Walker Honored by Ag Association

Harold D. Walker, former Vocational Agriculture teacher here, received his 25-year tenure pin and was honored by the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas in San Antonio July 31, according to Sid Long of Gail, president of the organization. Walker, who served as ag teacher

here for 23 years prior to being elected superintendent, is a Stephenville native and graduate of Texas A&M University. He is a Navy veteran of World War II.

The pin was presented at the Annual Awards Program. The program is held during the statewide conference of Vocational Agriculture Teachers, and the 1973 conference emphasized the implementation of new approaches to Vocational Agriculture Education. Leaders in agriculture and education from throughout the state and nation participated in the four-day in-service meeting.

Approximately 1600 teachers and friends attended the San Antonio Conference.

Schools Scheduled to Open Aug. 20; Registration Aug. 17

The Hico Schools will begin August 20th with the teachers reporting August 13th for an intensive week of In-Service training. Teachers will be involved in developing job descriptions and a follow-up of procedures for Assessing Performance of Professional School Personnel, and participation in Co-operative In-Service meetings at Hamilton and Gatesville.

August 17 will be devoted to registration of High School, Kindergarten and First Grade students.

The faculty was completed for this term with the addition of Miss Dollie Collins to teach fifth grade

and Mrs. Gloria Carlile as teachers aide. Miss Collins replaces Mrs. Lucille Simpson, who resigned and is moving to Belton. Miss Collins has a B.S. degree from Tarleton State University and M.Ed. from North Texas State University. She taught at Huckabay two years before completing work on the masters degree and was Counselor at McKinney for one year.

Mrs. Carlile will be working assisting teachers with the Title I reading program, and performing clerical and typing duties.

In connection with the opening of school the buses will run on regular schedule and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

Student Immunization Required

The local school has been notified by the Texas Education Agency that it has not attained the State Board of Education goal of 90 per-

cent of all pupils immunized against those diseases listed by the State Board of Health as a requirement for admission to school. Another survey will be made in the Fall and if the district has not met the 90 percent immunization level in the four disease categories at that time, the district will be operating in violation of accrediting standards.

Parents of students who have been attending school and have not completed their health records were mailed notices last term. These should be complete prior to registration this year, according to Supt. Harold Walker. Parents of Kindergarten and first grade students should bring these records when registering their children.

Senate Bill 27 is now in effect and requires that all children entering Texas Elementary or Secondary Schools must have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis and rubella. The only students exempt from these immunizations are those presenting a statement signed by a medical doctor stating that the immunizations would be injurious to the students' health, or an affidavit signed by the parent or guardian stating that the religious beliefs of the student prevent his having immunizations.

Budget Hearing.

The School Board will meet at the regular time on August 20 for the purpose of discussing the tentative school budget for 1973-74, and any other business which seems necessary.

He was born Aug. 2, 1956 in San Antonio and passed away Wednesday, Aug. 1 in the David Grant Medical Center at Travis AFB in California.

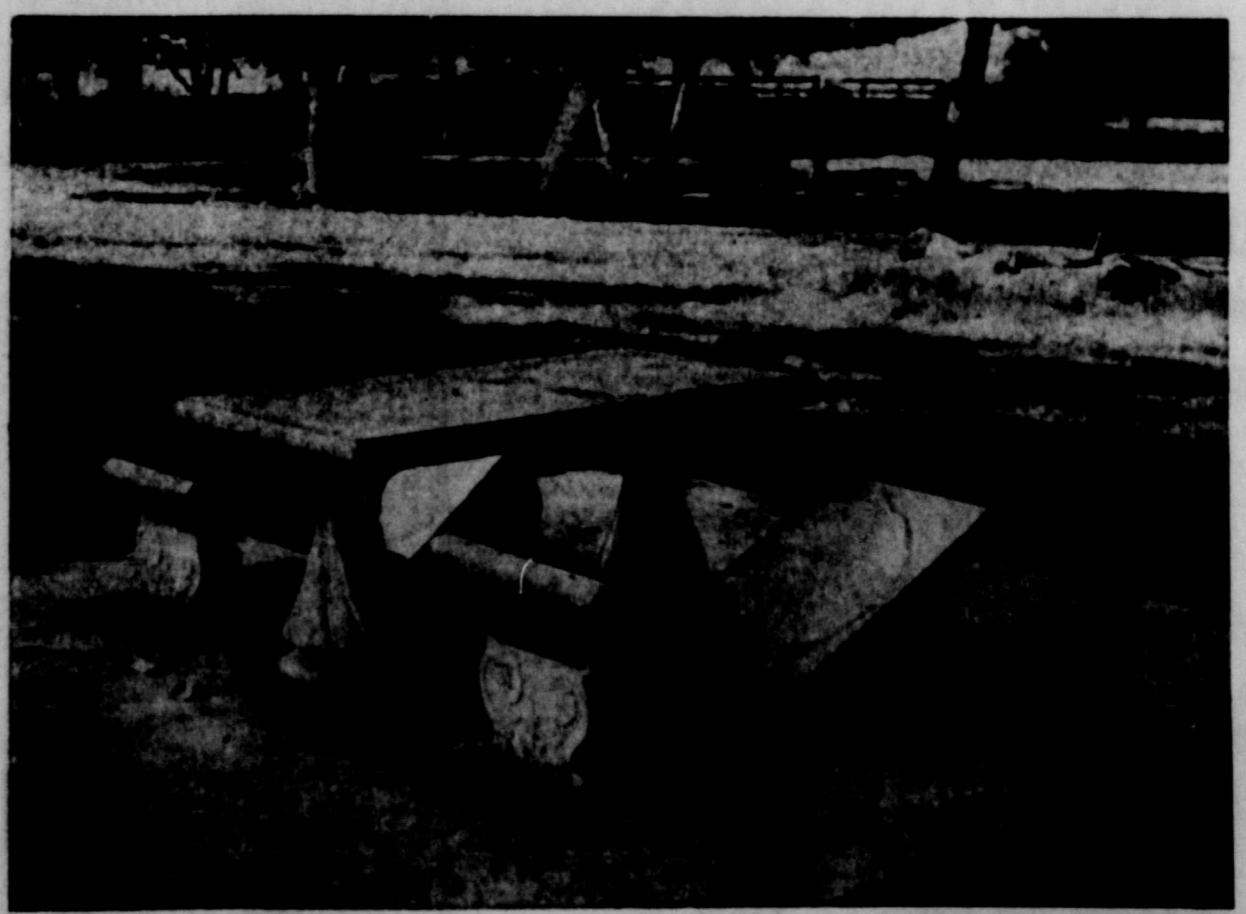

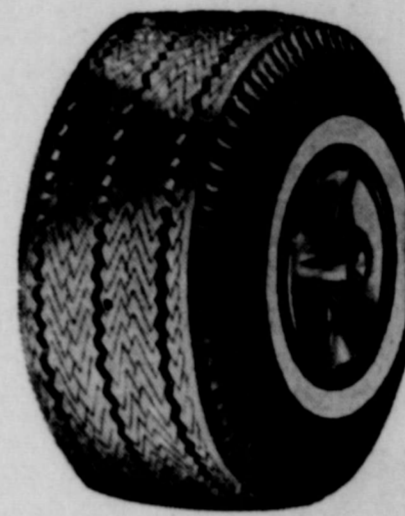

We visited in the two homes of Sam Houston at Huntsville, the museum, and Houston's gravesite, talked to a farmer about Fire Ant problems, and took a nature trail walk in the Huntsville State Park where many species of trees, plants and ferns were on the forest floor.

Near Cleveland we visited the Hill Top Herb Farm where you can pinch and sample many growing plants. We saw the logging operations and saw mills in the Big Thicket near Livingston, and also visited the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation.

In Port Arthur at Cafe French Royal we had a delightful French Creole dinner of crayfish E. Toffe, Crayfish Bisque, Crayfish Gumbo, Jambalaya, and Crayfish Pie.

At Beaumont we went to the site of Al Mammel's gusher Spindletop which brought in the modern oil era to Texas. At Sabine Pass we visited the site of Dick Dowling's victory against U.S. Naval landing in the Civil War. Here a new State Park is being planned.

We drove the coastline highway from Sabine Pass to the Point Bolivar lighthouse and the area where Jane Lang, (mother of Texas), her infant daughter and a negro slave stayed while Dr. Lang was on a filibustering expedition in Mexico. We took a ferry to Galveston Island. Here we saw a Victorian style home of the 1880's called the Bishop's Palace. We traveled the coastline highway on Galveston Island to Freeport. We visited the grave of Lorenzo de Zavala, first vice president of the Republic under Sam Houston. Part of the battlefield which was a marsh in 1836 is now under water as this area is sinking. The girls toured the battleship Texas.

In Houston we were in a horrible traffic jam. Drove 21 miles in 1 1/2 hours.

Between Huntsville and Bryan at a country stand we bought two watermelons and had a visit with a negro couple who told of a good way to cook Cashaw. Crops were good everywhere. In Jefferson County the rice was knee high and green. Everywhere barns were full of hay. Army worms were bad around Huntsville, as they have been here.

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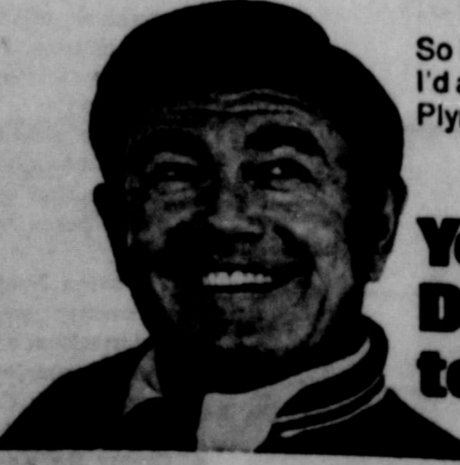

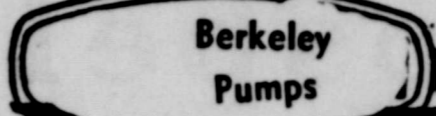
