Tigers Shoot Down Glen Rose for Cinch Title Tie

Hico's hustling Tigers clinched at least a tie for the District 11-A championship Tuesday night by out-shooting the Glen Rose Tigers 57-53.

The win boosted the Tigers' season record to 16-4, and their district slate to 8-0 with two games remaining in regular season play. Still left on the schedule are contests with Goldthwaite and China Springs, with the latter locked in the cellar and Goldthwaite just a game ahead.

All Hico has to do to win a trip to the playoffs is win either of the last two games. Should they gain a clear cut title, it will be the first time in many, many years for a local boys basketball team to win a district championship. Hico has been in numerous play-offs for district championships, but records show that their last championship was in 1950.

A championship would send the Tigers into bi-district play against the 12-A champion, likely Itasca. Itasca sported a 20-2 record up until play this week, and were all but assured of the crown.

The Tigers, playing an exciting type game, uses the zone press and fast break to rattle opponents. However, in the Tuesday contest Glen Rose was waiting for the locals and curtailed their effort more than any other district team has been able to do.

Coach Dwain Gray credited the hustle and desire of his team members for their record thus far, and especially in the Tuesday night game.

Hico took a slim one point 16-15 first quarter, and failed to enlarge on the margin in the second quarter to lead 34-33 at halftime.

Glen Rose out-scored the Tigers in the third stanza, taking a 48-46 lead, but the locals came back in the fourth to outscore the home team 11-5 to win the game by the final 57-53 margin.

Benny Baley had the hot hand in the match, ripping the cords for 25 points. Galen Lindsey contributed 16, Buddy Mayfield 10, Danny Polk 4, and Jerry Lowry two in the winning effort.

In other games Tuesday night, the Hico B team was shot down 54-33, and the Hico girls played one of their better games despite losing 71-55 to the powerful Glen Rose sixsome.

Donna Thedford pumped in an amazing 38 points for the locals to lead all scorers. Ruth Buby and Patti Griffin each had six points, while Debbie Haynes got the other five.

In the boys B game, Lloyd Roberson hit for 13 points, Danny Kennedy garnered 8, Ed LeFevre and Walter Lucas each had five points, and Ralph Williams two.

In games played last Friday night, the Hico B boys won over Dublin 61-37, the Hico girls dropped a 41-30 decision to the Dublin fems, and the Tigers took a 64-42 win over the visiting Lions.

This Friday night, Hico travels to Goldthwaite, and China Spring comes to Hico Tuesday night for regular season finale.

Dairy Institute Scheduled February 6 at Stephenville

The cost and the urgent need to produce more forage at home are among topics tackled at the Texas Dairy Institute in Stephenville on Tuesday.

The Institute is being sponsored by dairymen to meet the needs of dairy producers in North-Dallas milkshed. R. J. Kerr, Extension specialist at Dallas, White Plains for similar Institute on Feb. 7 and Sulphur Springs on Feb. 8.

The program will vary in each area on the desires of the dairymen, explained White. A topic of concern will be the rising costs of dairy products, he said.

It is indicated that the price of feed is up 23 percent and feed prices are up \$12.65 a ton on the average over a year ago.

The Stephenville Institute will be held at Tarleton Center on the TSC campus starting with registration at 9:15 a.m.

Speakers at the morning confab will include Dr. John S. Chapin of Stephenville, area Extension agronomist, who will cover "Forage Production and Utilization: Dairy," R. J. Kerr of Stephenville, Erath County dairyman, will share his experience on "Producing Quality Coastal Bermuda for Dairy Herds."

"Coastal: Research and Use as a Dairy Feed" will be discussed by Dr. R. E. Leighton of Collette Station, head of the dairy section of the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M.

Last Watershed Structure Will Be Built Near Hico

The 27th floodwater retarding dam to be constructed in the Upper Bosque River Watershed is in the contracting stage, according to District Conservationist Billy J. Hinton of Stephenville.

He said that Southwestern Contracting Co. of Dallas is the apparent low bidder. This company submitted a bid of \$384,436.47 for the installation of this dam.

The Soil Conservation Service representative further stated that the dam on Site 27 will be the largest constructed in the watershed, and a 70-acre surface lake will result.

This dam will be located on the W. Conn Johnson Ranch, approximately 6½ miles west-northwest of Hico on Gilmore Creek.

Major items called for in the contract are: earth fill embankment, 482,061 cubic yards; excavation of 324,629 cubic yards of foundation material; and about 226 cubic yards of concrete. Some other items required in the contract are concrete pipe, concrete, clearing and grubbing, slidegate, trash-guard, fencing, diversions and waterways.

Hinton elaborated that the Watershed Program had certainly improved the environment in the Upper Bosque River Watershed area. He pointed out that as a result of this program, floodwater damages have been reduced, sediment has

'RSVP' Program To Be Started Here

Mrs. Ralph Koen of Hamilton, County Coordinator for R.S.V.P. (Retired Senior Volunteer Program), was in Hico last week seeking volunteer workers to initiate the program here.

In explanation, Mrs. Koen said that the program differed from the existing senior citizens program, and said that it was a part of the federal government agency "Action." It is designed, primarily, to offer older people an opportunity to put their vast store of knowledge, experience, and skills to work for the betterment of themselves and their community.

Through local RSVPs, senior citizens are placed as volunteers in a variety of useful assignments.

Some of the volunteer's assignments include hospitals, nursing homes, youth areas, etc.

Each RSVP is locally planned, organized and operated. A local

Advisory Committee, with a significant proportion of members over sixty, guides the development of the program.

A full-time Program Director provides the leadership necessary for continuity and growth.

An "Action" grant is made to a community organization which has demonstrated the ability and interest to operate an RSVP on a long term basis. Funding covers staff, transportation and meal expenses for volunteers and program expenses.

Mrs. Koen said any person sixty years of age and over is eligible to participate as a volunteer worker. There are no income, education, or experience requirements.

Mrs. Koen is working with several prospective volunteer workers at this time, and said she hopes to have the program underway shortly.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Hamilton County cotton producers will only be allowed to plant cotton during the period from March 20 to May 31, 1973. All cotton must also be destroyed by midnight of Nov. 30, 1973. This has been brought about by the Texas Department of Agriculture Pink Bollworm Quarantine . . . Rules and Regulation Proclamation No.

Livestock producers in Hamilton County are cautioned to keep a close watch on all cattle grazing on small grain pastures as nitrate poisoning may occur. The problem is especially prevalent during periods of cool, cloudy weather as have been common recently.

Higher nitrate conditions are more common in plants during such weather conditions. At the same time, grazing animals tend to lose more energy during cooler weather and are therefore more susceptible to nitrate poisoning.

There are a few steps producers can take to minimize the risk of nitrate poisoning:

1. Feed a high energy ration before placing cattle on small grain pastures. This will provide the animals with energy as well as inhibit a rapid intake of plant material over a short period of time. A mixture of grain and molasses should provide the needed energy.
2. Observe closely all cattle on small grain pastures. A veterinarian should be called at the first signs of illness. Early treatment is necessary to keep affected animals from dying. Other animals in the herd should be moved from the pasture and fed supplementary rations until the suspected forage can be tested.
3. Forage samples may be sent to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University to be tested for nitrate content. This service can help producers decide when pastures can be safely grazed.

Social Security

Questions & Answers

By CHARLES E. BASS

Question: I reach retirement age this year, but I have done little work under social security. How much work credit am I required to have for social security retirement payments?

Answer: If you reach retirement age (62 for women, 65 for a man) this year, you are required to have 20 quarters of coverage. Twenty quarters is the equivalent of five years of work under social security.

Question: I recently sent a post card form to check on my earnings under social security. When I received a statement of my earnings, I found that there was an error for the year 1969. How do I go about getting it corrected?

Answer: You should gather up any information you may have about your 1969 wages (payroll slips, withholding statements, etc) and call or visit any social security office. The people there will help you straighten out your earnings record.

Question: I am now 70 years old and have never signed up for Medicare. Can I sign up now?

Answer: You may be eligible for the hospital part of Medicare if you have worked long enough under social security. You cannot

sign up for the doctor part of Medicare since you did not sign up within three years after your 65th birthday.

Question: When a worker dies, who gets the lump sum payment?

Answer: If an insured worker leaves a husband or wife with whom he or she was living with at the time of death, the surviving spouse gets the death payment. When no such spouse survives, upon request by the person who is responsible for burial, payment will be made to the funeral home. If the burial expenses have already been paid, the person who made payment can claim the lump sum.
