New Postal Innovation Will Speed Delivery of Mail

The newest innovation of the United States Postal Service—Area mail processing—is to be installed at the Stephenville Post Office within the next two weeks.

This was announced this week by Carl C. Ulsaker, Regional Postmaster General, Southern Postal Region, which covers the Southern United States from Texas to Florida.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Stephenville's modern post office," Ulsaker said.

One electric cancelling machine is available at the Stephenville office now to move the increased mail volume from the associate offices.

"The Stephenville Post Office," Ulsaker pointed out, "is a Sectional Center Facility, and the new system will revolve entirely around that capacity and that function."

"The program will take effect June 24," he said. Area Mail processing is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within a Sectional Center Area, including any or all of the associate offices of the Sectional Center facility, will be consolidated at the SCF for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

All mail deposited in street boxes or the out-of-town letter drops at the associate offices will be transferred to the SCF for processing and will bear the postmark designated for the SCF area.

The Stephenville SCF postmark will read "U.S. Postal Service, TX 764," along with the date and AM-PM designation. The city postmark of Stephenville and each individual associate office will not be changed.

Mail deposited in a designated drop unit at a post office or a letter box labeled "For Local Cancellation Only," will be postmarked at the local office of origin with the name of that office. Each postmaster will have deposit boxes and letter drop units designated for this purpose. All metered mail will bear the postmark of the office of origin.

It was emphasized by Ulsaker that no office will lose its local postmark.

He asked specifically that customers no longer use the word "City" as an address in place of the name of the city of designation. "Obviously," he said, "in this new system, a letter with just 'City' could lose its identity."

The local postmaster, Harry Hudson, stated that this program goes into operation at the Hico office on Friday, June 23. Also on Monday, June 26, the star route carrier will pick up mail at 5:20 p.m. instead of 5:35 as in the past.

July 3 is Last Feed Certification Date

Producers of feed grain and cottonseed oil must certify by July 3 to certify for the 1972-73 crop. As of this date, there are 1,200 farms and 240 feed grain processors which have not been certified.

Producers who certified no later than June 15 should receive their payments the first part of July. Producers who certify later than that date will receive payments probably the last of July or first of August, according to S. E. Cloninger, director of the county ASCS program.

Cloninger said that as soon as cotton and feed grains are planted, a farmer could determine exact acreage to certify.

Cotton and feed grain must be planted and worked in a workmanlike manner, and set aside acreage maintained to receive payment.

New Homemaking Program Will Be Offered Locally

Classes in Home Economics Cooperative Education will be offered for the first time at Hico High School, beginning with the 1972-73 term, according to Supt. O. C. Cook. The program will operate under the direction of Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, teacher-coordinator.

The new program creates the need for a second Homemaking teacher, and Mr. Cook said that the Board of Education had employed Mrs. Denna Gray, a Dallas Homemaking teacher, to teach the useful homemaking courses in the school system.

The Home Economics Cooperative Education classes afford students of Junior and Senior standing both on-the-job and classroom education in a variety of occupations. Practical work experience is provided the student through part-time employment at some cooperating business within Hico. This course is set up for one or two years and carries two credits each year. Students receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupations. Typical occupations in the program are child care aid, compa-

ny to elderly, clothing assistant, dietitian aide, fabric coordinator, floral designer, food caterer, food service employee, home furnishings aide, housekeeping management assistant, and consumer aide.

Mrs. Johanson will be responsible for the selection and placement of students and will correlate their classroom and practical education. An advisory committee of local business people will be set up by the school to assist Mrs. Johanson in organizing and operating the new program.

"The addition of this type of program will do much to provide both boys and girls of Hico with a well-rounded educational program that will fulfill the need for practical and useful training," stated Supt. Cook. "It is hoped it will enable a large portion of our students who desire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduating from high school," concluded Mr. Cook.

To further expand the homemaking curriculum, a semester specialized course will be taught in Home and Family Living one semester, and Consumer Education the other semester. Boys and girls in grades 11 and 12 are eligible for these semester courses and do not have to have been enrolled in previous homemaking courses to receive high school credit.

Mr. Cook noted that the 1972-73 school faculty would be complete after hiring Mrs. Gray, with the exception of obtaining a special reading teacher for the grade school remedial reading program. Applications are being received at this time for the special reading teacher, and Mr. Cook said that special consideration will be given to applications with special education background.
