## Routine Business Transacted Monday Council Meeting

was strictly routine at session of Hico City Council Monday night with a number of topics discussed.

Order of business was setting of an ordinance to annex land into the city. Ordinance becomes effective one more reading.

Hico Attorney Ann met with the Council on a proposed mobile home and suggested several made in the proposal.

Low water pressure in certain sections of the city also came in for a share of discussion. Also pertaining to water facilities, Supt. W. R. Hampton was authorized to lay the water line to the new addition being annexed.

In discussing city street lighting, Mayor Davis said that Community Public Service Co. would spend over \$6,000 in the near future on changing out some existing facilities, and installing new standards on Main Street.

Final discussion of the night centered around charges made for water and sewer connections to new residences and businesses.

Hampton gave comparative fig-

ures of seven surrounding towns, and pointed out that at present time, Hico was charging \$35.00 for a sewer connection, and nothing for water. He also pointed out that it costs approximately \$125.00 to make a water connection, including pipe, meter and labor.

He cited the following comparative charges being made by other towns in the area: Granbury, \$150 water, \$30 sewer; Mosheim \$35 water, be a member of the special district; Comanche \$60 water, \$40 sewer; Glen Rose \$40 water, \$10 sewer; Stephenville \$45 water, \$35 sewer; Evant \$50 water, \$50 sewer and be a member of special district; Meridian, \$30 and \$50 sewer.

# Grid Classic Due Friday at Hamilton

## First Meeting of Tigers And Bulldogs Since 1952

### James Randals Takes Lawyer's Oath in Austin Ceremony

James Hord Randals, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Randals, was one of 750 attorneys who received their oath to practice law in ceremonies held Sept. 25 in the LBJ Library in Austin. Randals is a graduate of the University of Texas and recently passed his bar examination. Mr. and Mrs. Randals were present for the ceremonies, having spent the weekend in Austin as guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Burleson.

Hico vs. Hamilton. That phrase rings a familiar bell as the high-flying Tigers travel to the County Seat to do battle with the always-tough Bulldogs.

All Hamilton County is expected to be on hand to see the grid contest, which shapes up as a real hum-dinger. Favorites can be picked, but in a game of this type, anyone can win. The battle could very well be decided by a fumble, a pass interception, or a crucial penalty.

Not since 1952 has the two teams met, with the Bulldogs reigning supreme in that contest 48-0. The previous two games were about the same, with Hamilton winning 53-0 in 1951, and 48-0 in 1946.

Since 1930—42 years ago—Hico can point to only two victories over the Bulldogs. In 1942, Hico downed Hamilton for the first time in 12 years by the narrow margin of 14-13, and the Tigers won again in 1945 by a 7-2 count.

For the year, the Tigers have rolled over four opponents, while Hamilton is 1-2 for the season, winning from De Leon and losing to Goldthwaite and powerful Clifton by respectable margins. The Bulldogs had an open date last week.

Hico coach Dwain Gray told about 90 Booster Club members Tuesday night that "the Bulldogs are big, tough, large on numbers, and will certainly be the toughest opponent that we have met."

The coach also said that Hico would have to have a better effort than in past games to have a chance of winning.

Commenting further, Coach Gray said that the game shaped up as a highly emotional contest, both from a player and fan standpoint, and he appealed to fans to conduct themselves in a manner that everyone could be proud of.

The coaching staff indicated that they would start Tony Mayfield and Buddy Mayfield at the end posts, Bryan Jones and Curtis Haley at the tackle slots, Jerry Lowry and Jim Turner at guards, and Danny Kennedy at center. Rounding out the starting unit will be Benny Baley at quarterback, Galen Lindsey at fullback, Danny Polk at tailback and Galen Christian at flanker.

Game time is 8 p.m. at Hamilton's Kookon Field.

## Tigers Roar Over De Leon 50-19

Hico's Tigers, rolling along unmolested, traveled over to De Leon last Friday night and—oh, well, you know the rest. They jumped on the Bearcats early and simply over-powered them for a 50-19 win, the fourth of the year.

What Galen Christian didn't do to the Bearcats, Benny Baley, Danny Polk and Galen Lindsey did. The speedy flanker raced for three touchdowns, Lindsey bulled for two more, and Polk and Baley each got one for the winners.

So completely did the Tigers dominate the opening quarter of play, De Leon had possession for only six plays, finishing the period with a minus one yard. They had no first downs, had a one-yard rushing loss, and failed to complete a pass in the initial stanza.

The Bearcats were up tight, and it showed in the fact that they mis-handled the ball four of the first six times they touched it. Hico recovered two of those bobbles, one leading to a touchdown.

The Tigers were simply not to be denied, taking the opening kickoff and marching 74 yards for their

first counter. Starting at the 26, Lindsey lost three yards on the first play, but Polk came back with seven to the 30. Polk got the call again, and this time responded with 29 yards to the Bearcat 41. Polk failed to gain on the next play, losing a yard to the 42, Lindsey lost another seven to the 49, and with third and 18, Baley called his own number and rambled for 17 to the 32. The slick quarterback kept again, this time for 12 to the 20. Another keeper lost four yards, Lindsey regained the four, then Christian got into the act. From the 20, the flanker took off on one of his famous acts—the end around—and sped the distance unmolested for the first counter. Lindsey's kick was good, and it was 7-0. You had to see to believe the daylight Christian had on the run.

De Leon took the kickoff, and after three plays netted a minus one yard, punted to Christian who fielded the ball at his own 32 and raced to the De Leon 15 before being brought down. From there Lindsey hit for five yards, Polk

bulled for three yards twice, and Baley kept from four yards out for the second TD, making the count 13-0.

Late in the first period, Polk recovered a Bearcat fumble setting the Tigers in motion at the De Leon 25. They used the remainder of the first period to work to the one, and on the first play in the second quarter, Lindsey punched in for the marker. The conversion attempt was amusing, to say the least. A bad center snap and Lindsey found himself in possession. He raced to the right and threw to the holder, Baley, who had scrambled to the far sideline. Two points were good and the score was 21-0.

Two possessions later and the Tigers doused any hopes that the Bearcats might have had of making a comeback. Taking on their own 30, Lindsey got five, Polk ground out 11, Baley picked up another to the 47, and then turned Christian loose again. The play was so deceptive that Christian again raced to the end zone untouched. The 53-yard scoring jaunt, coupled

with another circus two-point conversion, upped the count to 29-0. (Continued on Page 8)

A compost bed may be constructed out of scrap or rough lumber or with net wire. The enclosure should be large enough to hold the raw material needed to supply next year's compost needs.

Tree leaves are beginning to fall and are cluttering up the lawn and flower beds and creating a disposal problem. These same leaves can benefit your next year's garden crop if you will put them to use. They can serve as an ideal compost material.

To build a compost pile, place leaves, grass clippings and other healthy plant material from flower and vegetable gardens in the compost heap. As you put down a layer of material, sprinkle it with a complete fertilizer before adding another layer. The fertilizer will add plant food to the mixture and will also speed up decomposition.

Since moisture is needed for the decomposition process, the heap should be sprinkled with water to keep it moist when rainfall is not sufficient to do the job.
