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Average Opening For Deer Hunters

Cold, rainy weather greeted deer hunters Saturday morning, opening of the 1972 venison harvest, and slowed the kill considerably in this immediate area. However, the rain ceased later in the day, and a productive afternoon hunt was noted.

Hunter success appeared to be better than average for the opening weekend, with most local nimrods bagging their game before Sunday night.

Count at L & R Locker Plant at noon Monday showed 48 deer had been checked in there, which com-

pared with the 63 put in storage for the same period a year ago. However, the opening a year ago hot and windy, and deer that were killed were rushed to the locker plant. This year was a different story, with many hunters hanging their deer until they started home.

In the two trophy contests being sponsored here, Jackson's Superette had measured 14 deer through Monday, and Blair's Hardware had weighed ten big bucks. Weights and measurements were being kept secret by the two business firms. Both are giving deer rifles, for the widest spread and the heaviest deer, field dressed.

All deer checked into Hico were in excellent condition, due to timely rains during the past year.

Tigers Demolish Cougars 8-12 for 9-1 Season Record

About every conceivable variation of players, the Hico Cougars were in for a hard-fought game but they were defeated last Friday night to close their second best season ever.

The Cougars, who were upset by the Cougars three weeks ago, finished with a 9-1 record, and are probably the best team in state Class 1A that failed to get a post-season berth.

That's the way it is, with the Cougars advancing to bi-district level of their win over Hico. They were defeated last week to finish with an 8-2 season record. The win, considered in some quarters, didn't come as a surprise to local fans. It was a good sound team that met the Cougars, and after a game to Valley Mills the following week, put it all together to off Glen Rose 21-20, handing a share of the title.

China Spring, perhaps the cleanest team that the locals met all year, were injury plagued, but made a commendable effort considering all factors.

From the opening kickoff, which Benny Baley ran back 90 yards for a TD, the Cougars were in command. China Spring made a mild overture on their first possession, going 64 yards in 16 plays to narrow the margin to 7-6. Ed Daniels, a squat 217-pound sophomore fullback, made the marker for the two.

But that was all for the Cougars until the fourth quarter. Hico blasted right back after the visitor's TD, going 62 yards in seven plays. Galen Christian started the drive by racing the kickoff out to the 38. From there, Danny Polk, who had an exceptional night, got four yards, Baley hit Buddy Mayfield for 9 to the Cougar 49, Galen Lindsey gained 14 to the 35, Christian got three more on a Baley pass, and Lindsey made 19 big yards to the 13. Polk got another five, and Lindsey bulled in from the eight to up the count to 15-6.

On the third play of the second quarter, Baley hit Christian on a very familiar pattern for 57 yards and another six points to up the count to 22-6. Later in the same period, Hico ground out another marker to take a 28-6 lead into halftime. Polk broke for 10 yards on a pitchout for the counter. The Cougars put it all together in

the third quarter, scoring three TD's to completely destroy the Cougars.

The first came after a fumble recovery at the Cougar 19. Polk hit for 8 to the 11, came back with two more and a first down at the 9. Lindsey gained three to the six, Polk ran for two, and then came back for the final four yards and the TD.

The Cougars bounced back on their next possession, going 70 yards in six plays for the marker; Mayfield was playing quarterback at this point, and threw to the regular signal caller, Benny Baley, for 18 yards and the score. Mayfield, a sophomore, probably established himself as the No. 1 signal caller next year.

It didn't take long for the Cougars to put more points on the board, recovering a Cougar fumble at the 24. On the first play, Polk broke for the 24 yards, upping the count to 48-6.

Carlton Man Is Shot Accidentally

A 72-year-old Carlton rancher, Elmer Clinton Chick was accidentally shot to death early Saturday as he sat in a pickup truck awaiting the return of his son.

The elder Mr. Chick and his son, Joe Chick of Dublin, had been hunting. They had stopped to see a friend, and the elder Chick remained in the truck. The son heard a gun discharge and returned to

find his father had been shot.

Mr. Chick was pronounced dead on arrival at the Dublin Hospital, and Justice of the Peace Roy Lee Armstrong ruled accidental death from a gunshot wound.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church in Dublin, with Rev. Bob Perrin officiating. Burial was in the Carlton Cemetery.

Mr. Chick was born April 25, 1900 in Comanche County and married Virgie Sharp on May 19, 1923.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Joe and Vanderell Chick, both of Dublin; a daughter, Mrs. Fonzy Williamson of Hamilton; two sisters, Mrs. B. R. Birdsong of Dallas and Mrs. Al Montgomery of Lewisville; nine grandchildren and seven step-grandchildren.

SCOUTING CORNER

Most workers in the programs of Boy Scouts of America, whether in Cubs, Boy Scouts or Explorers, face a common difficulty. This is the problem of securing adequate adult help and leadership. While Scouting is designed to draw a boy closer to his family, community and nation, often it is the parents of boys who seem most reluctant to assist. Scouting provides opportunities for boys to develop in many ways. The Den Mother and Cubmaster, the Scoutmaster and Troop Committeemen, the Explorer Advisor and Post Committeemen, provide many things for the Scouts, but none of them are able to fully compensate to a boy for parents who do not seem to care about his development.

Every Scout unit could have more activity and more varied experiences for the Scouts if parents could be called on for some assistance at times. Hico's Scout units operated, at times, with no parent of a Scout involved in active leadership. This is not the way Scouting is designed to operate. There is just as much need, possibly even more, for parental involvement than for the adding of boys to the number participating.

Cubbing is family centered; Scouting has much to be shared by boys and fathers; Exploring tries to help teenagers relate to their world, including family. The greatest weakness encountered is the lack of support and help from the family unit. This is a lack that needs to be overcome, and adults of Hico can overcome it if they will. The future of Scouting is up to Hico citizens as much or more than it is to the boys who are now Cubs and Scouts, and the boys and girls who are Explorers.

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MRS. ELLIS RANDALS WAS SPEAKER LAST WEEK FOR REVIEW CLUB MEETING

Hico Review Club members enjoyed a drive last Thursday to the home of Mrs. J. C. Braune at the foot of the beautifully arrayed Fairy Mountains. The occasion was a regularly meeting of the club. During the business session members heard a report on the recent workshop held in Hamilton, and made tentative plans for a Christmas project.

Members decided to make the school band the recipient of the club's funds for Community Improvement Project for this year. The Americanism Day program was introduced by the reading of a poem, "What is an American?" by Michael Brown.

Mrs. Ellis Randals spoke to the group about "J. Edgar Hoover's Legacy to America."

This man, who up until his death last year in May, had been director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation for almost 48 years, had come into much criticism during his last few years of his tenure. Many disliked him and called him a tyrant but none can take away from the fact that he molded the FBI into a law enforcement organization that was a model for all groups.

He was approached to be director of the organization by Harlon Fisk Stone, who was Attorney General at that time. Mr. Hoover answered that he would take the position under the condition that the Bureau would answer to the Attorney General alone and would be totally divorced from politics. This was agreed to and by 1935 the FBI was considered to be the finest organization in law enforcement and the word "G-men" struck fear into the hearts of law violators. Mr. Hoover set a rigid standard of behavior for himself and his men, demanding a standard of integrity that was above reproach. Mr. Hoover, who died at the age of 77, served under eight Presidents and 16 Attorney Generals. The first of the Presidents was Coolidge. He was a close friend of Herbert Hoover, as of FDR. He lived across the street from Lyndon Johnson when Mr. Johnson was a Senator, and recalled having helped Mr. Johnson hunt for his dogs late at night. He also enjoyed attending the Washington Senators baseball games with Richard Nixon when Nixon was Vice President.

Mr. Hoover was a bachelor and lived alone. His favorite sport was attending horse races. He spent many hours working with his flowers but had had his lawn area covered with artificial turf in recent years to cut down on yard work. His favorite vacation spots were California and Butte, Mont. which was near his beloved Glacier National Park.

His success as director of the FBI is attributed to his instilling the need for excellence into the attitude of his agents. He demanded high performance and dedication and ability to work long hours.

His personal conduct standard was high and he demanded the same high standards of agents. He felt that the group must show strict impartiality and must be able to withstand the taunts of the various factions that would like to tear down the moral fiber of the FBI.

In an interview given a few months prior to his death, Mr. Hoover answered remarks of critics that he was too old for his position. He said that age was not a valid factor in judging efficiency—that he had been called a Boy Scout at age 29 and that now he was referred to as "that senile old man." He referred to MacArthur, who did not achieve greatness until old age.

When Hoover took over as FBI director, there were 41 agents in the Bureau. Last year there was a work force of 19,000, including 8,000 special agents. Most of these agents worked at least 2½ hours of overtime per day.

Early in his career Mr. Hoover was in on every important case handled by the FBI but in the last years was in the office only. Kidnapping cases were of special importance to him because of the inhumanity of them.

Mr. Hoover's desire was that he be remembered as a man of fair play. He felt that the influence of home, church and school kaleidoscoped to form his ideals and opinions. To him the 11th Commandment was the directive to free the innocent and convict the guilty and he tried to run (his) FBI to carry out that commandment.

Mr. Gray, the present director of the FBI, is finding J. Edgar Hoover a hard man to follow, and many changes are being made in the FBI.
