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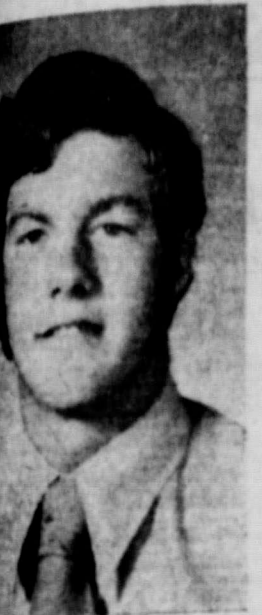
Annual Pancake Supper Set Friday, February 16 At School Lunchroom

First! Hico Boy 'Homemaker of Tomorrow'

Bryan Lee Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Jones Jr., became the first boy in the history of Hico High School to receive the Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow award.

This year the local school provided co-educational home economics for boys and girls consisting of Economics Cooperative Education, Consumer Education, and Family Living. Jones received the award for his performance in the semester courses.

Jones was selected as the highest ranking student at Hico High from the knowledge and attitude test given by 31 other Hico boys and girls on Dec. 5.

Jones presented a specially designed program to the Betty Crocker Search for America Homemaker of Tomorrow by Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, homemaker teacher, in his last week.

A personal letter from A. Champlin, Jr., Director of Publications and Administration at General Mills, Mrs. Johanson noted that Jones is among

the 25 highest ranking students in Texas. The letter stated that the examination papers of these 25 students are being reviewed by Science Research Associates and that Jones is being considered for a \$1,500 or \$500 Betty Crocker scholarship.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, to be chosen from these 25 students, will receive in addition to the \$1,500 scholarship, an expense-paid tour of Washington, D. C. and Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia.

Jones is currently serving his senior class as president, and was both an offensive and defensive tackle for the 1972 district-winning Tiger football team.

Seattle Rites Held For Cleo Etheridge Tuesday, Feb. 13th

Cleo Etheridge, age 49, brother of Mrs. Conda Salmon and Mrs. Sam Ownby of Hico, passed away in a Seattle, Wash., hospital last Friday.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, with burial in a Seattle cemetery.

Mr. Etheridge was to retire in April of this year after serving 30 years as a Civil Engineer for the Air Force, his home at present being at Makah Air Force Base, an Indian Reservation at Neah Bay, Washington. He had served on active duty in Germany during World War II, and later in Korea.

In February of 1971 he received the United States Site Civil Engineer of the Year Award at Washington, D. C.

Two brothers preceded him in death, Joda, age 47, in 1960, and Billy, age 42, in 1967, and his father, M. L. Etheridge in 1969.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Esther Etheridge of Seattle; a daughter, Jeffeline Etheridge of Houston; a son, Cleo Ray Etheridge of Houston; his mother, Mrs. M. L. Etheridge of Stratford; one brother, Howard Etheridge of Stratford; and two sisters, Mrs. Salmon and Mrs. Ownby.

Match Set For 7:30 P.M. in New Clifton High Gym

Hico's opportunist Tigers, representing District 11-A, will square off against the Itasca Cats, of District 12-A, Tuesday night at 7:30 in a bi-district game that will send the winner to the regional tournament in Denton later this month. The game has been set for the Clifton High School gym, a brand new facility which was opened only last Saturday night.

In Itasca, the Tigers will meet a formidable foe, with the Cats sporting a 25-4 record through last Saturday night. Hico's record through Tuesday was 19-5.

The contest shapes up as a real barn-stormer, as both clubs like to press and run and shoot. Admission to the bi-district clash will be 50c for students and \$1.50 for adults.

Practice Games.

In practice games played since completion of the district slate, Hico broke even in two games, with one left to play before the bi-district tilt. The Tigers won a breath-taking one-point victory over Gustine last Friday night by the margin of 67-66, and dropped an 86-78 match to Priddy Monday night of this week. The last practice game will be against Priddy Thursday night at Priddy.

In the Gustine game, the Tigers trailed most of the night, with the visitors owning a 15-14 first quarter lead, losing that margin to 36-31 at the half, and were ahead 52-46 at the three-quarter mark. Hico got a big 21-point fourth quarter production to overtake the visitors and win their 19th game of the season. Buddy Mayfield was leading scorer for Hico, pouring in 25 points. He was followed by Benny Baley with 21, Jerry Lowry with seven, Galen Lindsey and Danny Polk with six points each, and Tony Mayfield with two points.

In the Monday night game, Priddy lived up to its billing of being the strongest Class B team in this area as they jumped on the locals for the 86-78 win, despite a 36-point production by Benny Baley. Contributing points for Hico were Galen Lindsey with 16, Jerry Lowry with 12, Buddy Mayfield 10, and Danny Polk and Tony Mayfield with two points each.

Priddy led in every quarter, reigning 20-18 at the end of the first quarter, 47-29 at the half, 61-57 in the third period, and out-scored the locals 25-21 in the final stanza.

Seven games are on tap Thursday (today) as the Hico Elementary School Basketball Tournament gets underway. Kicking off the tourney will be the Stephenville and Dublin girls' B-teams in a contest that begins at 4:00 o'clock.

The Stephenville and Dublin A-teams will take the court at 4:45. Next game will be at 5:50 between Dublin and Hamilton B-teams.

Hico's first appearance will be a match between the girls and the Hamilton B-team at 6:45.

Dublin and Hamilton hook up in a boy's A-game at 7:40, followed by a girls' game between Iredell and Hamilton A-teams at 8:35.

Final game of the night will pit Hico boys against Iredell in a 9:30 match.

Friday games will kick off at 4:30 p.m., with the final game of the day at 9:05.

Saturday's finals will start at 6 p.m. with the girls' consolation championship. The boys' consolation will start at 7, and the girls' championship match will begin at 8. Championship boys' game will follow at 9 p.m.

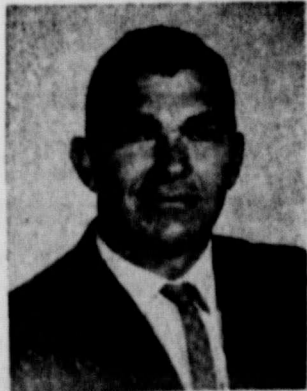

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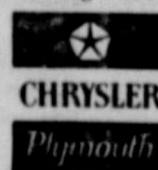

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BOMER HARRIS SHOWS BARBED WIRE COLLECTION AT REVIEW CLUB MEETING

Hico Review Club met Thursday, Feb. 8, at the home of Mrs. Bernice Jernigan. Refreshments were served at the beginning of the meeting to members, and Mr. and Mrs. Bomer Harris of Hamilton.

Members answered roll call with the description of "an historical spot in Texas" in partial observance of Texas Day for the club.

Mr. Harris, who exhibited a part of his extensive wire collection, spoke on the subject of "bobbed" wire, or "The Wire That Won the West." Mr. Harris is a member of the Texas Barbed Wire Association and is a well-qualified speaker on his subject.

His talk was punctuated with interesting anecdotes that drew the history of barbed wire from its time of invention in 1816. He told of the time when it was said that \$1.75 worth of wire was used to protect \$2.45 worth of crops from \$1.64 worth of livestock. Harrowing tales of the antics of fence riders on the W. T. Wagner Ranch near Electra and the King Ranch in the Rio Grande Valley gave spice to the story.

In 1868, Colonel Goodnight of Goodnight Ranch, was able to save some Pueblo Indians from irate citizens of Saint's Roost, as Clarendon as then called. They had mistaken the peaceful Indians for the fierce Comanches. After their rescue the Indians asked plaintively for directions for their return to Taos, New Mexico. The miles of stretching wire had confused their sense of direction.

Wire is still used in many capacities, from management of livestock and pastureland to protection of cropland to providing bar-

riers in war-time. It takes many forms and shapes and sizes, and is made from many materials ranging from plastic to stainless steel. It is a substance that plays an important part in forming Texas history. At the close of Mr. Harris' talk, members had several questions for him and got a closer look at the specimens that he had brought.

During the business meeting members were provided with lists of the names and addresses of senators and representatives, and were urged to write during February concerning "Big Thicket" legislation.
