Wintery Blast Socks Area In Ice, Snow and Extreme Cold

Hell hath no fury like a winter storm in Hico. These words might well sum up the weather picture here since the first of the year. Extremely cold temperatures, plus an ice storm, followed by an inch of snow, then by four inches more left the area practically paralyzed last week. Beginning Saturday, Jan. 6, the severe weather continued until the following Saturday, with Hico's official low temperature . . . on Friday . . . perhaps the lowest reading in the state. Only an unofficial four degrees below zero at Balinger topped the Hico reading, which was recorded at an official 3 degrees below.

Areas that usually have the coldest temperatures were several degrees above the official reading here. Dalhart, for instance, usually the coldest spot in the state, recorded eight degrees above on the same date that Hico had the minus three.

Temperatures throughout all last week consistently dipped below the 20-degree reading.

The ice storm the previous weekend was still in evidence when the snow storm hit. The light snow on Wednesday morning added to the accumulation, and the four inches of snow Wednesday night almost completely immobilized the area. Snow continued to fall until noon Thursday, and business was at a standstill most of the day. So much, in fact, that several businesses closed their doors shortly after noon.

Friday, a gradual warm-up sent temperatures soaring to almost 40 degrees, which started a thaw that didn't last long. By nightfall, the thermometer had plunged below the freezing mark, and streets and highways became extremely hazardous.

Saturday was the day that was, the sun came up bright and warm, and by noon most of the streets were clear of the slush. Only those places that were shaded were still covered with snow, and all highways and streets were clear.

Amazing thing about the weather was the fact that only one accident was recorded, that on Saturday night before the temperatures really took a nose dive. And not a single broken bone was reported at City Hospital due to falls on the ice and snow.

This week has been warm and balmy, with temperatures in the 70's Monday.

Hico has already experienced more consecutive days of extreme cold than in several years, and only time will tell if this winter is a record-breaker.

Fertilizer Meeting Set Thursday Night In Hamilton

The Hamilton County Extension Service is sponsoring a fertilizer meeting on Thursday, Jan. 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the District Court Room.

Local J.P. Court Has Busy Year

Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Paul Verduco has released an annual report for the precinct.

The report shows a total of 252 complaints for 1972 that came for trial. Of this number there were 250 convictions.

There were seven administrative hearings, five were served probated sentences and two cases were dismissed.

From traffic violations, 12 resulted in accidents; 8 liquor violations were filed; one possession of marijuana which was transferred to county court; and four hunting infractions.

Gomer and Sharon Have a Happy Homecoming

Sharon is seeing the outline of Hico after spending more than seven months in a hospital.

was the reaction of James Shipman and wife, Sharon, when they finally came home Friday afternoon after a stay at the John Sealy Hospital Transplant Center since May 1971, and after a successful transplant for Gomer.

When the homecoming it wasn't entirely an accident. The very day that Gomer returned home, the annual Bluebonnet Banquet was scheduled. Sharon was a member of the local unit, and he arrived in time to attend the banquet, seeing his friends for the first time since he went to Galveston.

Ray Keller, one of Gomer's faithful friends, arranged for the banquet to coincide with Gomer's homecoming.

Sharon, as he is affectionately known, is a very popular man. . . in fact his birth- day was Tuesday, Jan. 16, and he

still on for a kidney so necessary for Gomer to sustain life.

Gomer's mother, Mrs. L. L. Shipman, now of Covington, but formerly of Hico, was next on the test list. This was the same story.

As a final resort among family members, the father, L. L. Shipman, left his daily employment and went to Galveston to see if his kidneys could be matched with those of his son.

They did, to a certain extent. Remember, the match had to be between A and E, and the father's tests came up C. It wasn't perfect, but would work.

Early in September, Gomer was moved to the Transplant Center, and on Sept. 7, surgery was performed to remove both of his kidneys and his spleen.

Following was a period of convalescence, when Gomer lived on two special machines which did the work of his normal kidneys.

Then in November, the "big party" was scheduled.

His father checked into the Center, doctors removed one of his good kidneys Nov. 5, and on Nov. 7, the transplant was performed. Remarkably, the elder Mr. Shipman progressed so rapidly that he was released from the hospital in eight days, and was given permission to return to his employment after Christmas.

Gomer, too, showed remarkable progress, and doctors had promised that he could visit home for Christmas.

However, that wasn't meant to be.

Two weeks before Christmas, he contacted Chicken Pox, and on Thursday before the holiday, internal bleeding started.

At first doctors thought that he had a bleeding ulcer. Further surgery was performed, and doctors found a blood clot which was causing the trouble. They removed a small cyst, and about two inches of a small intestine. A tube was placed in his stomach to extract poisons, and by being fed intravenously, Gomer progressed well.

The process continued until last week when doctors told him that if Thursday's blood tests were good, he could come home for a few days. Those words were what he and Sharon had been waiting for.

But consider their disappointment when it started snowing in, of all places, Galveston. Doctors didn't encourage the trip home, but told the young couple to come back Friday morning.

They wasted no time in calling the doctor early Friday and informing him that the sun was shining, and that they were going home.

Gomer is not "out of the woods" by any means. He reported back Wednesday of this week for tests and examination, and said they would probably have to reside there for a couple of months before being released from doctor's care. He also said that he would probably have to go to the Center often for checkups.

Gomer and Sharon were real sincere and cooperative in the interview, held Sunday afternoon in the Ray Keller home.

"If Sharon hadn't been with me, and if the people of Hico hadn't been so good to me, I would have given up. Sharon was my strength."

Sharon is the former Sharon Parks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Parks, and how faithful and attending she has been is hard to describe. She was Gomer's nurse. She cared for him, and for his needs the entire time that he has been in Galveston.

After further questioning, it was learned that hospital bills through November 7 were \$22,000.00. Of this amount an insurance policy secured while Gomer was working with Precinct 3 of the County of Hamilton, has paid \$17,000.00. Since Nov. 7, however, bills have accumulated, and the young couple said they didn't know how much was owed at this time, probably another \$5,000.00. That's \$10,000.00 total.

None of these amounts include Sharon's cost of staying in Galveston during this period.

Gomer revealed further that they were receiving a small amount of state welfare until he became eligible for social security benefits.

Still, it has been a marvel that Sharon has been able to maintain a residence in Galveston on their small income during these many months of anxiety.

Both Sharon and Gomer voiced their sentiments that the people of Hico were the greatest, and had it not been for these people, everything that has happened to them in the past months could not have been possible.

They both agreed, also, that whenever they were able to lead a normal life, it would be in Hico.
