Funeral Services Held Sunday For Roger W. Meek

Funeral services for Roger Wayne Meek, 22, of Fort Worth were held Sunday afternoon, April 22 at 2 p.m. in the Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel, conducted by Rev. James McBryde. Burial was in the Hillside Cemetery.

Young Meek passed away early Sunday in the Arlington Memorial Hospital following injuries received in an automobile accident on Aug. 14, 1950 in Odessa, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. Meek of Hico. He and his family moved to Hico in 1959 where he entered the Hico Schools in the eighth grade, and was a member of the 1968 graduating class.

Meek entered the U.S. Air Force on Aug. 28, 1968 and was stationed at Lackland AFB in San Antonio for basic training. Following basic training he was assigned to Chanute AFB, Okla. for training in aircraft maintenance. Roger finished aircraft school in March 1969, and was sent to Webb AFB in Big Spring where he remained until his discharge on Oct. 28, 1972.

Meek was employed as a mechanic at the Fort Worth Trailer Co. at the time of his death.

Meek was a member of the Hico Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Diane Meek of Fort Worth; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Meek of Hico; one sister, Charlotte Meek of Hico; and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Meek of Goldthwaite.

Weldon Paddack, 15, Is Fort Worth Drowning Victim

Weldon Allen Paddack, 15, of 2805 Biglade, Fort Worth, drowned about 11:25 a.m. last Thursday when the small rubber raft he was riding was swept over a small spillway on the Clear Fork of the Trinity River near Benbrook and overturned.

Young Paddack was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Norris Paddack of Fort Worth, and a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Chaney of Hico.

A companion of Paddack's, Brent Shaver, 15, managed to make his way to shore.

Young Paddack was caught in the swirling water and went under, said medical investigator James Seaberry.

Members of the Fort Worth Fire Department Rescue Squad pulled the youth from the water and tried unsuccessfully to revive him. He was pronounced dead at 12:30 p.m.

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Saturday at Shannon's South Chapel, with burial in Laurel Land.

Survivors are the parents, a half-sister, Linda Kay Paddack of Fort Worth, and his grandmother, Mrs. Emma Paddack of Fort Worth.

Emergency Loans Available to Area Farmers, Ranchers

Farmers in Hamilton County who suffered crop or property losses because of the drought or other natural disasters during the period January 1 through June 19, 1972, and who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, 1003 East Main St., Hamilton, on or before May 8, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for emergency loans at 1 percent interest. In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

Supt. and Mrs. Cook Will Retire at End of School Year

43-Year Career Will End For Local Schoolman

After 43 years as an educator, community leader, and church worker, O. C. Cook is retiring as Superintendent of the Hico Public Schools. His wife, who has taught school for 42 years, is also retiring at the end of this school year.

The Cooks came to Hico 23 years ago, in 1950, when he was appointed High School Principal. Mrs. Cook was named third grade teacher.

After one year, the late J. E. Lincoln retired, and Mr. Cook was elevated to the superintendent's post.

Prior to coming to Hico, Mr. and Mrs. Cook taught school and held administrative posts at Mozelle, Coleman County Rural Schools, Erath Rural Schools, Evant and Taylor. They came to Hico from Taylor.

Mr. Cook also served one year as a field representative for the Texas Education Agency, and during the early 1940's, he was employed at Keesler Field, Miss. from 1942 until 1944, and Mrs. Cook taught in the public schools at Biloxi, Miss.

During their tenure in Hico, the Cooks have been active in all community and school affairs. Members of First United Methodist Church, Mrs. Cook has served as choir director for about 12 years, and Mr. Cook has been a member of the choir, and both have served in other capacities at the church.

Building Programs.

During Mr. Cook's 22 years as superintendent, he has guided two major building programs which required bond elections, plus other programs that have been paid for out of local monies.

The first was construction of the new elementary school, which was completed in 1953. At that time a bond in the amount of \$70,000 was voted.

Seven years later, in 1960, the second major program was carried out under Mr. Cook's guidance, this time the renovation of the present high school building and addition of the new auditorium. Bonds in the amount of \$98,000 were voted at this time.

In 1963, the new agriculture shop and classrooms were constructed at a cost of about \$10,000, which was paid for out of local funds. The ag building was so well designed that many schools have copied the structure.

Last year, Hico's modern new athletic field house was constructed, and other improvements made to the athletic plant with an expenditure of approximately \$18,000.

School Consolidations.

Also during Mr. Cook's time in Hico, four schools have been incorporated into the local district. Clairette was the first to consolidate with Hico, and Duffau followed a few years later. In the Duffau consolidation, the people of that community voted 100-percent for the move.

Hico acquired about 50 percent of the Fairy district when that school was consolidated with Hamilton. And about the same area came to Hico from Carlton when that school ceased.

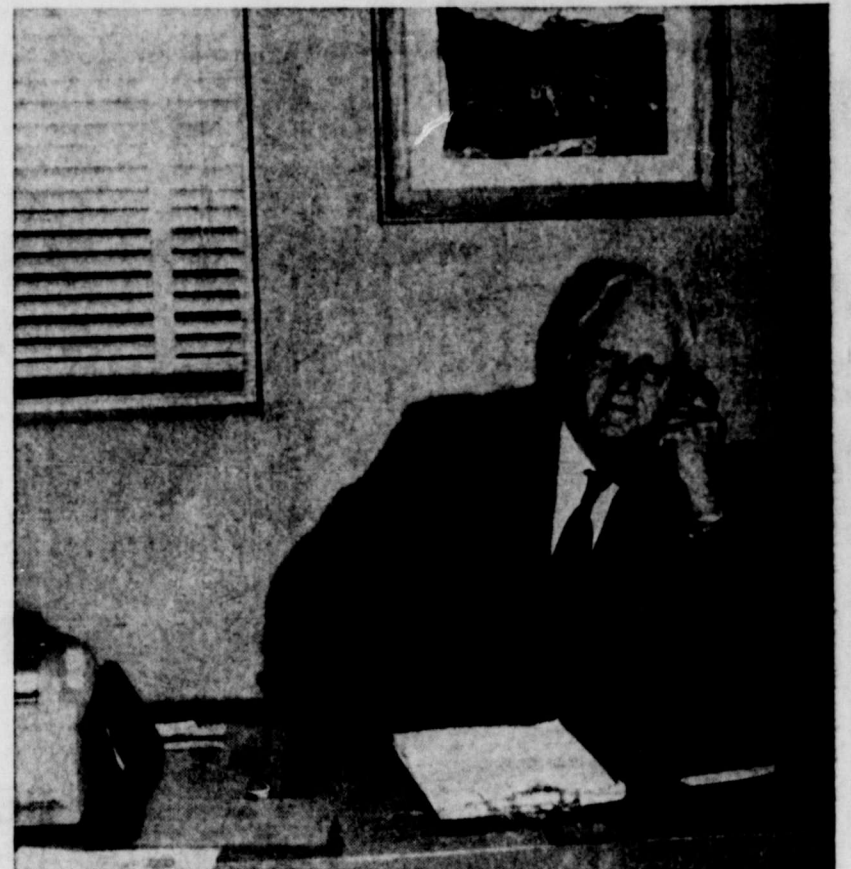
Plans Indefinite.

Rev. Chaney is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Chaney of Hico.

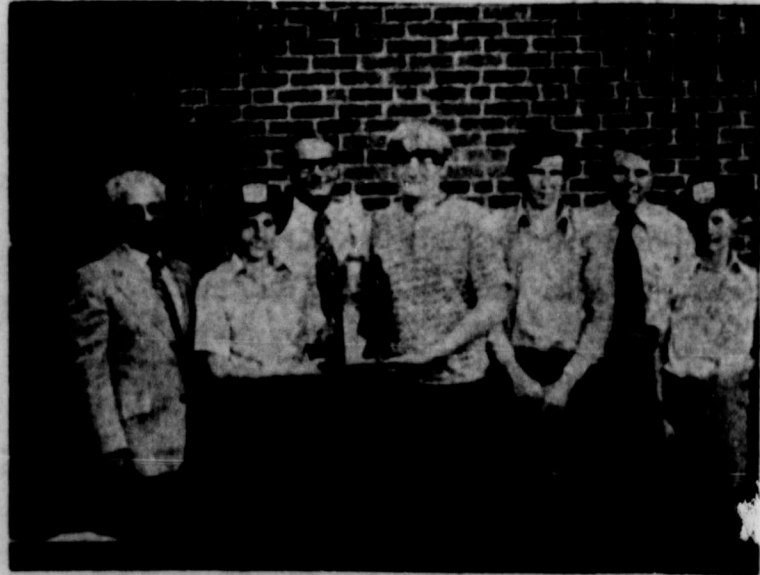
