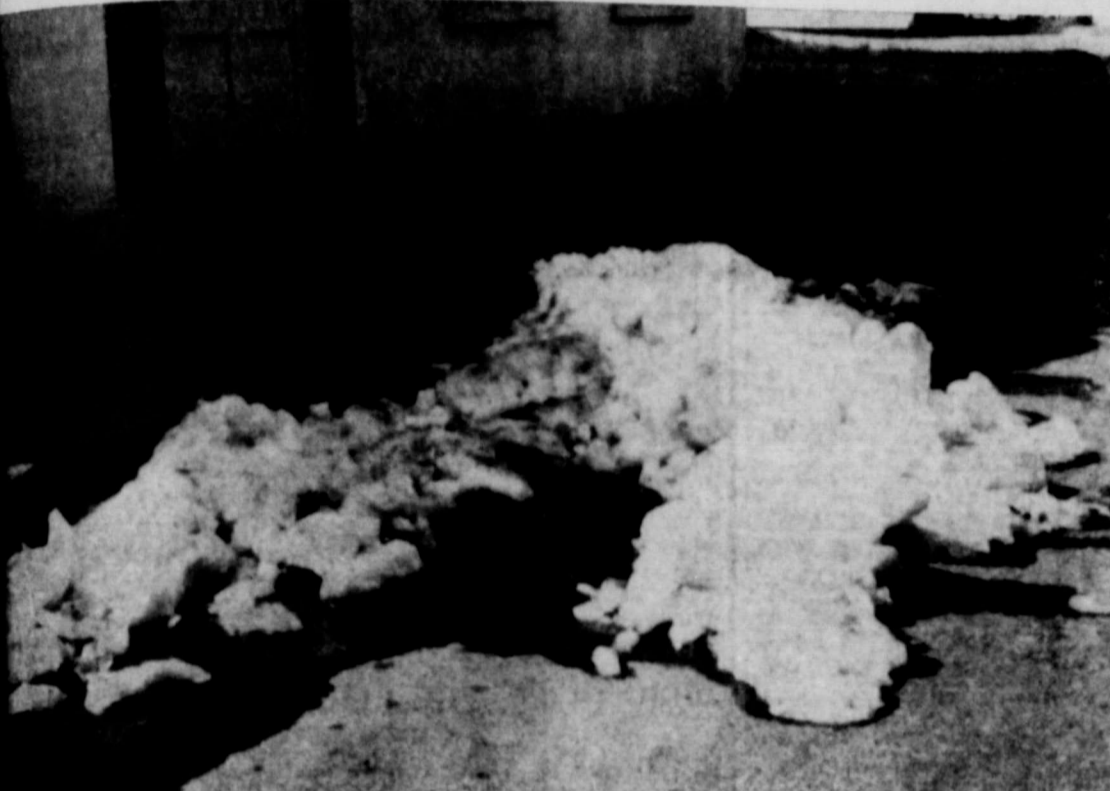

Judge Roberts is Named Baylor 'Lawyer of the Year'

E. Roberts of Hamilton, Texas, and formerly of Hico, was selected as the 1973 Baylor Lawyer of the Year.

Now judge of the State Criminal Appeals, received the award during a banquet high school at Baylor's University Law School activities in Waco last week.

For Lawyer of the Year presented annually to a graduate of Baylor who has rendered outstanding contributions to the legal profession.

Law Alumni Association the recipient on the nominee's legal ability and standing in the profession, his character, religious and other attainments, his active interest in the Law School.

Roberts has made outstanding contributions and contributions in the areas. Prior to his state on the state's criminal matters, he had an outstanding record as judge of the 52nd Judicial District in Hamilton, Coryell, and Bosque counties. He has been a judge for ten years. He is presently a member of the

executive committee of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council. He has served on several key committees of the State Bar, including the Committee on Revision of the Penal Code, Committee on Pattern Jury Instructions, and the Bar-News Conference Committee on Free Press and Free Trial.

Judge Roberts was president of the District and County Attorney's Association of Texas in 1960, after he moved to Hamilton, and chairman of the Judicial Section of the

State Bar in 1969.

He graduated from Baylor Law School in 1949 and was admitted to the Texas Bar the same year. He practiced law at Hico and Hamilton before his appointment in 1950 as County Attorney.

In 1956, Roberts was elected district attorney of the 52nd Judicial District. He served as presiding judge from his appointment in 1961 to January 1970. In 1970 he was elected judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Judge Roberts has served on the Committee of 100 for "Operation Second Century", a committee of Baylor graduates formed to reexamine the status of the university and seek to improve it.

Roberts enlisted in the Army in 1940 as a private, and was released from active duty in 1946 as a captain.

Active in the Methodist Church, he is secretary of the board of trustees of Methodist's Central Texas Conference.

Born in Crawford, McLennan County, he attended public schools at Crawford and Abilene. In 1949 he married Gloria Stevens of Valley Mills.

The Roberts have two children, a son, Tracy, 16, and a daughter, Robyn, 19, who attends Baylor.

Hico High's track team slogged its way to 134½ points and the District Championship in the meet held last Friday at Goldthwaite. Conditions were less than desirable for a track meet, but the locals came through with the victory.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

It's just good "horse sense" to vaccinate all horses, and other equine animals against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) as soon as possible.

Mosquitoes which carry this deadly horse sleeping sickness will soon be emerging as spring weather arrives. Although no cases of VEE were confirmed in Texas or other states during 1972, the potential danger of the disease still threatens all horses and other equine because VEE did strike in northern Mexico during the past year.

Although most horses were vaccinated for the disease in 1971 when it first hit the United States, few animals have been vaccinated since that time. Thus it's extremely important to vaccinate these animals again as immunity from the previous vaccination has diminished.

It is highly recommended to vaccinate horses that will be subjected to inter-state travel to shows, races and similar events. Foals that were vaccinated before six months of age should be re-vaccinated to assure a longer immunity. Pregnant mares may also be vaccinated. Experience to date has indicated no hazards following the vaccination of such animals.

One only needs to look back to 1971 to see how fast this deadly disease can strike. A horse owner just can't afford to play a guessing game with VEE, hoping that 1973 will be the same as 1972. It's just too great a risk when you consider that a vaccine is available to protect your animals.
