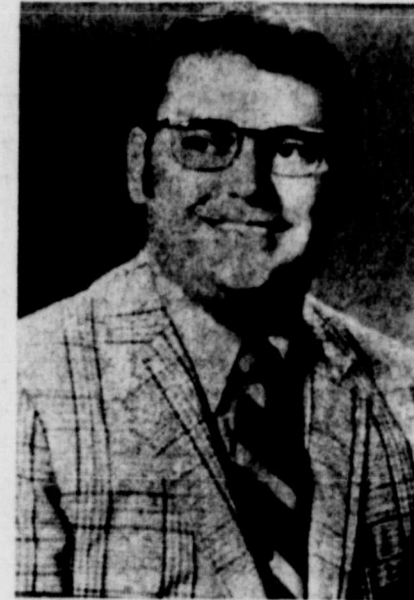
Hico is approximately two inches above normal in rainfall.

City-Wide Collection Would Be Mandatory Of All Residents

Following several months of study and deliberation, Hico City Council entered into a tentative agreement with Mr. and Mrs. O. F. King of Fort Worth for contract on hauling all garbage in the city, both residential and commercial.

Council members have been studying the local situation since last year with an eye to being forced into the move by the State Health Department in the near future.

The Council agreed to have contract drawn up within the next two weeks, which will be submitted to the Kings for inspection. If approved by the Kings and the Council, official action will be taken at the next meeting, June 4, and contract made.

Some of the points of the tentative agreement are: The Kings would be given a one-year contract with option for four years; they would be in complete charge of the city dump, with one day each week to be open to the public under supervised dumping; fee for the service will be \$2.00 per month for residential, with the Kings entering into agreement on an individual basis with businesses; residential users will be billed monthly on the regular water statements.

Also, all residential garbage will be sacked in plastic bags and placed at curbs on designated days, with pickup to be once weekly.

Council members pointed out that the Health Dept. was getting more strict on cities as to how their garbage and trash is disposed of, and noted that it was only a matter of time until the move agreed on Monday night would be mandatory.

Other Business.

In other business, first order was certifying the recent city election, when Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey won re-election for two-year terms without opposition. Secretary Bess Lackey administered their oath of office.

The meeting time was also changed from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Also Mrs. Jack Allen was employed as parttime city clerk.

Other discussions centered around annexing some property into the city limits, and the proposal was referred to committee for study. Excess runoff waters on city streets was also discussed.

Questions & Answers

Question: I was told by a neighbor that if I kept up with my drug bills and they were more than \$50.00 a year I could get a refund from Medicare. Is this true?

Answer: No. Drugs that are self-administered are not covered under your Medicare insurance.

Question: I'm 62 and planning to retire within the next year or two. Must I wait until a birthday to apply or can I apply at any time during the next two years?

Answer: You can apply for retirement payments any time. If you decide to have your checks start before age 65, your benefit amount will be permanently reduced. The amount of the reduction depends on how many months you get checks before you are 65. For every month that you are closer to 65, the reduction in payments is less. You should apply for Medicare two or three months before the month of your 65th birthday. Medicare enrollment is automatic if you are already receiving benefits at age 65.

Question: I am self-employed. My wife does not work. We file our tax return jointly. Does she receive credit for social security the same as I do?

Answer: No. Filing jointly only keeps a husband and wife from completing two tax returns and has some income tax advantage. She does not receive any social security credit from your earnings.

Plans for converting to the metric system of measuring and weighing things are taking shape in the United States and making appearances in grocery stores.

Labels on some processed foods give a measurement in liters or grams, in addition to usual information using quarts, ounces or pounds.

Some labels use the metric system because the product is exported to other countries, or imported to the United States, but other labels carry metric system figures because food processors have begun the changeover.

Considered simple and consistent, the metric system of weights and measures has been lauded by some educators, who believe that children learn it more quickly and easily than the system now in use.

In addition, the metric system uses decimals instead of fractions making arithmetic simpler.

Others have questioned the need for changing from the system we understand and seem to make work.

Advocates of the metric system point out that the United States is the only major industrial nation not using it. In fact, they say, there are only 13 other countries, all quite small, not using metric weights and measures.

Advocates argue that conversion to the metric system would be an

economic advantage, giving the United States a more competitive role on the world market.

Many have raised questions about cost of a metric change-over, who will pay for it.
