2. Let the Parks and Wildlife Department present its plan to us. Remember, it is not our (property owners') problem to present the Parks and Wildlife Department with a plan for the Trail. Don't let the Parks and Wildlife Department put us (property owners) in

to the position of suggesting a plan for them. It's up to Parks and Wildlife to come up with the plan. If the plan doesn't suit us, we can let them know.

3. We do not intend to endorse any plan for a Trail that takes people's property away from them involuntarily or otherwise infringes upon their rights and possessions.

The Friday meeting is not just for landowners, but everyone concerned who opposes the proposition in any way.

## Traditional Parade Will Kick Off 86th Edition

Hico's Annual Old Settlers Reunion, the 86th edition, is all set to get underway next Wednesday, July 26, when the traditional parade will kick off the four-day celebration, billed as the oldest homecoming event in the State.

Activities get underway at 7 p.m. with start of the parade. Entries will form at 6:30 at the usual starting place.

The Fort Hood Band, which appeared here two years ago, will lead the parade.

Other outside entries expected are four track vehicles from Fort Hood, Karem Temple Shriners from Waco, and the Starlight Twirlers from Stephenville.

Miss Blair said that a parade

theme had not been established this year, but with a large number of local entries the event should be entertaining.

A total of \$250.00 in prize money will be distributed among winners in nine divisions, according to Louise Blair, parade chairman. The parade prize list and divisions:

Best Decorated Float: \$50 first, \$25 second.  
Best Decorated Car: \$20 first, \$10 second.  
Best Antique Vehicle: \$20 first, \$10 second.  
Best Bicycle or Scooter: \$10 first, \$5 second.  
Best Golf Cart: \$10 first, \$5 second.

Best Comic: \$10 first, \$5 second.  
Best Horse and Rider: \$10 first, \$5 second.

Best Motorcycle: \$15 first, \$10 second.  
Special Category (Unusual and Original): \$20 first, \$10 second.

One new rule has been listed for the parade, that of having all bicycle and horse and riders register before the start, and obtain numbers. The latter rule is to help judges in selecting winners in these two divisions. Entrants will be able to register at the parade starting point. Miss Blair also said that decorated station wagons would be judged in the car division.

## Entertainment.

Following the parade, first night activities at City Park will feature a band composed of James Roberson, Curtis Keller, Gary Westmoreland and Tony Mayfield, plus two professional band members who will accompany them.

Another name band, Tony Douglas and the Shrimpers, will be featured Thursday night. Douglas was also well received during his performance here last year.

Friday night is set aside for the popular Miss Reunion Contest, which is expected to draw the usual large entry list.

Pageant committee members were delighted Wednesday morning when Don Harris, popular WBAP radio figure, accepted an invitation to emcee the contest. More background information will be given next week on the Bosque County native.

Saturday night, ever-popular Joe Paul Nichols and his Four Pennies will be featured attraction. Nichols is a regular performer in Hico, and has become unusually popular.
