Just Talk

Some of you people may not be concerned about the proposed hiking, biking and horseback riding trail that has been planned for the Hico area, and was presented to the Parks and Wildlife Department before landowners even knew what was going on, but a lot of neighbors are concerned. Two meetings have been called and then cancelled by the Department at Hico in regard to the trail. The meeting was scheduled for Saturday, August 19 at the Student Center at Tarleton State College. I don't know if the pushers of the plan are willing to lose interest or if the Parks and Wildlife Commission is not prepared to meet at this time.

The trail, supposedly to follow the former railroad right-of-way, runs from Dublin to Walnut Springs, and easily take in the river just a stone's throw from my back porch. Who would want a public trail that would bring strangers and some undesirable people that to your home. Besides, if they are on the river, where would our stock get water? Would the Parks and Wildlife Dept. drill us well for that purpose? Where would we have our family picnics and take our grandchildren fishing? Can the government take a part of our homesteads and our farms and ranches in half to satisfy a few people, when the parks are available for this purpose?

Plans for this trail were made in a study under the direction of Prof. James W. Kitchen of Texas Tech. Darrel Allison of Dublin has received support from the Dublin Chamber of Commerce and has been encouraging the development along with another Dublin resident, Ron Jones, who recently resigned from the planning department of the P&WC.

"The Texas Horseman," a magazine published in Houston carried an article on the proposed trail in its August issue that quoted Allison as saying most of the people in the area are for the trail, but they had run into opposition from two landowners along the trail. Mrs. John Golightly and Joe C. Reichert. There are really landowners along the trail, with these voicing objections.

Allison also was quoted in the magazine as saying that 400 signatures had been collected by the Parks Commission. "I know of the signatures were duplicated, and some of the people forced to sign because they are neighbors," Allison said.

The magazine also stated that representatives would be present at the Saturday meeting (since cancelled) from the Texas Horsemen's Association.

Let's keep working in opposition to the trail, and if and when we are allowed a hearing with the Parks Commission, let's all be present. Let your neighbor do YOUR

Windstorm Topples Trees, Does Other Damage in Area

A severe wind storm ripped through a portion of Hico last Thursday afternoon, breaking and uprooting trees, damaging a trailer house, and destroying a service station wash house.

Trees at City Park and the new housing addition downtown were broken and twisted by the high winds, described by some as a

tornado. A trailer house on the Glen Rose highway, belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Chew, was blown from its foundation, and twisted severely causing several thousand dollars in damages.

The wash house at Vernon Chew's service station downtown was completely destroyed, and a pickup underneath received a crushed cab and broken windshield. Two other cars nearby escaped damage.

A large tree at the station was also twisted. Lightning which accompanied the storm also took its toll, with a pump motor at City Water Works being knocked out.

The hearing was originally scheduled for July 21, but was re-set to the Aug. 19 date.

However, one of the new coaches big jobs will be to find replacements for those three, Lee Ramage, Cecil Holley, and Chuck Bowden, all unanimous selections to the all-district team.

After two scrimmage games, the first with Meridian Aug. 25 at Tiger Stadium, the locals open the season against Grandview, another team that advances to Class A competition. The game will be played here.

Next outing will pit Hico against Brownwood Early, at Early before coming back home against always-tough Whitney for the third game. The Tigers hit the road in their next two outings, going to peren-

nial power De Leon, and then journeying to the County Seat to take on Edd Pettitt's Bulldogs (a Class AA outfit). This will be the first meeting of the two teams since the early 1950's.

After an open date, Hico starts district play against Valley Mills here, followed by another game here with Dublin. The Tigers travel to Glen Rose next, and then play Goldthwaite at the latter's home field, before closing the season here against China Springs.

All of the teams on the current slate have been opponents in other years with the exception of Goldthwaite and China Springs, both consistent winners.

Young Jones received an invitation last week to go to Holland for a racing event.

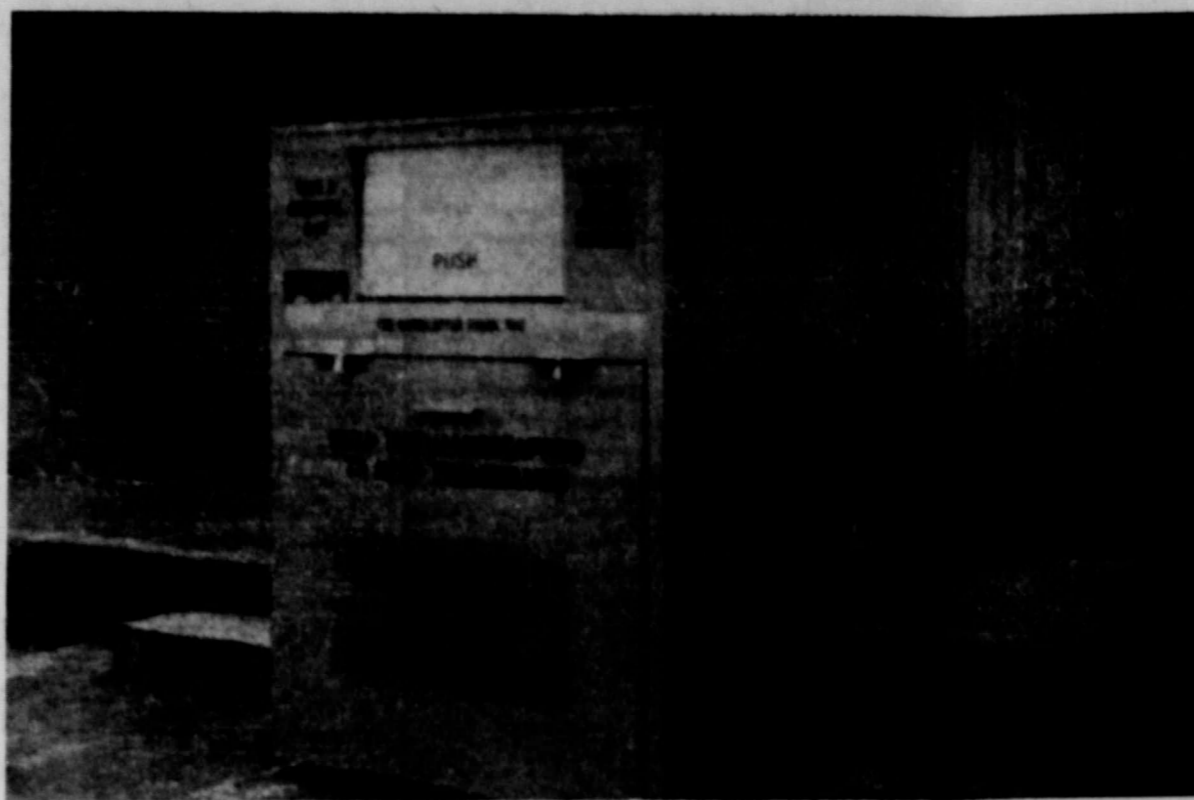
Following a short rest Gary and his brother, Dewayne, who has also been in the winning cycle, will start a fall racing series in September.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument in violation of Section 40."

Section 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office of profit, under the State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or otherwise, in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonelective State officer may hold other nonelective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

"(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.

"(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

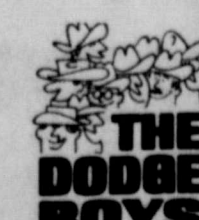

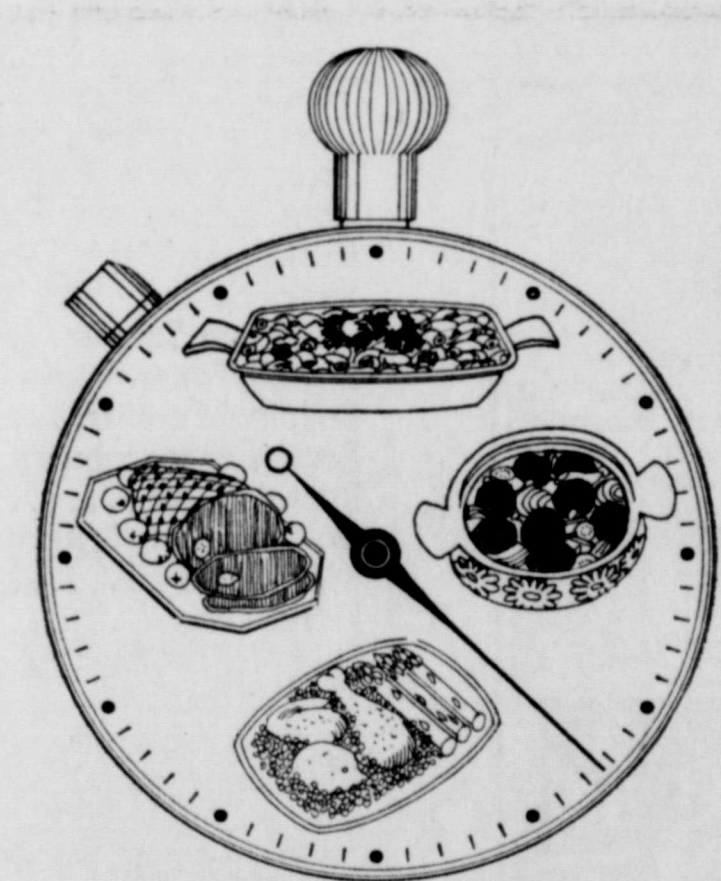

COMMUNITY PUBLIC SERVICE
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ORDINANCE
AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF HICO, HAMILTON COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HICO:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Hico by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

- First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$2.44 Gross; \$2.20 Net.
 - Next 3,000 cu. ft. at \$1.24 per Mcf Gross; \$1.12 per Mcf Net.
 - Next 6,000 cu. ft. at 1.122 per Mcf Gross; 1.01 per Mcf Net.
 - Next 15,000 cu. ft. at 1.033 per Mcf Gross; .93 per Mcf Net.
 - Next 75,000 cu. ft. at .967 per Mcf Gross; .87 per Mcf Net.
 - All Over 100,000 cu. ft. at .933 per Mcf Gross; .84 per Mcf Net.
- No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas

purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, or by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.

PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.
"(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence

homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."
Sec 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Rep-

representatives shall not be because of the anticipation of the legislature. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, and mileage shall not exceed Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) for every twenty-five miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and direct route of travel, as shown on the maps of the State, the Comptroller to each house shall be authorized to establish now or hereafter a mileage for an extra Session that may be within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular Session."
Sec 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide the salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."
