

These checks, dated Oct. 3. will be for the month of September, the first month for which the increased amounts can be paid, Calvert added

No application is needed for this increase, as every social security benefit check for the nearly 28 million people who get checks every month will be refigured.

In addition to increases in cash monthly benefits, the new law will tie future social security benefit increases to the cost of living. If the cost of living increases three or more percent in a year, monthly social security benefit checks will also increase, starting the following January, unless a general benefit increase was voted by Congress or became effective during the prior year, Calvert said.

which must be reported for perjobs. This will increase from the present \$9,000 a year to \$10,800 for 1973, and to \$12,000 in 1974. After 1974, the maximum amount of earnings covered under the law will be adjusted automatically to keep pace with rising wages whenever cash benefits are adjusted.

Workers whose earnings exceed the present maximum of \$9,000 a year will pay social security contributions on more wages, but they will also be buying more benefits for themselves and for their fa-

The contribution rate for employees and employers will actually decrease from the rates that they have been paying this year and that were already scheduled in the prior law. The reduction in the percentage will be from onetenth of one percent to threetenths of one percent. The contribution rates for self-employed persons will be slightly increased, by one-tenth of one percent.
