

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent re-solution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section SS of the Texas Constitution. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. 


