## Fireman Dance Saturday Night Will Feature Joe Nichols

Funds derived from the benefit will be used to defray indebtedness on the rural fire truck.

## County Farm Bureau President Attends Austin Conference

Hamilton County Farm Bureau President Arvord Abernathy attended a statewide conference of county presidents Aug. 9-11 in Austin. Issues facing agriculture and new programs in Farm Bureau were discussed by the more than 125 county leaders in attendance. The presidents also heard a report on a farmer-rancher image study conducted recently in Dallas. According to the report, there is a "reservoir of good will" in metropolitan areas for agriculture in general. Speakers included J. T. (Red) Woodson of Fannin County, president of the 130,000-member state farm organization; TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry of Waco, and Jack Angell, Chicago, American Farm Bureau Federation labor specialist.

State and national issues discussed included farm labor, transportation, environmental pollution, financing public education, taxes, property rights, and control of fire ants, predatory animals and screw-worms. Farm Bureau programs under discussion included public relations policy development, income tax service, and Farm Bureau's commodity approach to farm problems. The county leaders also heard a report on how agriculture fared in the recent special sessions of the 62nd Legislature, as well as an analysis of the "characteristics" of the upcoming 63rd Legislature.

### Firemen Answer Four Calls in Past 6 Days

Hico Volunteer Firemen answered a call Friday afternoon of last week three miles from Carlton on the Alexander FM Road when about 100 acres of pasture land burned on the Ross farm. Hico carried two trucks and Dublin had four units there before the fire was brought under control.

Another grass fire occurred near Langston Crossing Saturday afternoon but firemen quickly extinguished the blaze.

Firemen went to the scene at the Charles Baley farm Tuesday afternoon as a precautionary measure when the well rig of A. L. Koen came in contact with a high line carrying 33,000 electrical volts.

Wednesday morning a call was answered to Hico Fruit Stand when a car belonging to Alan Gill caught fire. Damage was heavy to wiring and parts under the hood.

## Clairette Man is Critical

Sherman Reed of Clairette was seriously injured in a two-car collision in Alexander about 10:45 a.m. Tuesday. Wilson Shillingburg, a Dublin mail carrier, was driver of the other car.

The men were taken to the Dublin Hospital and treated, with Reed being transferred later to the Veterans Hospital in Temple, and Shillingburg to Stephenville.

Mr. Reed underwent surgery Tuesday afternoon in Temple for internal injuries, and was reported in critical condition Wednesday morning in intensive care.

Shillingburg was also in intensive care in Stephenville where he was said to be in fair condition.

The men were traveling alone, and both cars were heavily damaged.

### TWO CARS DAMAGED IN MONDAY ACCIDENT

A minor accident occurred Monday afternoon at the intersection of Avenue B and Highway 281 South, near the Bosque Bridge, when a car driven by Robert I. Hill collided with a car driven by Jerry Chew. There were no injuries, but major damage was reported to both cars.

## Gain of Four Students Noted; High School Down, Elementary Up

A full house of students, teachers, and parents were present Monday morning at the school-opening assembly. Austin Emery, local Church of Christ minister, gave the opening address.

After a nose count Tuesday, enrollment figures showed 353 students, and increase of four over the opening last year.

### New Vocational Course.

One new program was added to the local curriculum this year, Home Economics Cooperative Education, under the supervision of Mrs. Marilyn Johanson.

These classes afford Juniors and Seniors both on-the-job and classroom education in a variety of occupations. Practical work experience is provided the student through parttime employment at cooperating businesses within the city. The course is set up for one or two years and carries two credits each year. Students receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupation.

Mrs. Johanson is responsible for selection and placement of students and will correlate their classroom and practical education. An advisory committee will be set up to assist Mrs. Johanson.

More information will be provided about this program after it is in operation and students have been placed in various occupations.

## Tigers to Take On Meridian

Meridian boosters will get their first look at the 1972 team this Friday when Meridian comes to Hico for a controlled scrimmage. The scrimmage is slated for 7:30 at Tiger Stadium. No admission will be charged.

The team will also have an opportunity to view the many new improvements that have been made at the athletic plant this summer. The Friday night game with Meridian is the first of two scrimmages held before the season opens Sept. 8. Next Friday, Sept. 1, the Tigers will go to Troy (between Waco and Temple) for a team scrimmage involving the Troy and Killen B team. The scrimmage is also set at 7:30. In the opening session this week, Coach Dwain Gray indicated that he would look at a lot of players, and would likely start a lineup composed of Tony Mayfield and Tony Mayfield at ends, Bryan Turner and Curtis Haley at tackles, and Turner and Jerry Lowry at guards, and Danny Kennedy at center. In the backfield, Benny Baley will start at quarterback, Danny

Polk at halfback, Galen Lindsey at fullback, and Galen Christian at flanker.

All of the above are lettermen except Lowry, who was ineligible last year, but saw action with the B team.

The rest of the team are at familiar positions except Kennedy, who was a halfback last year, and Jones, who started the season at center before being sidelined by injuries.

The Hico squad is composed of 11 seniors, four juniors, ten sophomores, and eight freshmen.

## Pay Raises Voted By County Court

Meeting Monday, Aug. 14, Hamilton County Commissioners Court unanimously voted a moderate across-the-board salary increase for all elected officials and county employees.

The increases will become effective Sept. 1.

Commissioners pointed out that this was the first salary boost for employees in three years, and said the increase could be made without an increase in the present tax structure.

Elected officials received the following salary boosts:

District Clerk, from \$275.52 to \$325.00; Sheriff, from \$416.87 to \$450.00; Tax Assessor-Collector,

from \$416.87 to \$450.50; County Clerk, from \$416.87 to \$450.00; County Attorney, from \$416.87 to \$450.00; County Judge, from \$416.87 to \$450.00; County Treasurer, from \$273.12 to \$350.00; J. P. Precinct 1, from \$258.75 to \$284.62; J. P. Precinct 3, from \$161.00 to \$177.10; Constable, Precinct 1, from \$57.50 to \$63.25; Constable Precinct 3, from \$161.00 to \$171.10; Commissioners, from \$372.51 to \$425.00.

Commissioners also authorized an expenditure of 10c per mile for out-of-county travel for officials on business.

A complete schedule of salary increases for all officials and employees may be found elsewhere in this issue.

## Hamilton Dove Festival Set August 31 thru September 2

The 1st Annual Hamilton County Dove Festival is slated to get underway Thursday, Aug. 31, continuing through Saturday, Sept. 2, according to Don Halle, manager of Hamilton Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring organization.

Featured during the three days will be a Fair rodeo, entertainment, and carnival, plus various commercial and public interest exhibits.

A major rodeo will be held each of the three nights, with Texas Rodeo Co. as producer. The rodeo will feature the usual events—back bronc riding, calf roping, team roping, barrel racing, and double mugging. Special attractions will feature the Hico Riding Club, and steer sad-

ding contests between local clubs. Performances start each evening at 8 o'clock.

The Fair will feature judged exhibits, crops, foods, sewing, handicraft, art, flower show, hay show, commercial and public interest exhibits.

Also on Friday and Saturday mornings, a skeet shoot will be held, and Saturday morning a marksmanship exhibition will be staged.

A children's pet show, tug-of-war, sack races, and "Light Shine," a religious folk musical by the Hamilton Youth Choir will be presented.

Entertainment during the three days will feature square dancing Thursday night, a rock band and dance Saturday night, and Billy

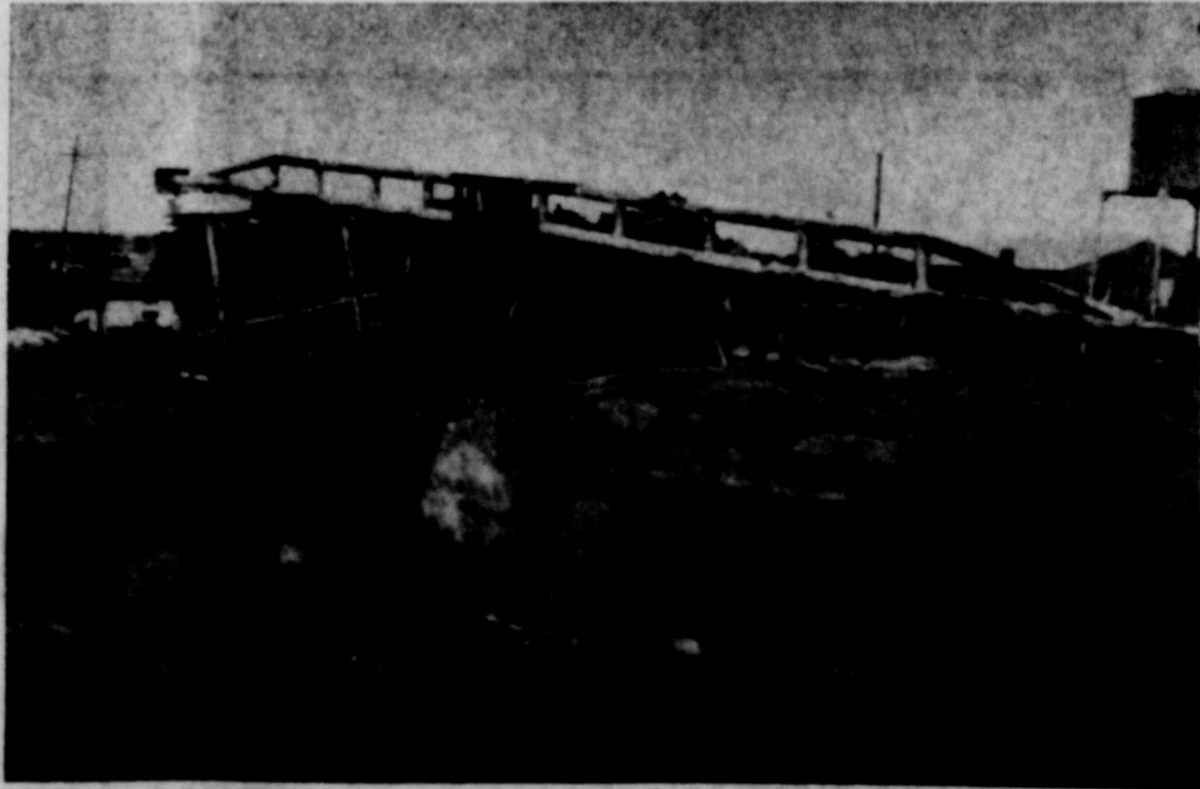
Gray and the "Cowtowners" with Leon Rausch and Don Thompson will perform Saturday night.

Carnival attraction will feature C & R Shows, and local clubs and organizations will have food and game booths during the three days.

Admission to the fairgrounds is free, with 25c per car parking.

"Several months work has gone into planning this event, in building a complete new all steel rodeo arena, and in cleaning up and renovating the park and building," Halle said.

A caravan of boosters will be in Hico Monday on behalf of the Festival. Other stops on the booster trip will include Comanche, Dublin, Meridian, Gatesville and Evant.

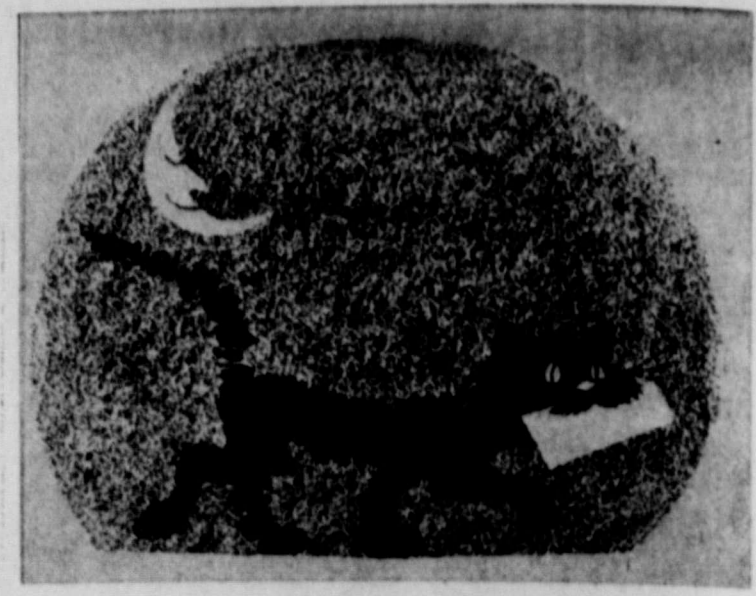

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation."  
"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)  
General Election November 7, 1972

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.

(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)  
General Election November 7, 1972

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence

homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

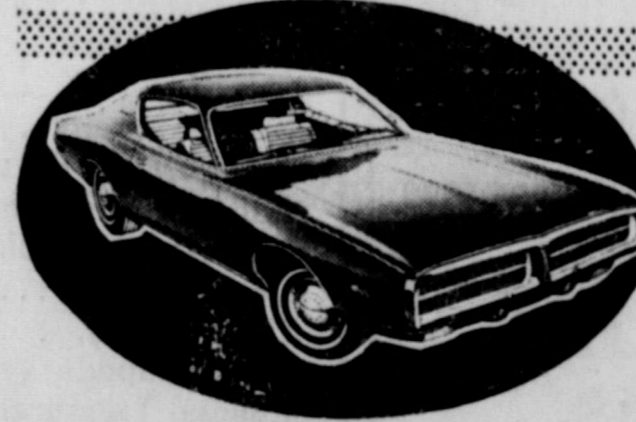

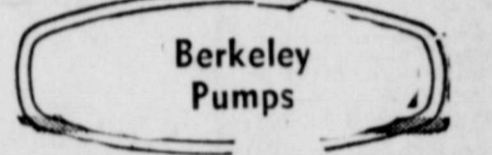

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 82)  
General Election November 7, 1972

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Section 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non-elective State officer may hold other non-elective offices under the State or the United States if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

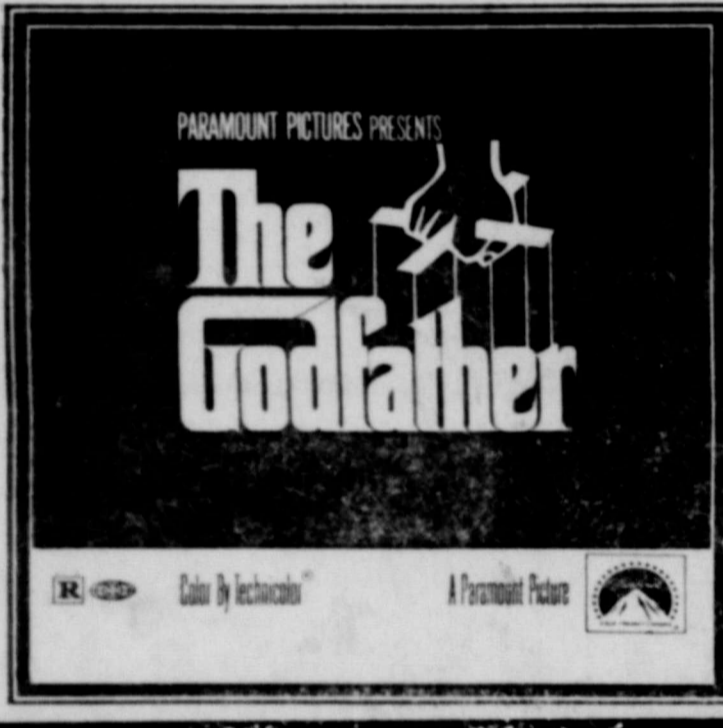

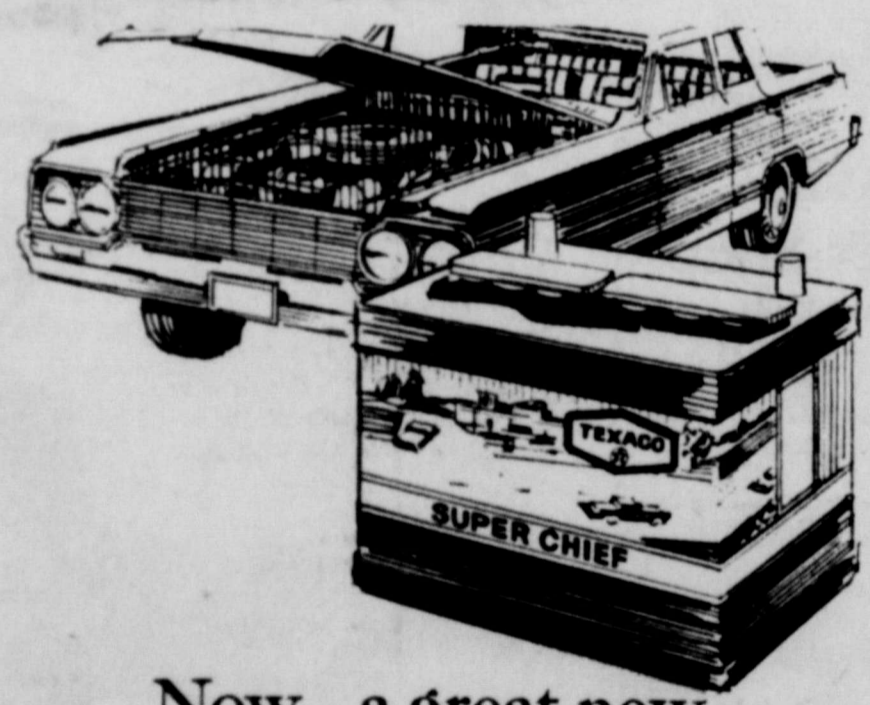
