

Still at its original location on East Washington St., the house is Victorian style, native stone with gingerbread trim and was built in 1869 by J. D. Berry.

The house opens into a hallway with a room to left and right on the first and second floors. The downstairs rooms are furnished as parlors of the period would have been and pieces of the original hand-cut gingerbread trim are on view. Interesting calendar paintings are on the walls and one of the rooms has a large scroll-type painting that was done by a former Stephenville lady. A charcoal painting that won a first place ribbon at the State Fair many years ago is also on display. The original fireplace and mantels are in the parlor rooms.

Between the front two rooms and the kitchen, which was at one time set away from the main house, is a shed room which serves as a display spot for geological specimens and other museum items which are not like home furnishings.

The small kitchen contains a wood stove and very old furnishings of the period.

Up the stairs and above the two parlors are two bedrooms. One contains a large bed, dresser and chifferobe. Many items of clothing and bedding are on display here. The other bedroom is done as a nursery with a wicker cradle that was donated by Mrs. J. C. Terrell Sr. of Stephenville. It is interesting to note that all the Terrell grandchildren have slept in the cradle as infants.
