Hico Students Win Honors At Cen-Tex Science Fair

Hico students, participating in the Annual Central Texas Science Fair held at Waco last Thursday and Friday, garnered a fistful of honors and awards for their efforts.

Danny Kennedy was the leading winner, copping three first place awards, all in the Senior Division. He had the first place entry in Space Earth Science, first in American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, and another first place award from the Central Texas Society of Professional Engineers. His project was a rocket.

James Horton won a first place from the Texas State Society of American Medical Technologists and another first from the National Association of American Medical Technologists.

Jamie Putty received the Marine Technology Society Award for an exhibit in the field of Ocean Science and Engineering. He was also given honorable mention in the Junior Division, Biochemistry-Chemistry.

Newt Farrar received the Eastman Kodak Company Award for outstanding use of photography in a science project, and honorable mention in the Space Earth Science Division.

Dale Walker received the first place Microbiology, Social and Behavioral Sciences Award in the Junior Division.

Brian Dayton received the Senior Division special award from the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, Central Texas Section.

Other Hico students who entered projects were Becky Garza, Debbie Autry, Sylvia Dayton and Monti McCormick.

More than 300 Central Texas students entered projects in the Fair. Sponsors for the Hico students were Mrs. Lucille Brummett and Carl Guthrie.

Two FFA Judging Teams Qualify for State Contests April 18

Hico Future Farmers participated in Area IV Land, Range and Pasture contests held at Tarleton State College last Thursday, and qualified to compete in the State Contest April 18.

Twenty-four teams were entered in the land judging and the top five qualified for state. Breckenridge was first, followed by Henrietta, Hico, Midway (Henrietta), and Seymour.

Twelve teams were entered in the Range and Pasture contest, with placings as follows: Henrietta, Hico, Ranger, Stephenville and Breckenridge. Teams placing in the top five at the state contest are eligible to compete again.

Hico placed first in state in 1969, 1970 and 1971, and second in 1972, in Range and Pasture, and most team members are freshmen students.

Newt Farrar, Randal Haynes and Charles Roberts judged range, with Gary Reed as an alternate. David Ogle, Wayne Hyles and Roy Lesley judged land, with George Bales as an alternate.

The characters in the play represent real people who lived in Concord, Mass. in the 1840's. The play was directed by Constable Sam Staples and played by Jan Christian, and the set design was by Nibemiah Ball is represent-

ed by Curtis Haley. Benny Baley is Thoreau's brother John, and Sharon Hill is their mother.

Melanie Bonner plays the part of Ellen Sewell, with whom both the Thoreau boys fall in love.

Janet Odom is Emerson's wife, Lydian, and Buddy Mayfield is a Mr. Bailey, Thoreau's cell-mate in jail. James Roberson plays bird calls on his violin, presents the voice of the minister at John Thoreau's funeral, and plays the part of the town drunk.

George Bales is sound technician, and Donna Mayfield and Freda Jaggars are alternates and members of the stage crew.

Mrs. W. B. Hill is director.

This play, written by Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee, and published by Samuel French, Inc., is new to amateur theatrical groups. This is the first season it has been available in print, although the authors have supervised its production by selected groups over the past two years. Its message is strikingly contemporary, and youth groups throughout the country will find their own voices echoed in its lives.

"The Night Thoreau Spent in Jail" will be presented next on April 12 at 6:00 p.m. in the Tarleton State College Auditorium, as part of the U.I.L. Regional one-act play contest.

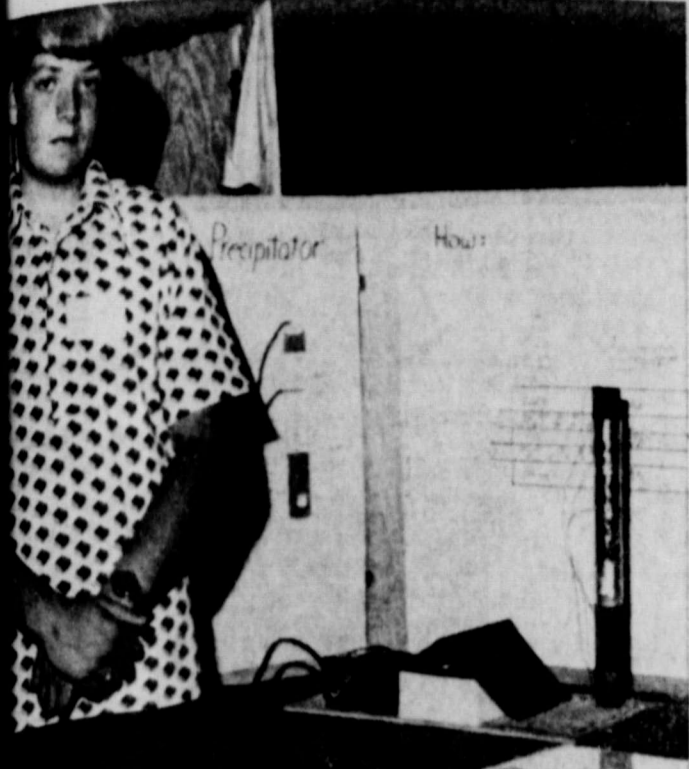

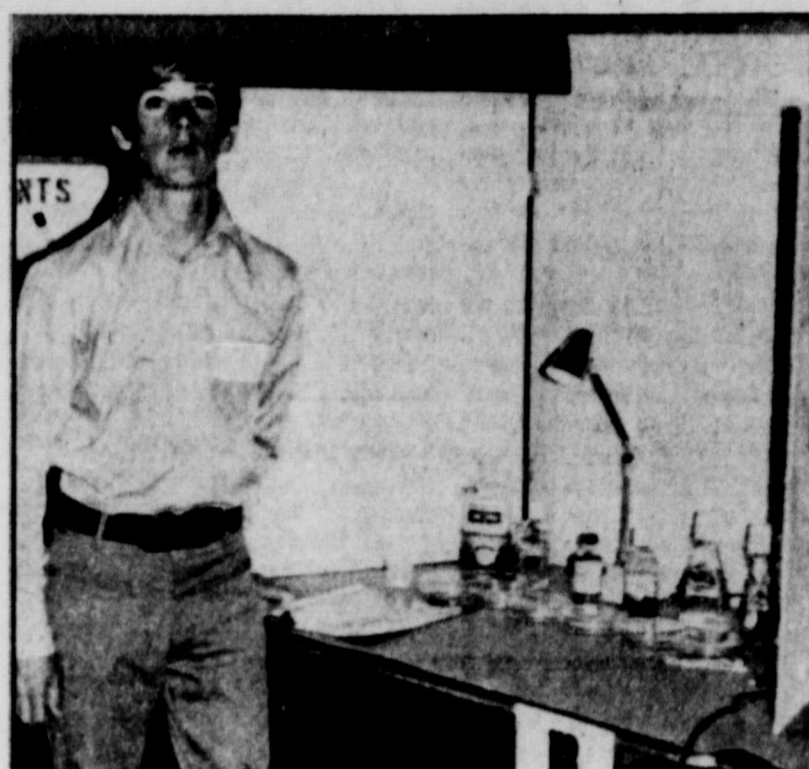

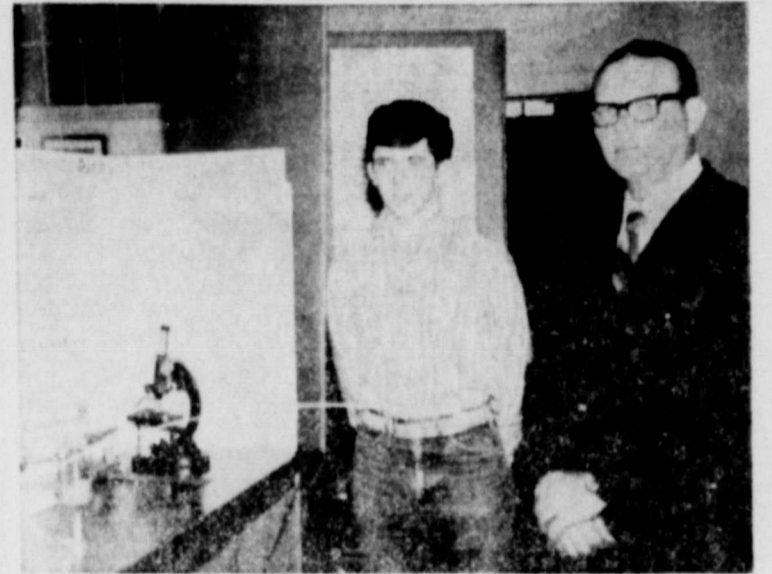

Class I: A Single Iris—Arranger's choice of design and fresh material used with a single iris. Emphasis on plant material.

Class II: An Emerald—Arranger's choice of design using all fresh plant material of tints, shades, and tones of greens. Emphasis on plant material.

Class III: A Sunset—Arranger's choice of design of all fresh plant material. Emphasis on plant material.

Class IV: A Vegetable Salad—Arranger's choice of design using all fresh vegetables, fruits, and/or flowers. Emphasis on plant material.

Kookin' Nook

If you are looking for a delicious dessert here is an idea from a young homemaker, Eldena Black. The recipe is one of Miss Black's entries in the recent Future Homemaker's Show, and it won her Best of Show trophy.

Black Forest Cherry Cake (Layer)

- 1 1/2 cups chilled whipping cream
- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/4 cups cake flour or 2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Heat oven 350 degrees. Grease and flour two round layer pans. In a chilled bowl, beat cream until stiff. Beat eggs until thick and lemon colored. Fold eggs and vanilla into whipped cream. Stir together remaining ingredients; fold gently into cream, egg mixture until blended, then pour into pans.

Bake 30-35 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in the center of the cake comes out clean. Then let cool.

Cherry Filling

- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1 can (1 lb.) pitted dark sweet cherries, drained (reserve syrup)
 - 1 tablespoon brandy flavoring
- Stir together cornstarch and sugar in small sauce pan. Add enough water to reserved syrup to measure 1 cup; stir into sugar-cornstarch mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Boil and stir 1 minute. Cool to lukewarm. Stir in brandy flavoring. Dip 36 cherries into thick-syrup, set cherries aside. Cut remaining cherries into quarters and stir into thickened syrup. Chill thoroughly.

To assemble cake, place one layer upside down on serving plate. With decorator's tube or spoon form thin rim of the sweetened whipped cream around outer edge of layer. Fill center with cherry filling. Place other layer topside up on filling. Gently spread whipped cream on side and top of cake.

Grate one-third bar sweet cooking chocolate. Gently press the chocolate by teaspoonful onto side of the cake.

Pipe border of cream around edge of cake. Beginning from center of cake outline individual portions in a spoke-fashion design. Place desired number of reserved dipped cherries in each outlined portion. Because of whipped cream keep refrigerated.
