## Tough Opponent Seen in Early

Tigers, coming off a one-27 win over Grandview, had a serious opponent Friday when they travel to Brown- Early to take on a band of Longhorns who have yet to taste victory in their first action. The Longhorns have won their last week.

Tigers can't expect an easy game such as they played last week in Early, long a Class A power. They will field a team of experienced veterans.

Early and Hico have met five times previously, the last in 1962. Early has been victorious in all five games.

The first meeting—1958—Early defeated the Tigers 28-0. In 1959, the Longhorns won 28-6, and in 1961 they downed the Tigers 16-8 in the closest game of the series.

# Tigers Blitz Hapless Grandview 52-7

Every method of scoring, the game look easy last night as they blitzed Grandview in the season grid opener. Both teams.

Tigers put points on the board by scoring seven touchdowns, conversions by both kicking and punting, picked up a two-point play and kicked a field goal to completely monopolize the game from every standpoint.

Following their first victory under head coach Dwain Gray, Grandview played only about 18 minutes of the contest, with other members finishing the game midway of the second quarter.

Running only seven offensive plays in the first quarter, the Tigers found themselves ahead by 28 and the score mounted to 52-0 before the long first half ended.

Quarterback Benny Bailey set the stage for the slaughter on the first play of the game. Putting the ball in play at the 29, Polk threw a gapping hole over the end and sped 71 yards for a six-pointer.

Plays later and the Tigers were in business at their own end! One play and fullback Lindsey was in the Zebra game. The play covered 54 yards. Quarterback Benny Bailey and center snap for the two-point conversion, and it was 14-0. Tigers running only two

Approximately 80 members and guests were present Tuesday night at the first official Booster Club meeting of the year. President Ralph Turner opened the meeting, and welcomed members.

## Council Annexes Acreage to City

One of the main orders of business at the Monday City Council meeting was passing on first reading of a move to annex 4.74 acres of land into the city limits. The land, owned by Fred Jaggars, local real estate dealer, is in the James Hollingsworth survey, and located just north of the homes of E. B. Fellers and Mrs. Bryan Angell.

The full tract contains 70 acres, but Jaggars is only going to develop the nearly five acres at this time. He later plans to develop another 20 acres of the property. Jaggars said that one of the lots,

which have already been surveyed, has been sold to Bobby Needham.

In other action, the Council gave the Highway Department the authority to regulate signs and speed limits within the city limits.

Other points of discussion during the two and one-half hour session centered around a stock gap to the City disposal plant; a water shortage in the Hillcrest Addition due to low pressure; and a trailer house ordinance.

The proposed Main Street lighting project was also reviewed, and Mayor Davis said that the 21-ft. steel standards were on order. The City and Community Public Service Co. will replace existing lighting on Main with new center standards.

Three other points discussed were the proposed garbage truck and rates for same; a possible airport; and sewer and water connection charges.

## New Homemaking Program Explained at P-TA Meeting

"We Can Do Something," theme of this year's Hico Parent-Teacher Association, became the slogan of the newly organized classes of Home Economics Co-operative Education at Hico High School. Presenting the opening program for the local P-TA, the HECE students informed the group of the requirements, responsibilities, and advantages of their program.

Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, teacher coordinator for the HECE program led the discussion, assisted by HECE students Misses Donice Park, Kay Kilgo, Dana Roberson, Linda Walker, and a lone male student, Jan Christian.

The group noted that HECE is an on-the-job training program for high school junior and senior students who are interested in home economics related occupations. The panel also stated that the HECE students attend regular school classes, plus receiving daily instruction related to the world of work and the home economics occupation in which he is employed.

Mrs. Johanson explained the responsibilities of the teacher coordinator. She stressed the importance of selecting training stations on the basis of respectability and reputation of the employer, and that it was her responsibility to coordinate the students' on-the-job work experience with individual assignments and group study.

The students discussed home economics related occupations and reviewed the training stations employed by the 23 HECE students in Hico.

The panel members discussed their jobs and explained some of the responsibilities they have already assumed. Miss Roberson is employed as a Fashion Coordinator for Marguerite's Dress Shop. Miss Park is a Communication Aide at the Hico News Review, Miss Kilgo a Housekeeping Management Aide at Hico City Hospital, and Miss Walker is a Consumer Aide at Blair Hardware. Christian is employed as a Housekeeping Management Aide at Christian Dairy.

P-TA President Austin Emery presided during the business session. Mrs. John Parks stressed the importance of membership in P-TA. Mrs. Parks said "Membership in P-TA is a vote 'yes' for your school, your community and your children."

A five-dollar prize will be awarded the two classes receiving the most memberships in P-TA.

Mrs. Dan Bell announced magazine subscriptions to the P-TA magazine were \$3.50 for the school year.

The P-TA group voted to sponsor the Hico Cub Scouts for the new school term.

Mr. O. C. Cook introduced the school faculty. He noted the importance of the P-TA organization for the school and community.

Room count was won by the first and twelfth grades.

Concluding the business meeting and program, refreshments were served in the cafeteria by the hospitality committee, Mrs. Charles Bailey and Mrs. Bruce Slaughter.

**Cuban Native, Now Hicoan, Saw World Chess Champion**

(Note: Edwin T. Tolon, native of Cuba but now a Hico resident, is a former Chess Champion of Cuba, and wrote the following article about the just-completed World Chess Championship.)

Champion Chess of Havana, 1925

Robert Fischer, the young player of Brooklyn, is now the Champion Chess of the world since he defeated Boris Spassky, the great Russian master.

Fischer is the first American player that has won this crown. The Russians have held it since 1948 when Alekhine defeated Capablanca. President Richard Nixon has invited Fischer to take dinner with him and his family in the White House.

Fischer is only 29 years old. He is a real genius like Andersson, Morphy and the late Cuban champion of the world, J. R. Capablanca. He began to play chess when he was a little boy under the teaching of Jack Collins. He is a pride for America. His father, like Spassky's, went to World War II.

In 1967 I had the great pleasure to see Fischer, Petrosian, then champion of the world, Najdorf and other great masters all of them playing in a contest in Havana. Petrosian, the Armenian-Russian, won first place, Fischer second. But in 1971 Fischer defeated Petrosian in three famous games in Argentine.

Many years before I had the honor to take dinner in my home of Vedado, Havana, with E. Lasker, the great German master, and Capablanca, both champions of the world.

The Chess is a wonderful exercise for the intelligence and for the memory, for that reason I believe that it is very convenient the practice of the science game by students of the schools of this great country.

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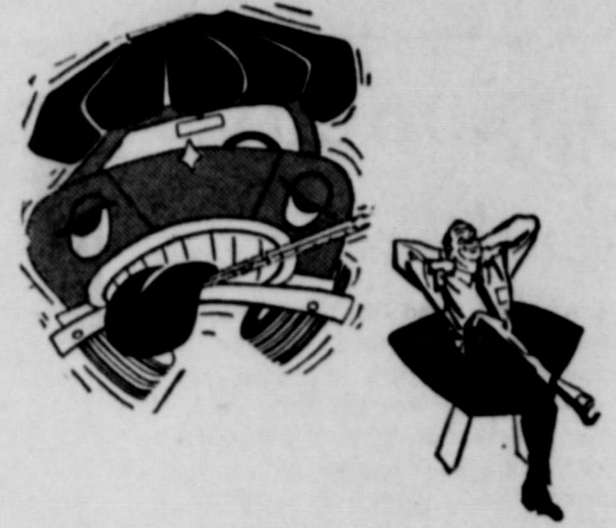

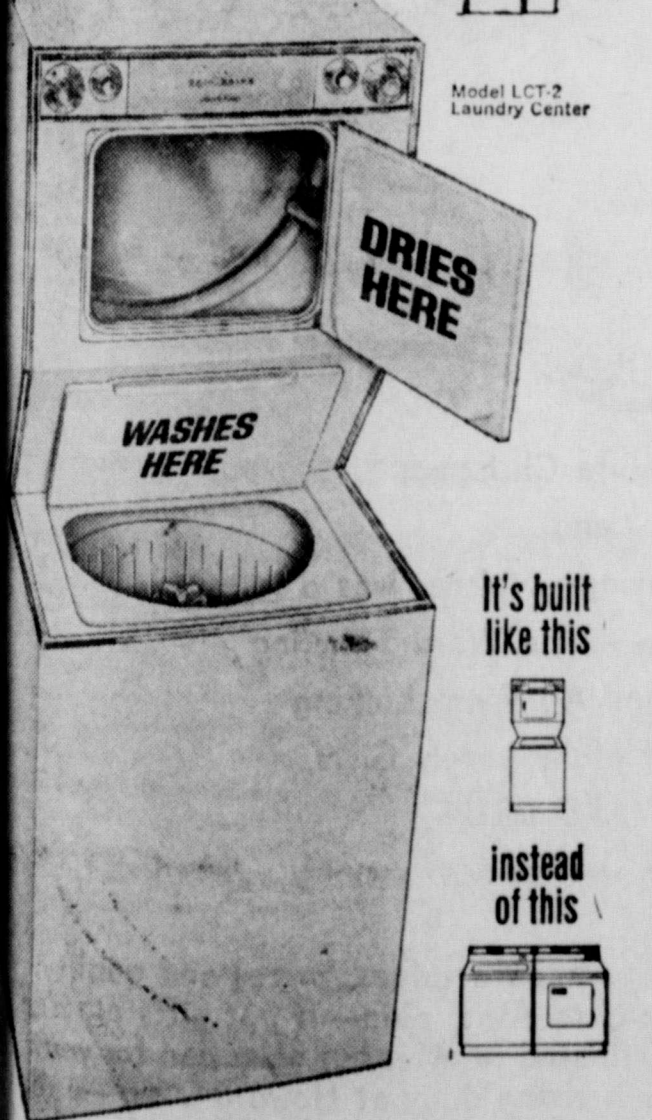
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## Fairy Community News

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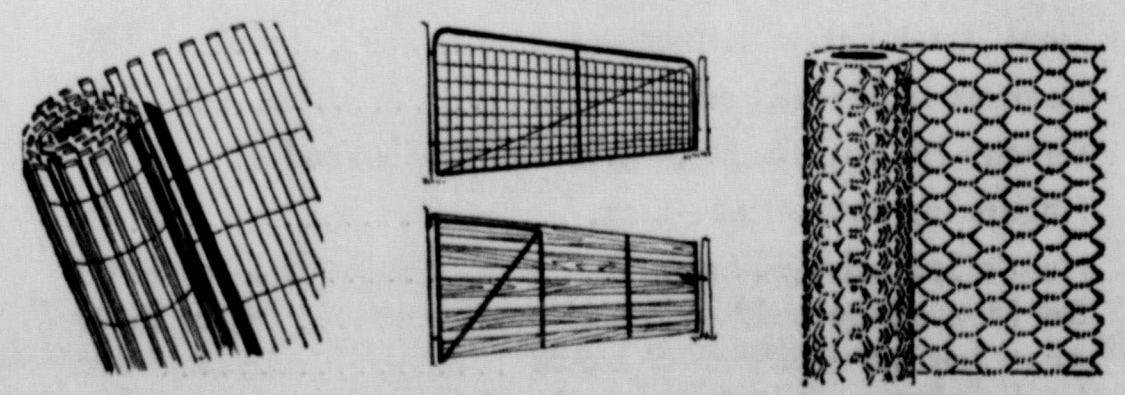

Old Jerusalem is as old as history with its tiny narrow streets of dark stone. Within its few square blocks, though, are the holiest of sites to visit, such as the Via Dolorosa (the Way of the Cross), to Mount Calvary, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the Wailing Walls, and a Mosque called the Dome of the Rock. In the center of this golden topped mosque is a huge rock where Abraham offered to sacrifice his son, Isaac.

In Bethlehem, which is about ten miles from Jerusalem by bus, she visited the famed Church of the Nativity. Below this church is the grotto in which Jesus was born and the manger where he lay.

Farther south from Jerusalem the trip included the oldest city, Jericho, today a winter resort, and the River Jordan where Jesus was baptized. Mrs. Lincoln showed a colored picture of her and her late husband at this site. She saw the Sea of Galilee, the Dead Sea, most interesting of all the Dead Sea Scrolls, written on goat skins and preserved over the centuries in earthen jars.

On the trip back home she stopped off briefly for delightful tours in Athens, Greece and Istanbul, Turkey.

After this most interesting and informative resume of her trip, Mrs. Lincoln showed many souvenirs and artifacts she had purchased.

Polk took the following free kick at his own 40 and scampered to the Grandview 8, and then got the call for the final eight yards, upping the count to 43-0 with less than half of the second quarter gone, and that was all for the starters.

Coach Gray inserted his reserves, who finished the contest by scoring one touchdown themselves, and setting up a 28-yard field goal by Lindsey.

Freshman Gary Reed gave the

No. 2 unit the spark needed when he intercepted a Grandview pass and raced to the 42. From there Walter Lucas got 3 to the 45, came back with 22 to the Zebra 33, and got the call again for seven to the 26. A holding penalty moved the Tigers back to the 39. Bob Lefevre picked up six to the 33, Lucas came back with 11 to the 22, and then Lefevre hit right up the middle for 22 yards and the TD. That ended the first half with the Tigers owning the scoreboard 49-0.

Only scoring in the third quarter, and the only time that the starters were in the game in that period, was Lindsey's 28-yard field goal. The senior fullback missed on his first attempt, but Grandview was guilty of being offside, giving the

Tigers another chance. This time Lindsey's kick was true to the mark, making the count 52-0.

Midway of the fourth quarter, Gary Reed electrified the fans as he fielded a Zebra punt and sped 58 yards for an apparent TD, but this time the Tigers were guilty of an infraction, rubbing out the marker.

Grandview's lone counter of the long night came with 1:45 left in the game, when B. Johnson scooted in from the five. Their conversion was good, and the scoreboard read 52-7.

Obviously, fans were impressed with the overall play of the Tigers in their first outing, but it was also obvious that Grandview was perhaps the weakest of any of the Zebra teams played in the past four years. They appeared to have some good athletes, but very un-

organized. Impressed as they were with the play of the starters, fans were even more impressed with that of the younger team members, many of whom were seeing action for the first time.

The light-weight line of the Tiger starting unit was impressive, to say the least, with all of them carrying out assignments to near perfection. Newcomer Jerry Lowry played as expected, as did displaced Danny Kennedy, a running back last season who scored four touchdowns against this same Grandview team. Kennedy is the starting center this year. Jim Turner, Bryan Jones and Curtis Haley did their usual good job, as did the wings, Buddy and Tony Mayfield.

The coaching staff, although elated over the opening victory, expressed some disappointment over

the quality of the opposition, which they had hoped would be a stiff test for the locals. The staff did everything within their power to hold the score down, turning down a sure touchdown in favor of a field goal.
