## School Trustees Accept 2 Resignations; Hire Four New Teachers

Monday night, the school trustees accepted the resignation of two teachers, and at the same time employed four more, to fill one vacancy to be filled in the near future. Yet to be named as the new grade teacher to replace C. Cook, who retired.

The trustees selected Ronnie Partain as Vocational Agriculture Teacher, Mrs. Sharon Boone as Co-op Education Instructor, and Mr. and Mrs. David Anderson to fill other vacancies in the local system.

### Mrs. Hill Retires.

After beginning a teaching career

51 years ago, Mrs. W. B. Hill retired at the end of the current year. Saturday, May 26 was Mrs. Hill's last day at school.

Mrs. Hill began teaching in Comanche County in 1922, teaching at Beattie for a year and Sipe Springs for two years before going back to college to get her degree.

After receiving the degree she taught English in McMurry College in Abilene for five years, going from there to Lubbock High School where she taught until she married Mr. Hill.

The next nine years Mrs. Hill played the role of housewife, and mother to their son.

In 1945 she went back to the teaching profession at Merkel where they lived at that time. Other schools where she taught were Denver City High School, Barksdale High School, and Southwest Texas Junior College in Uvalde where she was head of the Department of Communications.

The Hill family moved to the Hico area in 1955 and bought a farm north of town on the old Stephenville Highway, where they still reside.

Mrs. Hill taught six years at Fairy before coming to Hico where she has been an English teacher for the past 12 years.

Mrs. Hill stated that she loved her teaching here and especially enjoyed drama and oral interpretation. She was director of the Drama Club and One-Act Plays that went to State contests for four years and to Regional contests eight years.

The longtime teacher finished a career that included eight years of college and 34 years in public schools.

### Mrs. Johanson Resigns.

Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, who came to Hico 11 years ago as Homemaker teacher, submitted her resignation to accept the Stephenville position, created by the retirement of Mrs. Boyd Greenway, former Hico teacher.

During her tenure in Hico, Mrs. Johanson has established an outstanding record, and was responsible for creating the Annual Homemaker Division of the Livestock Show six years ago. Her students have accomplished the utmost in the homemaking field, with several of them presently teaching the subject, one of which is Mrs. Boone, the new Co-op teacher, and another Mrs. Denna Gray, currently serving as Homemaker teacher here.

Two of her students have held offices in the 1,200-student Area IV, with Barbara Baley being elected president of the huge area.

Mrs. Gray was the first Area officer from Hico, being elected Historian in 1963. Miss Melanie Bonnes is currently serving as 1st Vice-President of Area IV.

The Johansons have not announced future plans as to whether they will continue to reside here or move to Stephenville.

### New Teachers.

Harold Walker, superintendent-elect, presented a number of applications at the Monday meeting, and reviewed them with the trustees.

Those selected were Mr. and Mrs. David Anderson of Bryan, Mrs. Sharon Boone of Stephenville, and Ronnie Partain of Waco.

Mr. and Mrs. Anderson are former staff members here. Mr. Anderson, employed as a teacher-coach, attended Blanket High School, Cisco Junior College, Howard Payne, where he received his B.A. degree in Biology, and Texas A&M where he received his Master's degree in Science Education in 1969 and was approved for Doctoral work. Mr. Anderson has also completed special work, attending the National Science Foundation Institute in Earth Science in 1966 and the Ecology Institute in 1970. In addition to his experience in the local school from 1961 to 1967 he has taught

and coached at North Junior High, Waco, Jones Junior High, Bryan, and Stephen F. Austin, Bryan. Mr. Anderson is qualified in Biology, English, Social Studies, Math, Science and P.E. He is expected to coach Junior High and teach Science or Math and assist with High School athletics.

Mrs. Anderson received her high school training in Brownwood. She received a B.A. degree in English from Howard Payne in 1964, and her M.A. in English from Texas A&M in 1973. She attended a N.D.E.A. Institute for special training in 1966. She began teaching in Carlton in 1963 and moved into the local system in 1964, and has had experience at Tennyson Ju-

nior High, Waco, A&M Consolidated, Bryan Schools, and Texas A&M University where she is presently employed as a teaching assistant, tutoring Freshman English.

She has extra qualifications in Speech.

The Andersons have three children and the oldest will enter first grade this fall.

Mrs. Sharon Boone completed her high school work in Hico in 1965. She received her Bachelor of Science degree from Southwest Texas State University in 1969, and has since returned for special work in Governmental Process and Labor Movement. She has experience teaching Home Economics and History in Del Valle High School, and Physical Science and Home Economics at Bishop Dunne High in Dallas.

Mrs. Boone is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Howard of Hico, and she and her husband, Bob, have a daughter, Cassandra Kay, eight months. Mrs. Boone will be working with the H.E.C.E. program.

Mr. Ronnie Partain of Waco has been elected as Agriculture teacher. He was also a 1965 graduate of the local schools. He participated in every phase of the vocational agriculture program, competing in livestock, land, leadership and dairy judging. He was on the 7th place team in dairy judging in State. He had an extensive swine project program, and received the coveted Lone Star Farmer degree. He received a Sears-Roebuck Scholarship to attend Texas Tech to study Agriculture Education and was on the Dean's List his last six semesters.

Partain did his student teaching in Keller, and has taught and coached in Rochester for three years, and is presently employed by Baylor University as Athletic Dormitory Director while doing his Master of Education work. Mr. Partain is married and his wife is in training as a beauty operator.

All of the new employees are expected to move to the community this summer and begin their duties with the new contract year.

## City Council Lets Contract On Residential Trash Pickup

Following a routine opening, Hico City Council found itself confronted by a large group of citizens Monday night, all protesting the proposed trash hauling contract. More than 20 people were present, and all were in opposition to the plan. A petition containing 131 names was presented. Councilmen, and those in attendance who so desired were given an opportunity to

express their objections to the proposal.

In the end, Council members voted unanimously to go ahead with the contract, specifying Mr. and Mrs. O. F. King of Hico and Fort Worth as being their choice to take over the local situation. Start of the service, in all probability, will be around August 1.

More than two hours was spent in discussing the pros and cons of the present proposal, which calls for uniform pickup of all garbage in the residential section on a fee basis (2.00 monthly) which will be added to water bills. One of the main objections to the plan was adding the \$2.00 fee to water bills, but Council members pointed out that it was the only feasible way to collect for the service.

Councilman Roy Bates and Mayor O. L. Davis, in separate questions, asked those opposing the

plan to give an alternative method in eliminating the present situation, which was termed by Bates as "impossible."

No solution was offered, but everyone in attendance were in agreement that first step in alleviating the present situation at the City Dump was to lock the gate to all outside trash hauling.

Under terms of the contract passed Monday night, the Kings will be in complete charge of the city dump and all trash hauling. The disposal area will be open one day each week, on Wednesday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. for outside use on a supervised basis. The Kings will be responsible for this supervision.

In grasping for a solution to cure the ailments, the Council noted that it was only a matter of time until the State Health Dept. would force the action taken Monday night.

A copy of the contract is on file at City Hall, and is available for public inspection.

### Other Business.

Streets, street cleaning and City Hall improvements were other items that came in for discussion during the meeting. Also the Council accepted the recommendations of the equalization board, and re-appointed Dr. B. C. Dayton to a five-year term on the City Hospital Board.

All city water mains will be flushed next Wednesday morning, June 13, according to Supt. W. R. Hampton. Hampton said the water would be slightly discolored for several hours following the flushing.
