He was a retired truck driver and had worked in the oil fields in earlier days. He had made his home in Hico for the past 33 years, and was a member of the Hico Church of Christ.

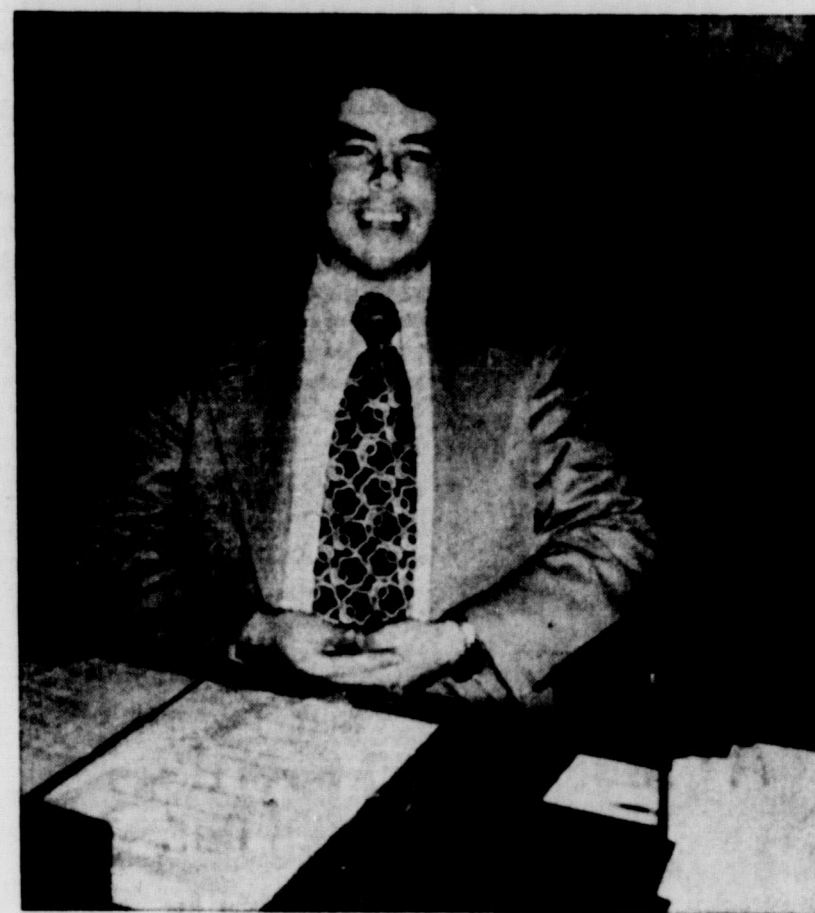
