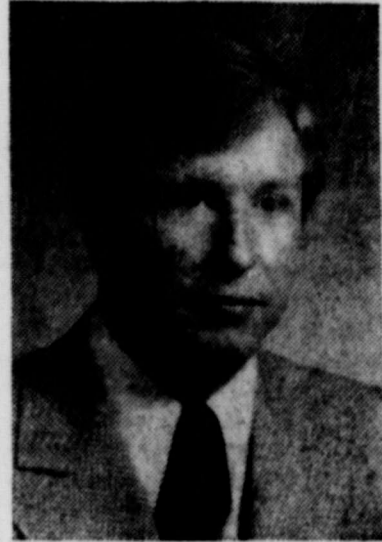

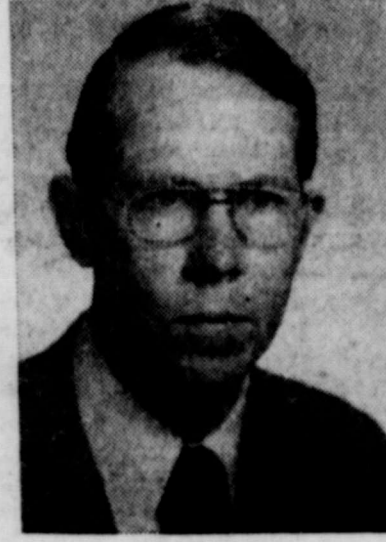

Donaldson, Cummings, Jones, Poage Winners of Important District Posts

While the pollsters were predicting, Frances Farenthold was politicking, and the end result amounted to a run-off berth for the office of Governor of the State of Texas against rancher Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde.

Outsiders Volleyball Tournament Set Friday and Saturday

A ladies volleyball tournament will be held Friday and Saturday nights, May 12 and 13, in the School Gym beginning at 6:30 o'clock.

Eight teams will participate in the tourney, including four teams from Hico, two from Evint and two from Hamilton.

An admission of 50c will be charged for adults and high school students, and 25c for grade school students. Money derived from the tourney will be used for school improvements.

Ben Barnes of Comanche County, who had been listed as the leader in many polls, and no worse than second in others, was defeated handsly, coming in third in the 7-person chase.

The Governor's race was typical of others over the State, where the trend appeared to be "throw the rascals out" as most incumbents were defeated.

Closer to home, the three races creating the most interest were all close, except that of State Representative where Jerry "Nub" Donaldson of Gatesville swamped incumbent Aubry Moore of Hillsboro for the District 34 House seat. Donaldson polled 10,960 votes to Moore's 6,108.

Bob Cummings and Bob Salter, both of Gatesville, hooked up in one of the tightest races, that of District Attorney, with Cummings

winning the post, polling 8,453 votes to Salter's 7,116. The race had been hotly contested by the two candidates.

In the State Senate race, Grant Jones of Abilene won a slim 2,502-vote margin over Tom Moore of Waco to cop the District 23 seat. The vote count was: Jones 44,189, Moore 41,687.

In the Congressional chase in District 11, incumbent Bob Poage polled 52,372 votes to Murray Watson's 33,162 to win re-election to Congress.

In the only county race that affected Hico voters, Boots Young swamped Joseph Stenstrom by a wide margin—1,719 to 490—to win re-election for Sheriff.

The turn-out here and over the county was small, with only 342 voting at Hico and 2,337 county-wide.

Fish Delivery Due Here This Friday

The Inks Dam National Fish Hatchery delivery truck will arrive in Hamilton at about 9:15 a.m. Friday, May 12 with approximately 26,055 large mouth bass fingerlings for local distribution to 123 farmers and ranchers for 197 ponds.

The distribution point for Hamilton will be at Lawson Gin.

The truck will leave Hamilton about 12:45 p.m. and be in Hico to make delivery here at 1:45 p.m. The Hico delivery point is at the junctions of Highway 281 and Farm Road 1744 (Carlton road) where distribution of approximate 5,880 fish will be made to 24 people for stocking 43 ponds.

Everyone who has fish on this truck will receive or have received a postal card from the hatchery advising them of this fact. It is necessary to have the card to receive delivery of the fish.

The fish are hatched at Inks Dam National Fish Hatchery near Burnet and are distributed by the National Fish Hatchery. Bass are delivered in the spring and catfish and sunfish are delivered in the fall.

Those who receive post cards should have five or ten gallon containers filled with pond, creek or river water. If you use chlorinated city water, it will kill the fish.

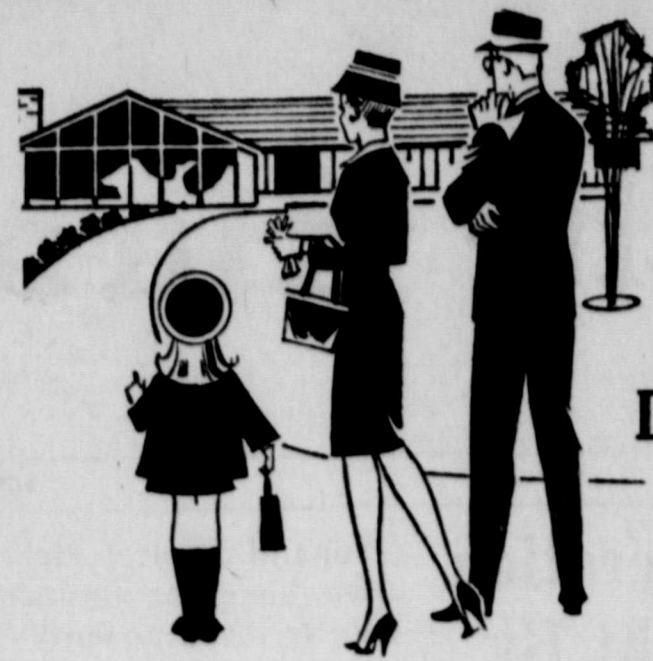

Mrs. Casey Presents Review Club Program On Flower Arranging

Mrs. Casey spoke on "Artistry in Flower Arranging." She pointed out that there is a lot of fun and satisfaction in flower arranging. It is an old and cultivated art. Learn the simple rules and don't just cram flowers in a vase as grandma did.

Flower arranging started in the Occidental world, where many flowers were used. The Oriental form using few flowers developed later. The Japanese became adept and held competitive shows. Their arrangements gave color a secondary place and had a religious flavor. In studying the rules and regulations, the Japanese finally developed their own, using the symbols of man, heaven and earth.

Western civilization adopted the Oriental rules, but this style did not blend well with our civilization, so we began to adapt. In the West we do not use flower arranging as a part of religious ceremonies, though flowers are used as a decoration.

Forty years ago flower arranging became popular here. Garden clubs were formed and people began to learn the art. We have learned that the Japanese rules are best.

The history of flower arranging has gone through a series of periods: classical, medieval, Renaissance, Italian Renaissance, Flemish, French, Victorian, modern. Each period has its own special characteristics.

Artificial flower artistry has come to be a booming business, but Mrs. Casey advises using fresh flowers when they are in season.

Flower arranging is really a composition requiring these elements: design, scale, balance, harmony.

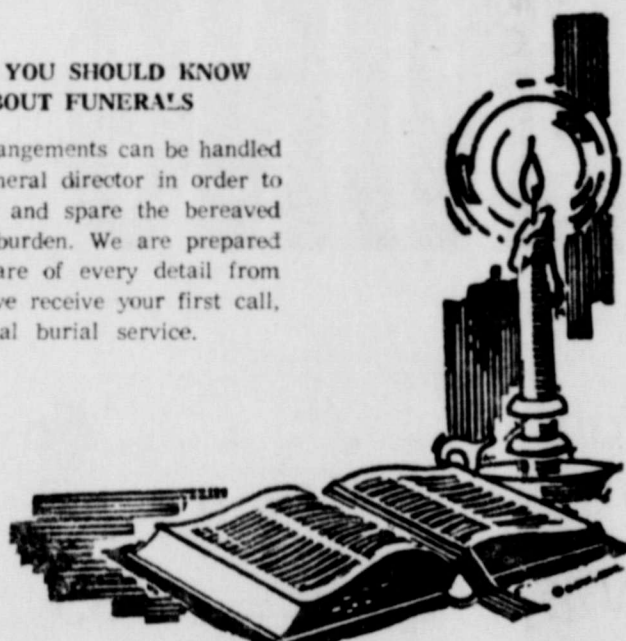

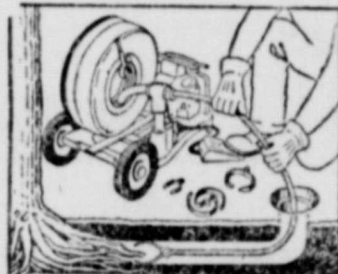
