At the time of his death he was a retired Lt. Colonel of the Air Force Reserve and an employee of L.T.V.

He and his family had lived in Greenville the last 25 years.

Each year, those chosen are featured in the national awards volume, "Outstanding Educators of America."

Nominations for the program are made by officials of colleges and universities including presidents, deans and department heads. The selection guidelines include an educator's talents in the classroom, contributions to research, administration abilities, civic service and professional recognition.

Dr. Johanson holds a B.S. and M.S. from Southwest Texas State, and a Ph.D. from Texas A&M.
