai:

Before removing the tree from its original container, cover the holes in the bonsai tray with wire screen and put in a layer of gravel or perlite for better drainage. Re-

move the root ball and trim it to fit the tray.

Finally, fill in the remaining space with a good potting soil and add rocks or moss for realism.

Place the plant in a shaded area for several weeks until it begins to get re-established and shows signs of new growth. Gradually you may move it to an area of higher light intensity. Most smaller bonsai are given some shade all the time, particularly in the afternoon.

Misting the foliage several times a day will also help to get the plant through this period of shock.

Texas has a number of native species worthy of consideration for bonsai. These include Japanese Holly, pomegranate, Chinese Redbud, Texas Elbony, Mexican Pinyon Pine and Yaupon.

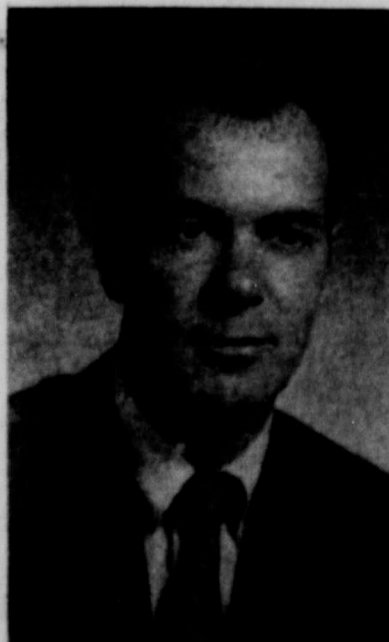

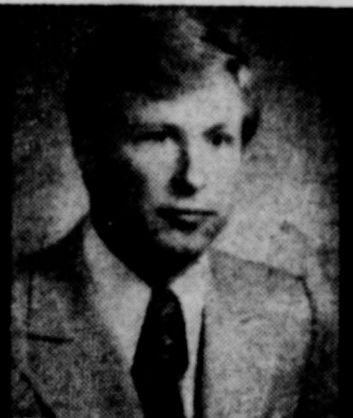
Enchiladas

Roll each tortilla and place seam side down in shallow baking dish, cover with remaining chili and top with grated cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 15 minutes or until cheese is melted.

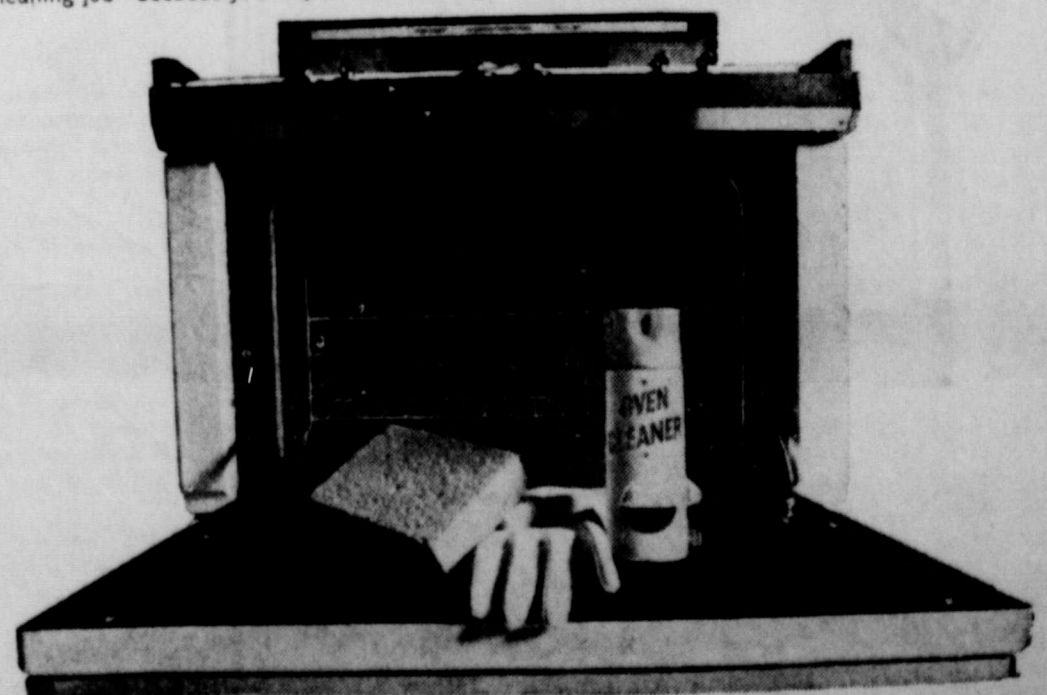

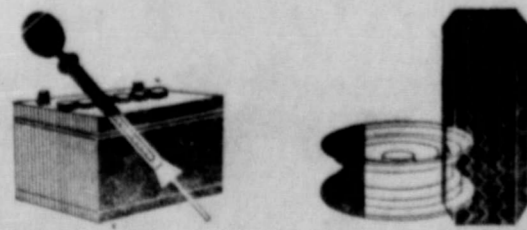
