Two Hico Students Attend Symposium

Mary Catherine Huggins and Bryan Lee Jones, students at Hico High School, attended the 12th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas, Austin, June 5-8. Mrs. Lucille Brummett, science teacher, accompanied them, all three being sponsored by Community Public Service Co.

Two afternoons were spent in touring science laboratories at the University, including those where experiments in thermonuclear research were being carried on.

"We are pleased that we can make this opportunity available," O. L. Davis, manager for CPS in Hico said. "Attending the symposium will provide an excellent opportunity for learning more about the latest achievements in nuclear science."

Speaking at the opening session was Dr. John J. McKetta, professor of chemical engineering at the

University and chairman of the National Energy Policy Committee appointed by President Nixon.

Other noted speakers included Dr. Stephen J. Gage of the White House Office of Science and Technology in Washington; Dr. Leonard A. Sagan, associate director of environmental medicine at the Palo Alto, Calif., Medical Clinic; Dr. W. E. Drummond, director of the center for plasma physics and controlled thermonuclear research at the University of Texas; and Dr. Harvey L. Cromroy, professor of entomology and nematology in the division of nuclear science at the University of Florida.

Also, Dr. R. E. Wainerd, vice president for academic affairs and professor of chemical engineering at Texas A&M; and Dr. Frank B. Salisbury of Utah State's department of plant science.

Davis said that Community Public Service is vitally interested in the foundation's nuclear fusion research program at the University as an important potential source of energy for electric power generation.

"Also, through our association with the university in this program," he said, "we are helping provide a field of research for some 80 graduate and undergraduate students from over the state, and it gives us the opportunity to sponsor these annual high school science symposiums."

Harvey said that he would make a formal statement at a later date, and that he would stage an active campaign for nomination to the post.

Masonic Lodge Elects Officers June 8th

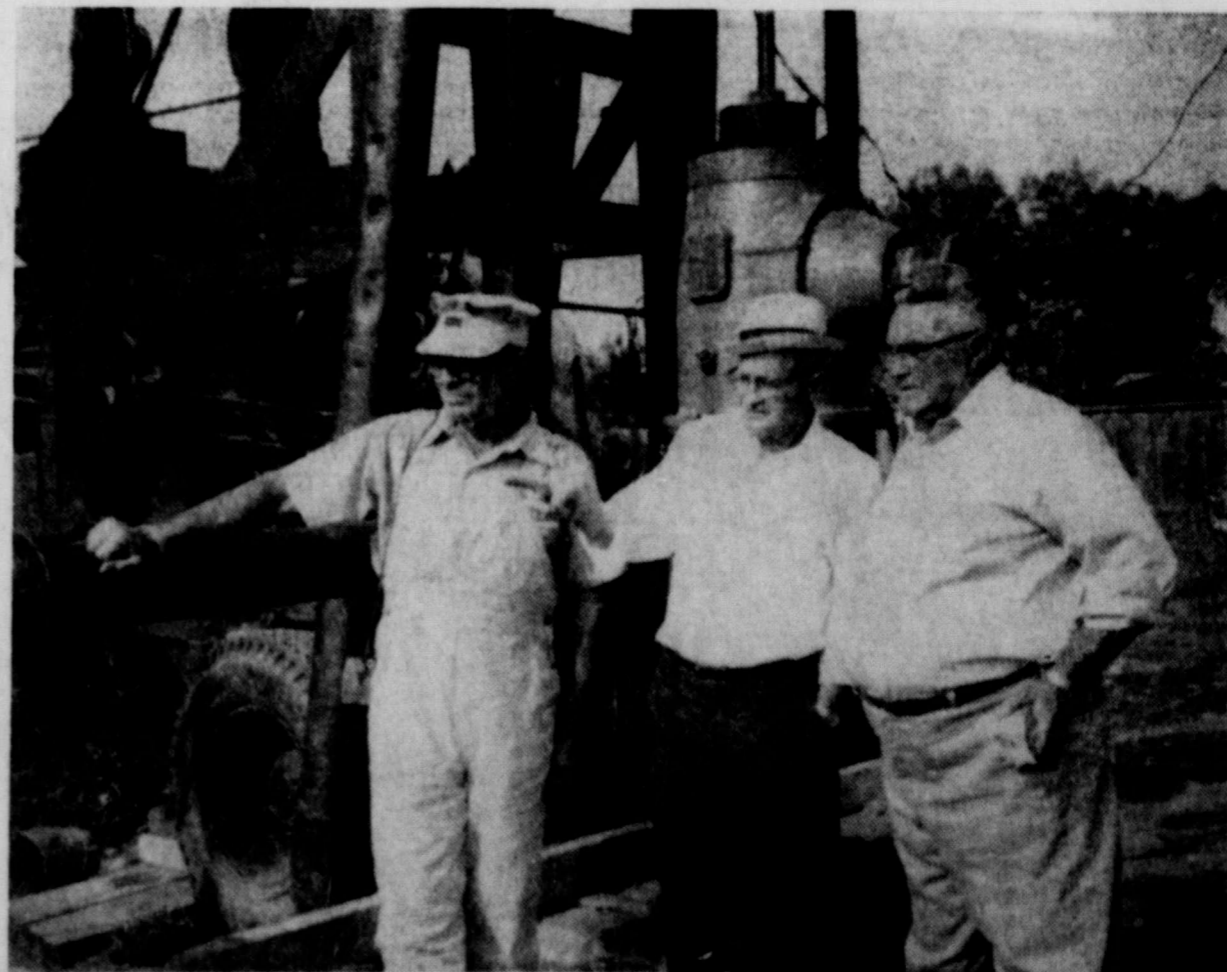
Hico Masonic Lodge No. 477 met

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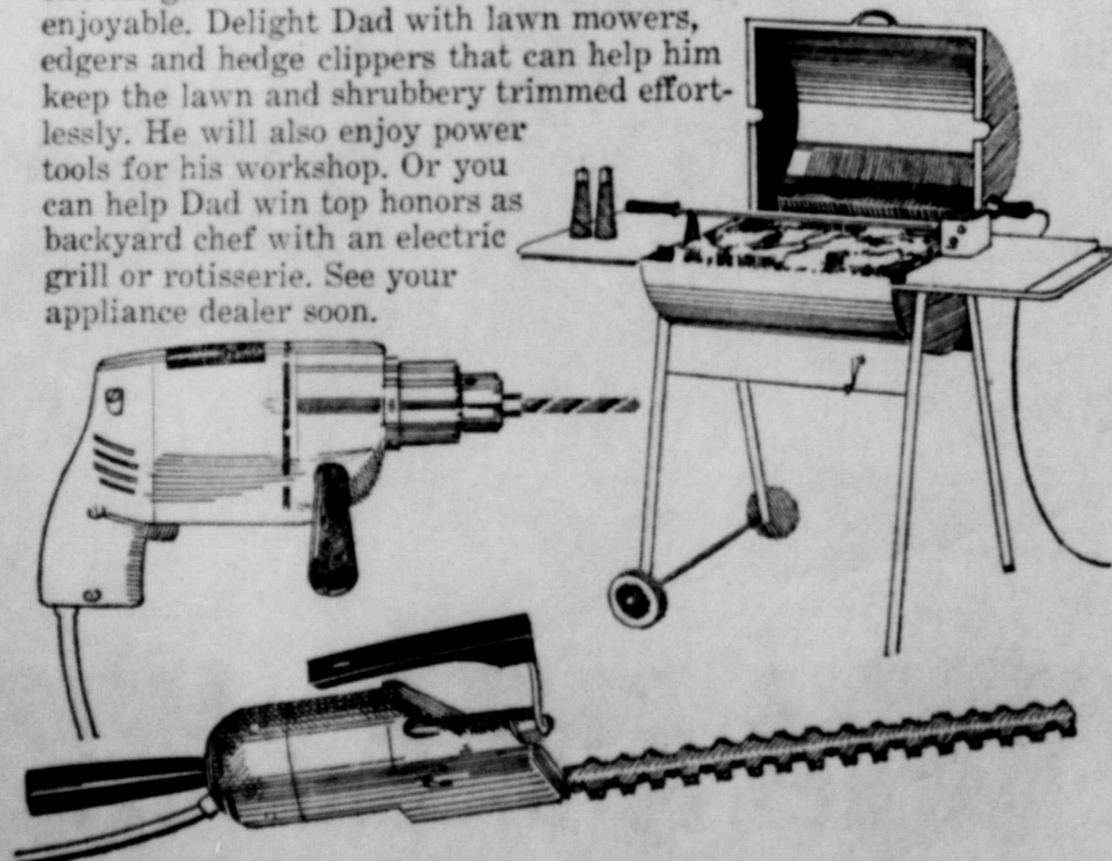

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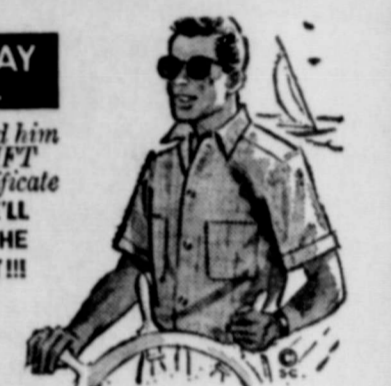
