Mrs. Scott will secure sponsors for those interested in entering the senior division, and merchants desiring to sponsor a candidate should contact Mrs. Scott.

A Little Miss Contest will also be held and those wishing to enter their children should contact Mrs. Schneider.

Mrs. Ellenburg listed the following rules for the pageant:

1. Two divisions will be held, a Little Miss for girls age 3-6, and the regular senior division for girls age 14-18.

2. Both divisions are open to any area girl. Local area is considered to be Hico and Iredell School Districts.

3. The young division is open to girls age 3 through 6 who have not attended school. They will not be sponsored, but must be entered by parents and pay a registration fee of \$3.50 to Mrs. Schneider.

4. Senior division is open to local area girls age 14 through 18. The contestants must be sponsored by a Hico business firm or area organization.

5. Deadline for entry is Friday noon, July 20.

## Hico Linksters Dominate Weekend Golf Tournament

Bluebonnet Country Club's first annual partnership golf tournament, held last Saturday and Sunday, was a tremendous success. Six teams participating voicing praise for the tourney, and the condition of the immaculate golf layout.

City-four two-man teams swung and the course during the two-day affair, and when firing ended Friday afternoon, Hico golfers led their worth by claiming four of the prizes, which amounted to more than \$1,700.00.

Ray Cheek of Hico, for her Hico State Sand Greens Champion, was winner of many other tournaments, and his partner, Clayton Parks of Houston copped championship flight honors, firing a 134 under par figure for the two days.

The duo fired a first day 65 followed with a 69 to win the tournament by two shots over Huffman Land of Fort Worth. Third place finishers were Poe and Hastings of Fort Worth, who fired a 70 and fourth place went to G. Bullard of Hico and Donnie Campbell of Stephenville, who put in a 139.

The first flight, hometown favorite duo Steve and Ray Parks

had to play an extra hole to cop that championship. When regular play was over their card showed five over par 149, as did that of Barnes and Cummins. The Parks duo had a routine par on the first extra hole for the win, while their opponents were one over gaining second place. Third place in the flight went to Floyd Clifton of Hico and Joe Youngblood of Austin, who were one shot back of the winners with 150. Largest playoff of the day was for fourth place in the flight when three teams hooked up. The team of Elliott and Simpson prevailed over teams composed of Marvin Walters of Hico and Bill Harwell of Fort Worth, and McClarin and Duke.

The second flight had another hometown flavor when Leslie Patterson and his brother-in-law, Bob by Alexander of Dallas won the championship, taking a two-hole playoff over Billy Dyer and Wolfe of Jonesboro and Gatesville. Both teams parred the first hole, but the out of town team bogeyed the second to fall into second place.

Third place went to the brother team of Moody Ross of Garland and Don Ross of Hico with a 154, who won in a playoff over Hamilton and Wilson.

In the third flight, the big prize again stayed at home with M. I. Knudson and E. V. Meador winning by a five-stroke margin over Jim Crouch and David Gautier of Hamilton. Knudson and Meador fired a 12 over par 156, while the Hamilton duo had a 161. Third place went to Falkner and Metzgar of Stephenville with a 163, and fourth to Bob Clifton and Andy Dow with a 165.

First place winners in each flight won sets of irons and a trophy, second place received woods, third a golf bag, and fourth a dozen golf balls.

The collection of earth was placed around a pecan tree that was planted on the grounds of the building at 7420 Fish Pond Road.

A time capsule that was buried in front of the new TFB structure contains the names of more than 140,000 member families of the Texas Farm Bureau, as well as the signatures of officers and directors of the TFB and all of the county presidents in attendance.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe was the dedication speaker. Others on the program included Waco Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage, chairman of the U.S. House Agriculture Committee, and Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

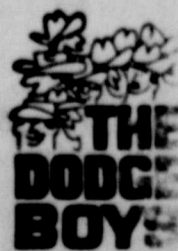

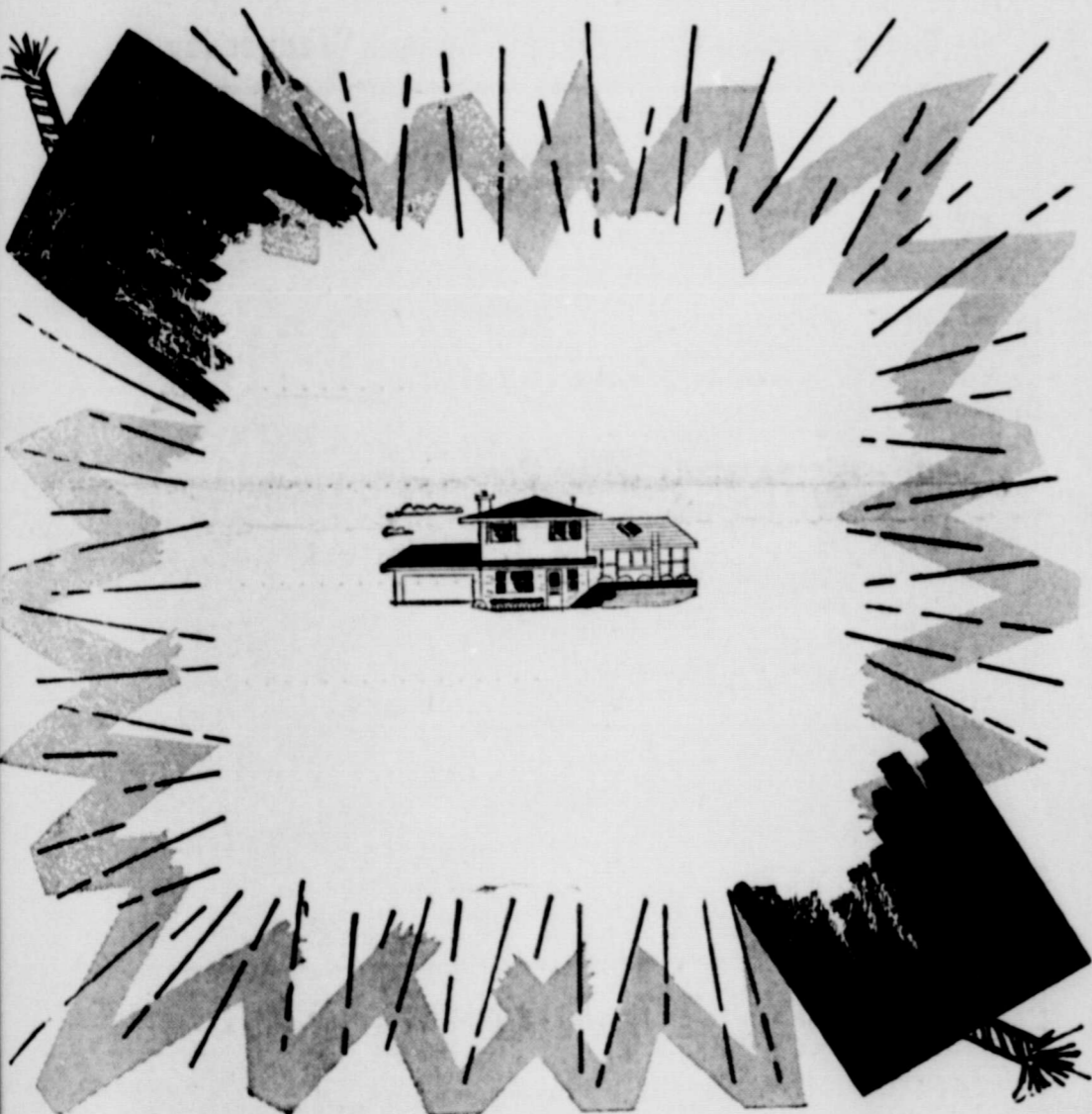

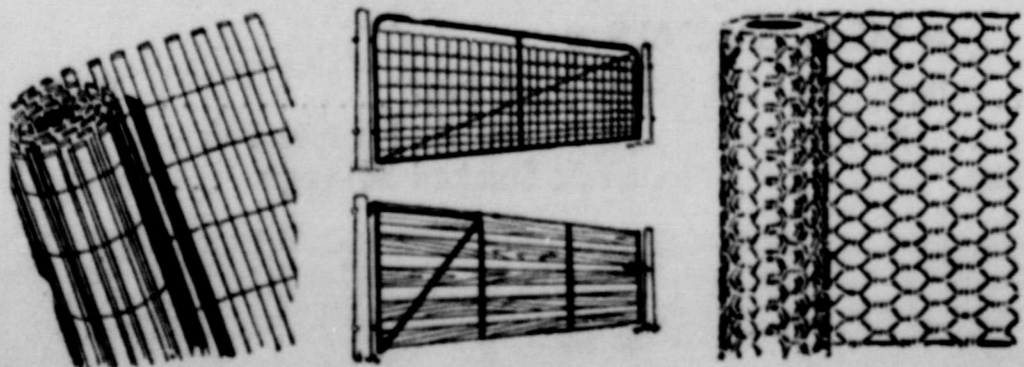

Granting to O. F. King and wife, Leona, the right, privilege and authority to pick up garbage in the City of Hico upon the terms and conditions herein stated, and declaring an emergency.  
**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HICO, TEXAS:**  
SECTION 1: That for and in consideration hereinafter mentioned, the right, privilege, and authority is hereby granted to O. F. King and wife, Leona, to operate and maintain a garbage pickup service on the streets, alleys, and public ways of the City of Hico, for the purpose of furnishing to the citizens of the City of Hico a garbage pickup service in order to maintain the public health standards.  
SECTION 2: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will be in full charge of the dump grounds and will keep the gate to the dump grounds locked at all times, except on Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at which time, O. F. King, and wife, Leona, will open said dump grounds to the public for public dumping, and on said Wednesdays, O. F. King will supervise all dumping and be responsible for any and all dumping.  
SECTION 3: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will furnish their own equipment, which is to be adequate for the performance of the work which they have agreed to undertake.  
SECTION 4: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will pick up the garbage in every section of Hico, excluding the business area, at least one (1) time a week.  
SECTION 5: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will only pick up that garbage which is placed in the designated areas, and which is placed in sturdy plastic bags.  
SECTION 6: That the City will supply dumping holes for O. F. King and wife to place said garbage in, and the City will use their own means to cover said holes.  
SECTION 7: That this contract for the pickup of garbage is for one (1) year, with an option for O. F. King and wife, to renew said

contract each year for four (4) years, after the expiration of the first year contingent on O. F. King and wife performing their contracted duties in a businesslike way to the satisfaction of the City of Hico; and should they fail to perform their duties as agreed, then their services may be terminated by the City of Hico, giving O. 

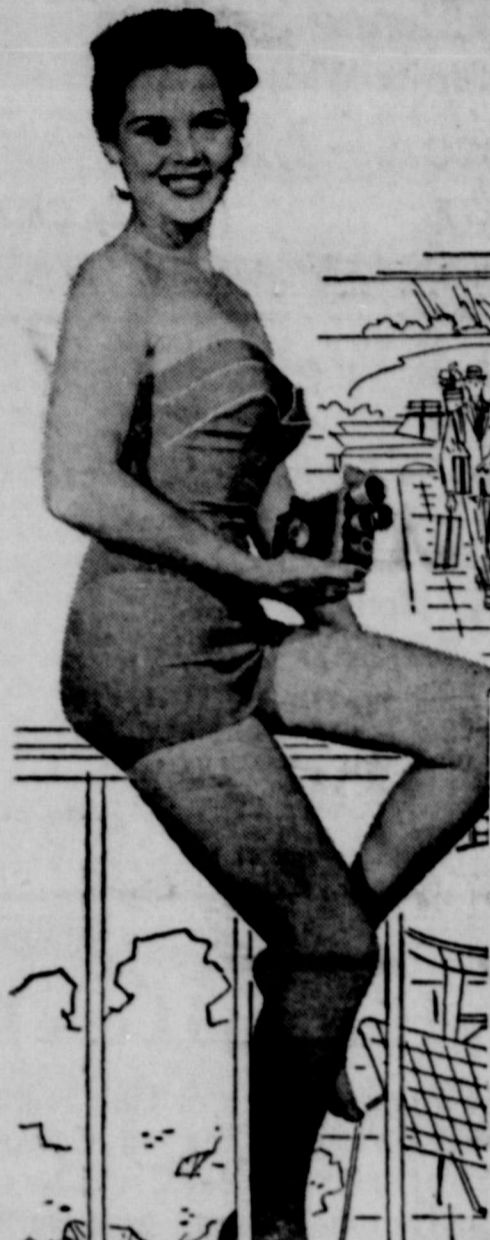
